Sixty boys and girls from the St. Vincent's and the P.E.I. The children were taken to Cavendish by chartered buses

and after a short parade in which they were led to the bathing houses by the Summerside Sea Cadet Band, the boys and girls took to the water for a lengthy swim and later enjoyed playing on the beaches. During this time the Sea Cadet Band under the direction of Bandmaster Lt. Gabriel Chaisson, treated quite a number of holidayers

and Sunday sight-seers to a pleasing band concert which was enthusiastically received. The orphanage children were later treated to an excellent meal as the group was divided into parties and taken to several of the Cavendish restaurants before their return journey to Charlottetown. Mrs. A. Wright was in charge of the Protestant Orphanage party and Sisters Mary of Fatima and Ellen Mary supervised the Roman Catholic group. Lester Jenkins was chairman of the arrangement committee assisted by Frank Rush of Charlottetown and due to their fine

### FIRE POSED THREAT SATURDAY

A fire in deep peat topped woodland near the shore, fronting the Summerside Golf and Country Club, on Saturday posed a serious threat to the area because of a prevailing high wind. Responding to a call for assistance, the Fire Department from RCAF Station Summerside sent

a pumper truck and a crew of men whose most determined efforts were unable to cope with the fire which smouldered and burned underground to more than a foot in depth. Later in the afternoon a bulldozer from Summerside was taken to the scene and the fire area,

covering nearly half an acre, was cleared by the heavy machine which pushed the burning peat debris over an embankment onto the shore where the rising tide eliminated the danger to the immediate woodlands.

Sheila was the winner of a \$75.00 scholarship for the student in the area making the highest marks and planning to take up Grade 11 work. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Caseley, Kelvin Grove, and her marks totaled 683 out of a possible 800. Only 14 when the exams were written, Sheila had entered Kensington High School after completing Grade 8 in Kelvin Grove, and took grades 9 and 10 in one year. Her teacher was Mr. J. Weeks Murphy. She intends to take Grade 11 in Kensington.

Joyce, who received a \$50.00 scholarship, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hillard Meek, Spring Brook, and her marks totaled 655. She is only 15, and took her grade 10 work in Spring Brook School. Her teacher was Mrs. Wanda Cousins of Bonshaw. She plans to take Grade 11 at Kensington High School.

Mrs. Campbell spoke briefly, congratulating the girls and giving a brief resume of the scholarship which was established in 1955. are very happy that they have been won by students from other schools this year." The girls each responded suitably and gracefully. Mr. J. Catches of lobsters on the South Shore dropped sharply in the last ten days, to about 200 lbs. per boat in the West Prince area.

First landings following the opening of the fall season on Aug. 10 reached near record proportions. A West Point boat operated by Mr. B. MacDonald brought in 2,400 lbs. on his first trip overhauled after running out his lines. Several boats at the Brae landed between 1,400 and 1,750 lbs.

Following the decrease in the catch most fishermen go out every second day. The total catch for the season is expected to be away down from last year.

Prices are reported to be 32 cents for markets and 27 for canners.
