committee, made it clear that their position does not imply approval of contraception or of all methods of regulating births. But they said the law, which makes it a criminal offence to advertise or sell contraceptive devices, is inadequate because it fails to meet all four criteria that should be fulfilled before a statutory crime punishable by law.

These conditions are:—The wrongful act notably injures the public good. —The law forbidding the act should be capable of enforcement. —The law should be equitable so its burden doesn't fall on one group in society. —The forbidding law should not give rise to evils greater than those it is designed to suppress.

NOT ENFORCED
"The law is not in fact enforced and the good of public peace might well be lost by attempts to enforce it," the brief said.

"A large number of our fellow citizens believe that this law violates their rights to be informed and helped towards responsible parenthood in accordance with their personal beliefs." The Commons committee has been studying four private members' bills that would amend the Criminal Code. Two

would remove the clause on contraceptives while the other two would exempt doctors, nurses, social workers and family planning organizations from the law's provisions.

Dr. Harry Harley (L.—Halton), committee chairman, said, "In view of the bishops' brief conclusions the hearings, a recommendation to the Commons is expected by the end of this month."

At the same time as their brief was made public, the bishops issued a statement to Canadian Roman Catholics stating that the distinction between civil law and moral law "can hardly be over-emphasized."

NOT A MORAL QUESTION
"The question that may come before Parliament is not whether the use of contraceptives is morally right or morally wrong. It is not up to Parliament to decide such a question. The real question—and this is the business of Parliament—centres on whether or not in view of the common good the law of the land should make the sale or distribution of contraceptives or giving information about regulation of births a crime punishable by law."

J. M. Forrestal (PC—Halifax), a Roman Catholic, said the statement was a "long-awaited and much-needed guideline." As a legislator he would be greatly perplexed by the

Big Advantage For China Is Presented In Viet Nam

EDMONTON (CP)—China has a "great advantage over both the Soviet Union and the United States" in deciding the future of Viet Nam, Canadian diplomat Chester Ronning said here.

Delivering the 1966 Henry Marshall Tory lecture at the University of Alberta in memory of the university's first president, the 71-year-old peace envoy to North Viet Nam said: "China today defies both the United States and the Soviet Union. The power struggle is stronger in a setting of nation against nation than any common bond of ideology is in holding them together. The concept of a simple division of the globe into a free world and a Communist world is no longer tenable."

In considering the future of Viet Nam "we are forced to focus our attention on Peking because... Viet Nam is contiguous to China."

The Viet Nam war is basically a ground war and China is a land power with "the greatest manpower resources on earth."

CHINA WOULD WIN
"No other country can win a war restricted to the ground in Viet Nam if China becomes involved. The only logical alterna-

tive to continuing the war then would be to escalate the ground war in Viet Nam by the use of nuclear weapons."

Mr. Ronning, who was born in China, said former president Eisenhower "did not help to allay fears when he said a few days ago that he would not preclude the use of nuclear bombs, if necessary."

Mr. Ronning said it sometimes is argued in Canada that it is not necessary to have diplomatic relations with China to deal effectively with Peking. "Our extensive wheat sales are quoted as convincing evidence."

But wheat sales have been possible because Canada has been accepted in China as a country with no axe to grind in Asia and because China needed wheat to replace rice which could be more readily sold for foreign exchange.

CAN EXCHANGE QUICKLY

"That situation could, however, be upset very quickly if Canada as a middle power fails to accept its share of responsibility in maintaining stability in Asia, which is possible only by establishing the diplomatic relations which enables Canada to preserve the ability to deal ef-

fectively with important nations."

Commission of which Canada is a member. Text of his address was released before delivery.

Mr. Ronning said Canada must grab at the chance through its good trade relations with China to "establish diplomatic relations because through such relations we could at least discuss the issues in Southeast Asia with the leaders in Peking."

TO CLAIM THAT PEKING CAUSED THE war in Viet Nam "is to ignore completely the whole history of the revolution led by Ho Chi-minh against the French and Japanese and the traditional relations between Viet Nam and China."

Peking is not engaged in the war and, therefore, is not an aggressor. While his visits to Hanoi were "by no means conducive to optimism," Mr. Ronning said both sides want the continued presence of the International Control

Commission of which Canada is a member. Text of his address was released before delivery.

NO MAGIC IN EXERCISE

TORONTO (CP)—Physical exercise is no fountain of youth, says Dr. Nathan Shock, a Baltimore gerontologist. He told a symposium here there is no evidence that physical exercise either prolongs life or slows down the rate of aging. He said studies indicate that older people who "don't fold up and resign themselves to a rocking chair" function better both before and after retirement. But simple walking gives most people all the exercise they need.
