## School Board Seeks Solution To Problem

SUMMERSIDE — The problem of providing accommodation within the public school system for students of St. Mary's Academy at Summerside is still unsettled although reports Monday indicated that the board had decided to provide accommodation for all of these more than 700 students; or, an alternative proposal, to accept all above Grade V, leaving these elementary grades within their present facilities.

It was learned yesterday that the Commissioners of St. Mary's had asked for clarification of the School Board's proposal, which the commissioners interpreted as meaning that the School Board would provide the tuition costs if the grades one to five used the accommodation available within the St. Mary's Academy building.

A new proposal was reported yesterday when an unofficial source suggested the purchase by the Town of the building presently used to provide school accommodations for the St. Mary's students.

Reports indicate that the facilities presently available within the public schools and auditorium, would not be sufficient to accommodate all Summerside children in all grades at any one time that are expected to be seeking enrollment. It was said that in the light of present circumstances and accommodation, the board might have to meet the problem by having students attend "staggered" classes. Such a plan would enable the teaching staff to provide tuition to all students within the facilities that could be provided at that time in present public school properties.
