It is evident that the approaching election will be hotly, if not closely, contested. There is arrayed against the Canada Temperance Act the private interests of all aspirants for license.

It is not claimed that the Scott Act has been entirely effective in preventing drunkenness. There has been illicit selling. There have been physicians who have made a living by the sale of certificates, as well as physicians who have scorned thus basely to abuse their office.

Of course there have been oppressive laws, against which it was right to agitate. Law has not always been, what in theory it is—Right as interpreted by the majority. It is upon this that the Scott Act rests.

Our duty at this moment is clear. The defeat of the Scott Act means the triumph of the cause of intemperance and vice. It means the taunting sneers of those mean specimens of our race—men who are low enough to appropriate the earnings of laborers in return for filthy poison, and whose moral sense is so small as to think the business respectable.

The contaminated water and air in Charlottetown, are sources of great danger to the inhabitants, and that nothing is being done to prevent the consequences of the foulness that prevails is one of the most painful conditions of the present time.

The State Law of New Jersey, of 1882, on this subject reads as follows:—"To regulate, control and prohibit the accumulation of offal, and all decaying or vegetable substances in any place in such city, borough, or township, public or private."

At the Coming Scott Act Election in Charlottetown.

THE Scott Act is now in force in Charlottetown and will remain so until the majority of electors decide otherwise. For the purpose of disseminating the Act in Charlottetown a petition was presented to the Governor-General praying that the Act should be repealed so far as this city is concerned.

OCTOBER 16, 1884. Voting on the petition to the Governor-General for the revocation of the order in Council bringing into force of the second part of "The Canada Temperance Act, 1878," in the City of Charlottetown.
