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The Barkentine Ethel Blanche Abandoned.

By telegraph to Peake Bros. & Co., we learn that the barkentine Ethel Blanche was abandoned on the Banks of Newfoundland. Capt. Graham and her crew of nine men were landed at North Sydney, yesterday. The barkentine, while off the east of Newfoundland, struck an iceberg and her captain and crew were obliged to leave her. The Ethel Blanche was bound from this port to Liverpool, G. B., with a cargo of lumber, deals and oats. She sailed from this port on the 28th of May, and was, on arrival, to go on the berth at Liverpool to take goods to this port.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

General Gordon.

LONDON, June 12. In a recent message to General Gordon, Earl Granville says that, inasmuch as the original plan of evacuating the Soudan has been dropped, General Gordon should consider measures for removing himself and faithful Egyptians with him from their present position. The foreign secretary authorizes Gen. Gordon to expend whatever money is necessary for this purpose.

Shot Dead.

LONDON, Ont., June 12. Cosse, a detective, while attempting to arrest a burglar in a house of ill-fame at Ovilvia, accidentally shot David Hamilton dead while attempting to intimidate the inmates of the house, who were making an attack on him, his revolver went off accidentally. Cosse has given himself up to the authorities. A good deal of excitement prevails in the usually quiet town of Ovilvia.

The Fall of Berber.

CAIRO, June 12. The Government has received news of the fall of Berber. The garrison fought with great heroism until their ammunition was exhausted. The rebels then charged overwhelming numbers and massacred the soldiers and nearly all of the citizens of Berber. Hussein Pasha Hhaliifa, the Governor, was badly wounded, and is now a prisoner.

The Berber Massacres.

LONDON, June 12. The Times last night received a despatch from its correspondent at Mady Halfa. According to this Berber, surrendered twelve days ago, and reports of the massacre, that had already been received in London, were true. Egyptian correspondence of the Government has been made public.

The Hatch Failure.

NEW YORK, June 12. Hatch, of the firm of Hatch & Foote, to-day offers the following terms of settlement with their creditors: Twenty-five per cent in cash, fifty per cent in securities, which are worth their par value, and twenty-five per cent in notes of the firm after they have resumed.

\$400,000 Fire in Boston.

BOSTON, June 12. Shortly after one o'clock to-day an alarm of fire was rung, and before the fire could be got under control \$400,000 worth of property was destroyed. By the explosion of some naphtha, several men were badly injured.

Extensive Fire in Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG, June 12. Fire broke out here this morning, and destroyed the Lacrosse hotel, Mr. McGregor's fruit store and Emes' livery stable. The loss is estimated at \$35,000.

Arabs on the March.

CAIRO, June 12. It is stated that 30,000 Arabs have started for Dongola, determined on capturing that place.

THE SHORT LINE.—An Ottawa despatch says: Mr. Vernon Smith, C. E., who has charge of one of the surveying parties on the proposed route of the Short Line to Halifax, has returned to the city to consult with Mr. Collingwood Schreiber, the Chief Engineer of the Government Railways. He has associated with him Mr. D. Brown, C. E., of St. Stephens. He reports a feasible and straight line between Canterbury and North of Moose Head Lake, a distance of 130 miles. One of the advantages offered by this route would, he says, be its important connection at both ends with systems in operation.

THE famous old equestrian statue of the Duke of Wellington, which has for so many years surmounted the arch at Hyde Park corner in London, was taken down a year or two ago and is to be removed to Aldershot. On the examination of the head and hat of the statue a bird's nest of twigs, evidently built by a starling, was discovered. The nest had been built on the crown of the Duke's head, and entrance to it was effected from under the ends of the great plume at the point of the hat. The nest was allowed to remain. The dimensions of the hat are 4 feet long by 1 1/2 feet high, the plume measuring 3 feet across, and the head and hat weighing about half a ton.

THE Dublin Freeman's Journal says Chas. Bradlaugh wrote a letter to the Prince of Wales as a brother mason, asking the Prince's support to atheistical propaganda, which he said it was the duty of the English and continental Masons to provide. The Prince of Wales was greatly annoyed at the letter and sent it to Lord Carnarvon. It is believed Lord Carnarvon will move in Grand Lodge for the expulsion of Bradlaugh. Should Bradlaugh be expelled, the other Atheists will secede from Freemasonry.

ROYAL CANADIAN ASSOCIATION.—Mayor Grant is now in receipt of a proposition from the Royal Canadian Art Association, which recently held an exhibition at Toronto, to come to St. John, providing proper arrangements can be made. If this is accomplished, the Association may be expected to hold an exhibition in this city about the 10th of July.—St. John Telegraph.

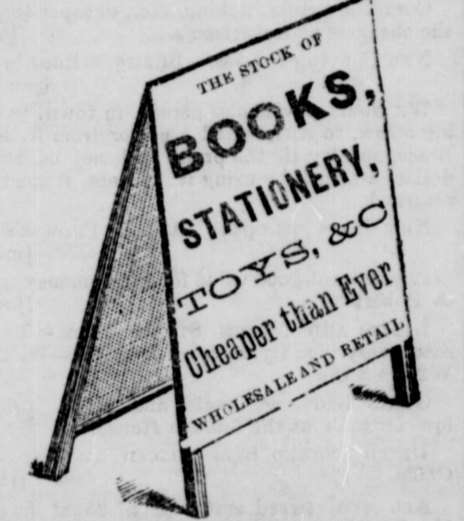
