War in The Transvaal

Particulars of the Struggle in South Africa.

The guard against misfits, the English army clothing stores make the uniforms in no less than 36 different sizes so if Tommy does not get a smart fit it is not their fault. The stores at present employ over 1,600 women making khaki uniforms. Khaki is a dyed cotton, but what it is dyed with the government officials themselves do not know. The firm that discovered it keeps the secret very much to itself, and so do several other firms who succeeded in getting at the idea. There is imitation khaki, but the color is not a "fast" one.

A private soldier with Lord Methuen's force writes to his parents in Llanely: "You can't believe how happy I was fighting against the Boers. I felt as if I were in a football match. There was an officer a yard away from me who was shot right through the back. He then got up and galloped towards the Boers, killing three of them, after which he rode back to us and lay down, and he had to be carried to the ambulance. Don't trouble about me, because I am a lot happier out here on active service than I was in barracks in England. We do get some sport here—chasing Boers."

They tell a characteristic story of Lord Methuen. It seem that a "new chum" had joined his irregular horse. A younger son of a noble family, this young fellow had been sent to the colonies to get rid of his wildness, or to increase it, as the case might be. He had not long joined the irregular horse before he was sent up to Lord Methuen for some gross breach of discipline. Not knowing before whom he had been taken, the youngster resented and said to Lord Methuen: "Do you know who I am? I am Lord—"

There was silence for quite a minute, and then came the answer: "Let me introduce myself. Paul Sanford Methuen sentences you to twenty-one days' confinement to barracks for breach of discipline."

The younger son of the noble family wore a crestfallen look for once in his life as he went back.

A member of the Special Border Police, who has lived in Zululand for 20 years, writes from Nougoma:—"We seem to be getting it rather hot. As usual, only half prepared! My neighbours over the border have been nearly all killed at the Glencoe fight. The field cornet, who lived about ten miles from me, was killed there with his two sons and a son-in-law. All the Boers who lived within a radius of 12 miles from me were all killed, except about six. This was done, I hear, by the 10th Hussars, but I see nothing of it in the papers. More Boers are dead than we shall ever hear of. All the Vryheid district Boers have gone to Ladysmith, and if we can only beat them there I think the Vryheid Zulus will rise, and if they do, then pity the Boers!"

A tragic incident is described in a letter which a Wakefield lady has received from her soldier son. He says: "I was in company with a sergeant in charge of some wounded Boer prisoners. One of these was lying on a stretcher, and was being carried in when he whipped out a revolver and aimed at an officer near. The sergeant was carrying his gun on his shoulder with the barrel in front of him. He quickly dashed the revolver out of the Boer's hand, clubbed his own rifle as he would a striking hammer, and dashed the prisoner's brains out where he lay. The captain did not see what the prisoner had done, so ordered the sergeant's arrest. A comrade slipped out of the marching line, and asked to

be excused, saying he thought the sergeant's circumstances needed some explanation, and told the captain how things stood. The captain gave the order for the sergeant's release congratulating him and thanking him for saving his life."

The London Outlook says: "General Gatacre, we have been told this week, habitually overworks his men. He certainly does believe in work, and plenty of it. Mr. H. C. Thompson, tells us in his narrative of the Chitral Campaign that General Gatacre there kept the men always roadmaking if they were not actually marching. They naturally grumbled a little, but the splendid condition they were in when they reached Chitral was a sufficient justification of the general's belief that if men are allowed to be idle during the intervals of marching they become ill. And what General Gatacre preached he practised. In that Chitral campaign he worked harder than anyone else. He had, Mr. Thompson narrates, no tent, only a waterproof sheet, like the rest of the men, and shared with them equally all the exposure and fatigue of the march. His energy was inexhaustible, and he allowed no detail to escape him, for though he made the men work he was careful of their comfort in many ways. He saw that they had fresh instead of tinned meat whenever it was possible to obtain it, and always tried to arrange for it to be cooked at the time when it was to be eaten, so that they might have it hot with all its juice. 'Moltke' remarks Mr. Thompson, 'said that the first part of an army to wear its feet, but it is a question whether its stomach is not quite as vulnerable.'"

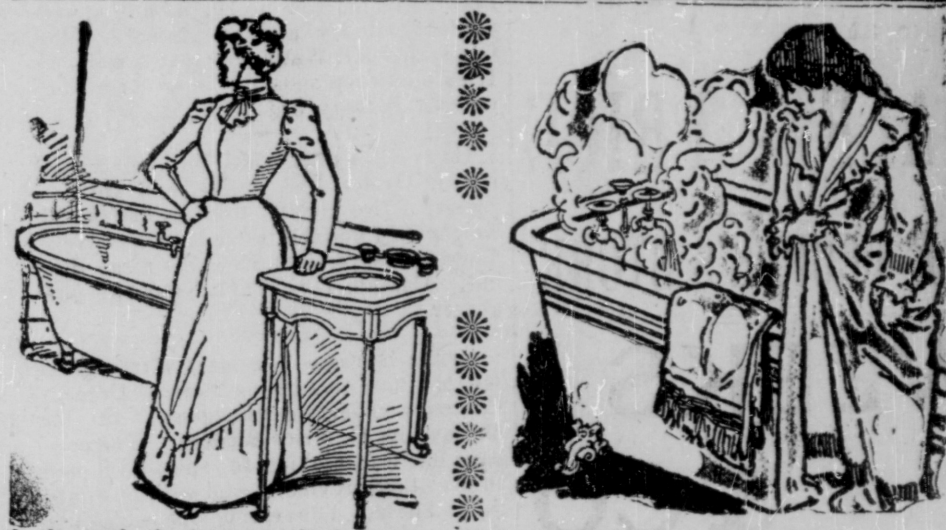

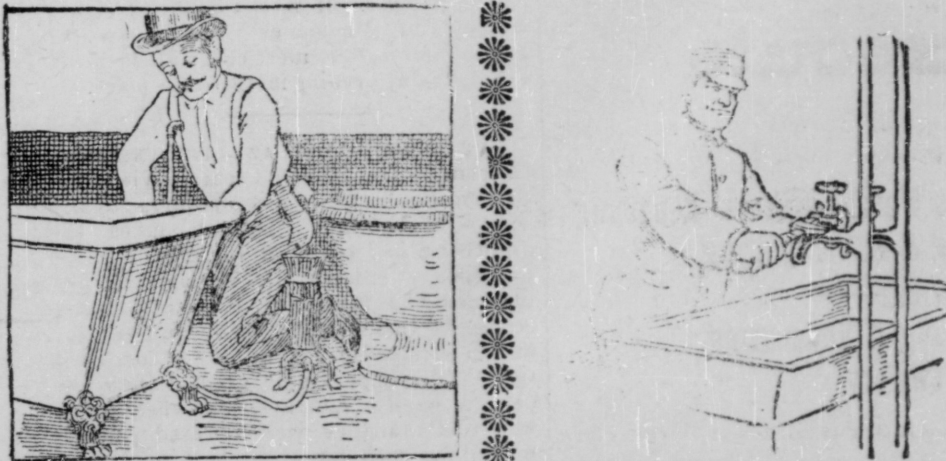
