IMMUNIZATION CLINICS

FOR INOCULATIONS and SMALLPOX VACCINATION

WILL BE HELD IN ALL RURAL SCHOOLS THIS SPRING

Keep in touch with the teacher or Secretary of Trustees for the date of the first clinic.

Protect young children against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus. Start the inoculations at 3 months of age.

Four inoculations are necessary the first year—three in the Spring and one in the Fall—then a reinforcing dose at regular intervals.

Vaccination against smallpox is required for attendance at school. Have the children vaccinated before one year of age.

REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS

Within the Registration District of Prince Edward Island fifty-five (55) Registration Centres have been established and Deputy Registrars have been appointed as follows:

The following REGULATIONS have been approved:—

RE BIRTHS

The above list includes all the Hospitals in the Province and all births therein will in future be recorded by the Deputy Registrar on the Hospital Staff. Births occurring other than in a Hospital must be recorded at the nearest Registration Centre within thirty days of the birth.

RE DEATHS

No burial shall be made unless the funeral director or acting funeral director has obtained a Burial or Transportation Permit from one of the above named Deputy Registrars.

All deaths must be recorded immediately with the Deputy Registrar from whom the Burial or Transportation Permit was obtained.
