NEWS NOTES.

Archibald Forbes begins his second
lecture tour in Canada, on the 15th of
October.
The land telegraph line on Anticosti,
200 miles long, has been completed, and
is now in operation.

The Indian depredations in New
Mexico still continue unchecked. The
authorities seem powerless to prevent
them.

A foreign correspondent states that
Prince Bismarck has written to Mrs.
Garfield an autograph letter in which he
begs her to accept his heartfelt sympathy
and best wishes for her husband's recov-
ery. The German Chancellor, it is
known, has always had a strong partiality
for Americans, especially since his stu-
dent days, when he became the firm
friend of the late Mr. Motley.

An English writer complains that his
countrymen are ill-prepared for the hot
weather which has been making London
uncomfortable. He believes that the
warmth might be enjoyable if people
lived in houses constructed to keep them
warm in winter and cool in summer, and
if they could be induced to put on cloth-
ing adapted to summer heat. Moreover,
it is a sad fact that, even while the mer-
cury stands amid the nineties, Eng-
lishmen stick to their beef, mutton and
heavy puddings, and to their ponderous
porter and stout.

A manly little fellow of five years fell
and cut his upper lip so badly that a
surgeon had to be summoned to sew up the
wound. He sat in his mother's during
the painful operation, pale, but very
quiet, resolutely keeping back his tears
and moans. In her distress the young
mother could not refrain from saying,

tone, "Never mind, mamma, my mustache
will cover it."

The London World says:—Baroness

ber, and intend passing several months
in the United States and Canada, return-
ing to England in March. I shall be
curious to see what the reception of Mr.
W. L. A. B. C. B. C., who was natural-
ized an Englishman only a few months
ago, will be in the country to which he
once owed allegiance. I should fancy
that it would be rather a success de curi-
osité than a succès d'estime. The fair
bride is, however, sure of a good recep-
tion, on account of her name having so
long been associated with charity.

The Girl Question.
Do we need more young women in
Canada? Some of the good people of
England, like Lord Shaftesbury and Miss
Rye, are giving a practical answer in
the affirmative by collecting the surplus
girls of England, Scotland and Ireland
to send out to Canada; but we fancy that
many a wistful maiden in Toronto, who
is anxiously but vainly waiting for some
one to propose, will reply with an em-
phatic No! Probably the truth in this,
as in most other cases, lies between.
The cities are overcrowded in many re-
spects, and they are overcrowded with
marriageable, but unmarried, young
women; while in the newer sections of
the country, notably in Manitoba and the
Northwest, the cry of the hardy pioneers
is for wives. The inference is obvious:
before bringing out more old country
girls, let us wait till our own are pro-
vided for; and let our own girls apply
the lesson of the situation by making hay
and getting husbands while the sun
shines.—Toronto World.

One cannot help feeling sorry for
them, for, though they are themselves to
blame, they are such as their fathers
have made them. The class of young
men which is so common in Charlotte-
town, which includes most of our clerks,
most of our younger Government offi-
cials, most of our students of law and
medicine, most of our young tradesmen,
and most of our apprentices, has not
grown up spontaneously and in the last
few years alone. Education had been
neglected, domestic sanctity and home
influence have been neglected; above all,
religious activity and the necessity of
following up religious teaching had been
neglected. No public provision was ever
made against the temptation to which
young men are subjected. No means of
general culture were provided, which
would meet the requirements of a new
generation. In nearly all American and
Canadian cities of the same size there
are free public libraries, there are muse-
ums, picture-galleries, respectable clubs
for all sorts of purposes and many other
means of keeping young men from the
vulgarity and vice of street corners.
Here, we have nothing of that kind. Our
children go on the streets almost as soon
as they can walk; they expend their
boyhood there and their early manhood
there, and they grow old there. Only
those who have heard it can form any
idea of the vileness of the small-talk
that forms the ordinary conversation of
Charlottetown young men (and many
old men, too) among themselves, and
what the pleasures of our young town-
men are we can gather from their lan-
guage.

It is time now that places of popular
amusement and instruction were provid-
ed, to counteract the dreadful influen-
ces of the street. One cannot, of course,
force to go right those who are bound to
go wrong, but one can assist those who
would go right if they were led. At
present one feels that the only safe course
for a young man not extraordinarily
strong-minded is to go away from Char-
lottetown to some place where he can, if
he wishes, have companions who will not
be indifferent to good and evil, and
where he will have greater helps to self-
improvement. It is a terrible thing that
this is so; but unless some speedy means
are taken to excite and direct the ener-
gies of our young people the result must
be even worse than the social deadness
that now exists.
