Dr. J.P. Sweeney Honored By Medical Association

High tribute was paid Dr. J. P. Sweeney by his medical colleagues here yesterday afternoon when he was presented by them for Senior Membership in the Canadian Medical Association at a luncheon at the P.E.I. Hospital.

The luncheon was part of the program of the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Medical Association at Montgomery Hall.

Just prior to the presentation the medical gathering was told, "John Patrick Sweeney was born at Cape Traverse, P.E.I., just before the twentieth century began. Public school and St. Dunstan's University fitted him for medicine; and he received a bachelor of medicine degree from Queen's University in 1916.

Following a short practice in Newfoundland, Dr. Sweeney proceeded overseas with the Canadian Army Medical Corps and served as medical officer until 1920 when he was awarded M.D. by his alma mater.

"The lure of the west took Dr. Sweeney to Alberta where he spent the next 10 years practicing at Drumheller, only coming east for the occasion of postgraduate studies at the Cleveland Clinic and at New York Graduate Hospital.

TO BERMUDA
"Opportunity again beckoned and Dr. Sweeney proceeded to Bermuda where he combined private practice with the duties of deputy director of health from 1932 to 1939. The lure of his native Prince Edward Island proved too strong and following a visit in 1939, Dr. Sweeney decided to return to his native province where he has practised in Charlottetown ever since.

"Only those who know him intimately appreciate the personality that has endeared Dr. Sweeney to his patients. Kindness, patience, sympathy — he has so often astounded his colleagues by the example of the physician's art that he has exhibited at the bedside.

"In his late years he has spent most of his work caring for the aged infirm. As the attending physician at one of the provincial homes for the aged he has brought to this institution a standard of devotion and of skilled care and medical service seldom attained in government institutions of this kind.

"In partial retirement, Dr. Sweeney lives with his books in an idyllic retreat he has built overlooking one of the most beautiful valleys in his native Prince Edward Island. Here he plays at farming, here he entertains his friends with a geniality that has ripened his charm year by year. He is a widower and has two sons."

meeting, correspondence was read from CMHC officials in Halifax stating that they had met recently with Hon. Leo Rossiter, minister of municipal affairs; Eugene Gorman, deputy minister; C. G. Smith, director of town planning and W. Megison, chairman of the Prince Edward Island Housing Commission.

At this meeting, a number of points were raised on the possible types of assistance which may be applicable to housing requirements in Georgetown.

However, before any decisions can be reached it would be necessary to meet again with government officials after they have had time to review points raised at the meeting.

The council also considered an application from the Prince Edward Island Industrial Corporation for easement rights to certain areas, relative to the installing of the Atlantic Development Board water and sewage system.

Parcels one, two and three, granting easement rights, have already been signed by the town and application is now made for parcels four, five and six.

BUILDING PERMITS
Applications for building permits were approved from the following five applicants: Walter Soloman to build a new house; Milford Glory to build a new house; Edward Easton to build an addition to his museum; J. D. Blackett and Mrs. Marjorie MacDonald, both to construct small additional buildings on their properties.

Council made application for the physical fitness grant of \$300. It was decided that those holding the agreement on the rink building would be notified that as they had broken their contract by nonpayment of monthly rent and also of not taking care of the building properly, council was terminating the agreement. It was stated that they would be notified by the clerk and by an attorney as to the amount of money they owe the town under the terms of the agreement.

New Responsibilities Seen For Christians

VANCOUVER (CP) — Christians have new responsibilities in an increasingly secular world, the primate of the Anglican Church of Canada said Wednesday.

Most Rev. Howard H. Clark said gradually the customs, symbols, institutions and laws which once supported society and moulded it in the likeness of a Christian society are disappearing "or else they linger as quaint relics."

"It is significant that when Canada got a new flag there was no cross upon it," he said in his presidential address at the opening session of the 22nd general synod of the Anglican Church, at University of British Columbia.

"In a secular society a man's goodness and his faith are his own autonomous choice and this, they say, is as it should be. "Is it a decline in morality or a secular society's refusal to judge which has reduced men's fear to be known as adulterers and which could possibly make other men no longer afraid of being known for homosexual tendencies?"

"Is it a decline in morality or a respect for man's moral autonomy which makes censorship increasingly unpopular?"

DEPEND ON CUSTOM
Archbishop Clark said the secular society is hard on people. "We depend more than we realize, in our moral struggles, on the support of custom, myths and rituals.

"It is a real question whether society can permanently get along without them. Nor is it surprising at a time when these social supports are disappearing, that the use of tranquilliz-

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Queens County Plowing Match Set For Sept. 4

The Queens County plowing match will be held this year on the farm of James Robertson, Alexandria, Saturday, Sept. 4, it has been learned from Sterling Moore, secretary of the county match association.

Competitions include matches for beginners, Junior Farmers, three-soil tractors plow boys and girls 16 years and under, mounted plows and the Perfection special which is plowed at practical field speed.

Feature of the match will be the county championship tractor or class. Two or three-soil plows are eligible.

The match will be judged by David Peacock, provincial department of agriculture, who will be assisted by Raynall MacNeill, Mt. Royal, O'Leary RR.

The president of the Queens County association this year is Arthur Jones, Pownal.

Associated with the organization in the match is the Alexandra Calf Club which will be holding its achievement day.

Plants Free From Blight

Experimental Farm research officers L. C. Calbeck and F. M. Cannon said today there is still no sign of late blight in the province's potato fields.

"The recent rains have provided moisture conditions necessary for the development of the disease fungus but, on the other hand, the lower temperatures that have prevailed during the past few days will have the reverse effect. There is only a slight possibility that blight will appear anywhere in the region in August. The month is likely to remain disease free."

"The aphid population is just over the peak at the present time. The numbers should gradually decrease during the next week or so. Other species of potato insects should not be a problem for the remainder of the season," the bulletin concludes.
