THE COLUMBIA WINS.

Yesterday's yacht race, as our despatches show, was won by the American boat but only by about half the time allowance in her favor, the Shamrock being fifteen seconds ahead at the termination of the contest. The Columbia, as defender of the cup, has now won three races and the contest is over for the year. The cup will remain with the New York Yacht Club.

Sir Thomas Lipton, while he did not win the cup, came very near doing so, and the fact that two of the three races he has just lost were decided against him by a time allowance of forty-three seconds will mark the competition of this year as one of the closest in history.

An Ottawa despatch tells that tenders are shortly to be called for again for a fast Atlantic steamship service with Sydney in summer and Halifax in winter as the terminal ports on this side the Atlantic. Perhaps so, but this fast service has been talked of so much and so long that we must possess our souls in patience. From the Island point of view the selection of permanent Atlantic ports seems desirable, but the influence and claims of Montreal and Quebec will not be set aside without a struggle.

General satisfaction is felt and expressed at the action of the Board of Health toward establishing a hospital for contagious diseases. There is too much reason to fear that such an institution may be needed during the coming winter and prompt action is needed. Yesterday afternoon a deputation from the City Council with Dr. Johnson, the Health Officer, waited upon Premier Farquharson and asked that the Government grant the land for a site, the City being willing to erect the building. The Premier promised his hearty cooperation and the matter will be brought before the Executive at their next meeting. A site on the grounds of the Stock Farm has been spoken of as likely to be donated.

So far as the investigation of the Sampson-Schley inquiry has gone Sampson's reputation rather than Schley's has suffered. We doubt not that both are brave and able men, but the testimony goes to show that Sampson has been distinctly unfair to Schley in various ways. In an official despatch he referred to "the reprehensible conduct" of Schley. His official criticism of the battle of Santiago came with an ill grace from one who was not present. He suppressed Schley's despatch describing the battle to the Department and substituted one of his own. He gave out in a magazine article the statement that in blockading Santiago Schley withdrew to a distance of 25 miles at night. The testimony before the court shows this to be absolutely false. In fact Sampson seems to have pursued a policy of ungenerous and unprofessional criticism toward the real winner of the battle and a brother officer, which the inquiry now shows up greatly to the disadvantage of the critic and in favor of the man who has long suffered in silence.

Some have thought the time limit of five and a half hours was too short for a yacht race of thirty miles especially on those days when the race is over a triangular course. The Boston Herald points out that the actual distance sailed on the triangular course is about 34 miles. That would be only a fraction over six miles an hour, and that speed ought easily to be made on any day when there is wind enough to afford any test of the respective sailing qualities of the competing yachts.

By a strange piece of fortune an old sloop, which had lain at the bottom of East Bay, Lake Champlain was unearthed from the sand in which she was buried 124 years ago, and 10,000 British sovereigns recovered. It turns out that the money was sent from Quebec in 1777 to pay General Burgoyne's men during the revolutionary war. The sloop was in charge of one Captain Johnson, who, when she was attacked scuttled the vessel, and was shot when he escaped to the shore. The Americans knew nothing of the money on board at the time. The British authorities suspected Johnson of having stolen it. So the sloop was left to her repose in the bottom of the Bay, near the shore, and was gradually buried in the sands. A recent storm partly uncovered one side of the vessel, and being blown open with a charge of dynamite an iron chest was found in the captain's room containing the gold—nearly \$50,000.
