BOERS FORCING THE FIGHT

ROBERTS IS CONCENTRATING AROUND BLOEMFONTEIN

Decisive Battle Within the Orange Free State.

Ninety-one British Prisoners Rescued on Sunday

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

FORCING THE FIGHT.

LONDON, April 5.—Lord Roberts is concentrating his troops around Bloemfontein, and the big naval guns have been mounted upon kopjes commanding the approaches of the Free State capital.

These are the tidings which the latest news bring, and there appears to be one interpretation, namely, that the Boers are advancing with the intention of attempting to make good Kruger's statement that he would retake Bloemfontein before many weeks.

With the exception of the Seventh division which holds the Kameel siding and the kopjes near there and along the railway to the south, Lord Roberts has all his division close to Bloemfontein.

The Boers seem to have adopted the plan of assailing the British communications, and a commando is reported as operating in the neighborhood of Springfontein, with this intention. General Gatacre who has a comparatively small force will have to repel this move or else the commander-in-chief will find his communications gone.

The report that a new force of 6,000 Boers is approaching Bloemfontein from the north, adds further weight to the supposition that the Boers intend to attack instead of waiting to be attacked.

PREPARATIONS.

LONDON, April 5.—This despatch from its special correspondent is published by the Daily Telegraph:

BLOEMFONTEIN, April 3.—The Boers are advancing in a guarded manner from the east, and our troops are slowly retiring. The enemy has appeared before Bushman's Kop which was held by the cavalry and mounted infantry. Our men were ordered to retire and the Twelfth Lancers were sent to assist the movement.

The head of General Clement's column has arrived. The Imperial Yeomanry are being sent forward.

The Boers now declare that they intend fighting the decisive battle of the war within the Orange Free State.

Broadwood's column lost the whole of their kit.

It must be remembered that the cavalry are numerically weak. Remounts were arriving hourly, on Saturday and Sunday.

MAFeking's REPORT.

LONDON, April 5.—A despatch announces that Mafeking was still besieged, but safe, March 27th.

BRILLIANT FEAT.

LONDON, April 5.—The Daily Mail has the following from Bloemfontein, dated April 3rd:

"Colonel Porter, with ninety Carbineers and Scots Greys and two guns performed a brilliant deed on Sunday. He charged a large body of Boers and rescued 91 British prisoners, including 11 officers who were captured previously. There were no casualties on the British side."

PRINCE OF WALES' NARROW ESCAPE.

Two Shots Fired at Him

BY A YOUNG ANARCHIST WHO WAS CAPTURED

Who Blamed Him for the Slaughter in South Africa

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

BRUSSELS, April 5.—The would-be assassin of the Prince of Wales is a tinsmith, named Shiddo. He is a resident of Brussels, aged 16. His pockets were found to be full of anarchistic literature. He said that he wanted to kill the Prince of Wales because he had caused thousands of men to be slaughtered in South Africa. He fired two shots. Neither hit. He was knocked down as he was preparing to fire another shot and was arrested. The Prince had a very narrow escape.

The Brussels press condemns the attempt, and general indignation prevails. The news was immediately telegraphed to Queen Victoria in Ireland.

Bait Freezers

OTTAWA, April 5.—Sir Louis Davies told Mr. Macdonald, King's, yesterday, that repairs were being made to St. Peter's harbor breakwater, at a cost of \$500.

He also stated in reply to Mr. Martin, that arrangements had been made by the Department of Fisheries for the establishment of bait freezers. Fourteen associations of fishermen had been formed and two would be ready next summer.

THE PASS CASE.—Mr. John Ramsay, J. P., has given judgment in a trespass case instituted by Mr. A. E. Holland, St. Eleanors, Mr. Holland recently purchased Little Curtain Island, in Richmond Bay, Mr. Stanley Compton, St. Eleanors, having, by agreement with the previous owners, certain shooting privileges for a term of years. A few days ago Mr. Compton, with three others, went to the island and made preparations for the shooting season, upon which Mr. Holland took action against the three for trespass. Mr. Compton claimed that he could take them with him and that the island was not an enclosed field, and that consequently there was no trespass. Mr. Ramsay, in his judgment, treated the island as an enclosed field, and held that Compton had no right to take others on it with him to shoot or hunt. He imposed upon each defendant a fine of ten cents and costs or ten days' imprisonment. The case is still open, as Mr. McQuarrie, for defendant, will appeal. Mr. K. J. Martin appeared for the plaintiff.

Spontaneous Exhibition of Loyalty

NUMBERS OF IRISH NOBILITY IN DUBLIN

Warmth of the Queen's Welcome Gratefully Acknowledged in England

DUBLIN, April 5.—The Duke of Abercorn thus described yesterday's reception of the Queen:

"It is the most wonderful, chivalrous, and spontaneous exhibition I have ever seen, and I am immensely proud of being an Irishman. The demonstrations show that despite all political differences, Ireland is a loyal portion of the Empire."

These sentiments are echoed by all the Irish nobility who are gathered in Dublin in numbers never seen before.

LONDON, April 5.—Special despatches to the papers of this city, giving descriptions of Queen Victoria's reception in Dublin, fail to record the slightest jarring note.

All gratefully acknowledged the remarkable warmth of the welcome extended to Her Majesty.
