

Recover Body Of 6th Victim Of Lake Drowning Tragedy

KENORA, Ont. (CP)—Provincial police Monday recovered the body of the sixth victim of a New Year's drowning tragedy on the Lake of the Woods.

Three couples were drowned when their cars plunged through thin ice in the early hours of New Year's Day. Another couple survived by fighting their way out of one of the sunken cars and scrambling to shore over crumbling ice.

The accident, believed to have resulted from the lead car taking a wrong turn, took the lives of Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm McLeod, Mr. and Mrs. James McGregor, and Mr. and Mrs. Engnor Lindstrom.

Mrs. McLeod's body was recovered Monday after 48 hours of dragging in freezing water. The bodies of the other five were recovered by Sunday night from the 100-foot-wide channel between Treaty Island and mainland.

Surviving the accident were Mr. and Mrs. John Kammerer, who staggered in a dazed condition to the house of Tim Piddock, 69-year-old caretaker at Devil's Gap Lodge.

FORCED DOOR OPEN

From his hospital bed at Kenora, Mr. Kammerer told how the party was returning from a late visit to Ylmer Point, six miles out in the Lake of the Woods.

He said he and his wife, Margaret, and her mother were sitting in the back seat of the first car. Mr. McLeod was driving and Mr. Lindstrom was beside him. The second car was about 30 feet behind.

"The first thing I knew, Margaret's father yelled something and we started to go down right away. I told Margaret to open the door quick. She tried and couldn't get it open. Then I leaned across and the two of us opened it.

"By this time the whole car was under water. I tried to pull out Margaret's mother but she didn't budge. The next thing I remember I came up and was under the ice." He managed to break it.

As soon as he surfaced, Mr. Kammerer saw his wife appear about eight feet away.

"We got up on the ice somehow. I don't know exactly how we got ashore. The ice was breaking under us nearly all the way."

Ponder On Meaning Of New Map Put Out By Red China

NEW DELHI, (Reuters) — Government officials Monday were trying to puzzle out why Communist China is selling maps here which show parts of India and Kashmir as belonging to China.

The Peking regime has apologized to India for the "oversight," after renewed representations from the New Delhi government. It was learned here. The Chinese officials insist that the maps were prepared under the Nationalist regime.

The apologues do not explain how the maps are labelled "physiographic map of the People's Republic of China," and have obviously been made from fresh plates.

Similar maps have recently been circulated in Burma, showing China in possession of parts of that country. Further, the Peking magazine People's China, claims that the Irrawaddy river is Chinese, although its entire course runs through Burma.

The Chinese maps are on sale in New Delhi with copies of People's China. The map shows almost the entire northeast frontier agency of India, covering 54,000 square miles, as Chinese territory. It also shows northeastern Kashmir as Chinese.

India made her first representation to Peking on the subject a year ago.

CARRY STORY OF MOTORIST IN FATAL ACCIDENT

MONTREAL (CP)—The Gazette, noting that 228 persons died in Montreal traffic accidents in 1954 and one child already has been killed this year, Monday carried the story of a driver who accidentally killed a pedestrian.

The story of the unidentified motorist, as told to reported Peter Desjardins.

I slept last night for the first time since the accident. Four nights of lying in bed seeing that man falling in front of my car. I still shake when I remember every time I drive, I see him running in front of my car.

It was the coroner's jury said I wasn't to blame. But even when you're driving safely accidents can happen. You can never relax at the wheel. You always have to watch everything.

I'd like to take the careless drivers and make them feel what I feel after killing a man you don't forget.

AFTER 25 YEARS

It's ironic it should have happened to me. I'd been driving cars for 25 years... Last year I opened a driving school and I've taught hundreds of people to drive safely.

He (the victim) didn't see me as he ran across in front of another car. My fender caught him and threw him five feet into the air. He landed face down on the road, unconscious.

A man bent over him. He stood up and said to me: "That's my brother."

It was 45 minutes after the accident when they finally lifted the man off the street. He died in hospital the same night.

I came home. I couldn't eat or sleep.

I couldn't think of anything but that man running in front of my car.

362 Accident Deaths In U.S.A.

CHICAGO (AP) — The New Year's holiday weekend cost the United States at least 362 accident deaths—296 of them on streets and highways.

The traffic death toll was substantially less than that of Christmas weekend a week earlier when 392 were killed by motor vehicles. However, the Christmas traffic deaths and the over-all toll of 515 accident fatalities both set records for a two-day holiday period.

The 296 lives lost in traffic last weekend also far exceeded an estimate by the National Safety Council which said before the holiday cars would kill 240.

TV Affects Style Of Women's Clothing

MONTREAL (CP) — Television has considerably affected the styles of women's apparel, Michael Kaplansky, president of the National Garment Salesmen's Association of Canada, said Monday.

Mr. Kaplansky told a gathering at an exhibition of women's and children's apparel that the style change is due to the informality of apparel women wear while viewing TV. The demand for less formal clothes is increasing, he said.
