Anniversary Of P.E.I. Presbytery At Central Lot 16

The first Presbytery of Prince Edward Island was by deed of the Presbyterial Synod of Nova Scotia, formed on 11th October, 1821, and held its first meeting in the house of Archibald Campbell, Esq., Lot 16, within the present school district of Belmont. Those present were: Rev. John Kier, later Dr. Kier, of Princeton or Malpeque, who was made the first moderator; Rev. Robert Douglas of St. Peter's Bay, elected clerk, and Rev. William MacGregor of Lot 16, who was ordained that day. There was one layman present, Edward Ramsay, the ruling elder from Princeton.

These ministers who formed the Presbytery were not the first Presbyterial ministers to labour on the Island, but heretofore there had been no opportunity to form a Presbytery.

For various reasons it has been decided to have the formal observance of this anniversary by Presbytery in the month of July, and this on Sunday, Oct. 11th special services will also be held in the United Church at Central Lot 16. Meanwhile subscriptions will be solicited for the purchase of a suitable tablet which will be unveiled on that occasion. One of the special speakers at the October celebration will be Prof. James W. Falconer of Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Halifax, a brother of Sir Robert Falconer, and a grandson of Rev. Robert Douglas, clerk of the first Prince Edward Island Presbytery.

The descendants of Dr. Kier are also well known, especially in this section of the Island. His son, the late Dr. William Kier, a medical practitioner of great skill, was a house-hold name. Dr. James Kier of Malpeque is a grandson. Rev. John K. Fraser, D.D., of Alberton, P.E.I. is also a grandson. Dr. John Kier's reputation as a scholar, teacher and pastor is well established in the annals of early church history in this country.

Mr. William H. MacGregor of Central Lot 16, well known agriculturist and stockman, and an elder of the church, is a grandson of the Rev. William MacGregor who served the old Richmond Bay congregation faithfully for thirty years. Rev. Mr. MacGregor came out from Scotland in 1820, settled at Lot 16, and was ordained the following year. The tombstone that marks his burial place is at the rear of the present church.

The descendants of the ruling elder, Edward Ramsay, are legion. He was a forebear of the present minister of the Richmond Bay East pastoral charge, Rev. E. Woodside, formerly of Darnley and the Princeton congregation, and now resident at Central Lot 16.

The United Church Presbytery of Prince Edward Island will meet in regular session in the church at Central Lot 16, Tuesday, July 21st. A public service will be held in the evening to commemorate the amalgamation of Presbytery one hundred and fifteen years ago. An opportunity will be given to visit the exact scene of the first Presbytery, and also to see the remains of the house owned by the late Mr. Campbell and now remodelled into a barn on a neighbour's property.

This year also marks the sixtieth anniversary of the present church building at Central Lot 16. Accordingly, on the previous Sunday, July 19th, this anniversary will be fittingly observed. There will be three special references to the annals of the review of the congregation will be given at the morning services. This review will include a special reference to the amalgamation of the former Methodist and Presbyterian congregations of this place which actually took place before 1925. As an act of thanksgiving a special thank offering will be given at these services and will be credited to the Manse Building Fund which it is hoped will be met in full this year.
