# L. A. Dodger Relievers Could Become Starters

VERO BEACH, Fla. (AP)—The Los Angeles Dodgers, who promise to have an interchangeable infield, could come up with an interchangeable pitching staff, too.

That is, any one of the men slated to be relievers is capable of starting games that faltering starters could wind up in the bullpen is taken for granted.

"My relief situation depends entirely on how the men considered as starters, such as Don Newcombe, Carl Erskine and others, perform," Manager Walter Alton said after Tuesday's busy workout under a hot sun.

"If any of them falter, I wouldn't hesitate to pull Ed Roebuck, Clem Labine or Don Besten from the bullpen and start him. All have started games, and are capable in that role."

"I also consider Jackie Collum as a reliever. I think he's a pretty good little guy in spots. In the middle of a game a lefthanded

reliever might do all right.

"It's been mentioned we could use a lefthanded reliever. Well, as long as Labine has his two good pitches he takes the place of a lefthander. He has that overhead curve and a sinker fast ball."

**HOW ABOUT KOUFAX?**

There promises to be plenty of fast ball pitching from the Dodger mound staff. Alton was asked how he rated Sandy Koufax in that department.

"I will say I believe Koufax is as fast as any pitcher in the league," Alton said.

"Faster than Don Drysdale, or Stan Williams?" Alton was asked. Williams is a tall, right handed from St. Paul who has been burning the ball over in workouts. Alton refused to be concerned.

"I'll never make comparisons among my pitchers," he said.

"They all are fast. Some pitchers fool you with the big motion. Others are what you might call sneaky fast. That is, they don't give you the big motion but with their wrist snap they get plenty of speed on the ball. I'd say Danny McDevitt could be called sneaky fast."
