SUPREME COURT.—The Michaelmas term of the Supreme Court met to-day. The three Judges were on the bench. The docket consists of some six or eight cases and special papers.

TRADE OF MONCTON.—Moncton's imports last month amounted in value to \$69,667 as compared with \$88,417 in October, 1889. The exports decreased from \$35,025 to \$28,745, while customs collections increased from \$24,801.22 to \$41,181.61.

FOOTBALL.—The match between the Abegweit and the team from the Duke of Wellington's regiment takes place on Victoria Park this afternoon.

The Wanderers and Navy played a game of football at Halifax on Saturday afternoon. The blue jackets had an easy victory by two tries to nothing for the Haligonians.

DIPHTHERIA IN HALIFAX.—At a meeting of the Halifax school board the other night, the supervisor stated that fully 30 per cent. of the work of the teachers had been wasted through the prevalence of diphtheria, by the non-attendance of pupils and the demoralization of those who did attend, and that \$15,000 paid in salaries, had been practically thrown away.

POLICE COURT.—This morning, Mary McMillan was fined \$100 or two months imprisonment for a second violation of the Scott Act, and Alex. L. Howatt was fined \$50 or one month for a first violation of the same act. Three other Scott Act cases were dismissed and one adjourned. George Brown for the larceny of a small sum of money from a store on Water Street, was sentenced to six months imprisonment with hard labor; and Hugh Brown, a brother of George, charged with being implicated in the crime, was discharged, there being no evidence against him.

THE HOME MARKET.—Halifax is importing beef and poultry from Ontario. Says Friday's Recorder: Jas. A. Leaman & Co., who have done a large business with Ontario cattle dealers and butchers, have had a slaughter house erected at Guelph, Ont., where they will do their own killing. They have a first-class man engaged to look after the same, as well as to purchase stock. The house is built alongside the railway track, thus affording great convenience in shipping. They now have over 100 head of cattle on the farm, and intend to make direct shipments weekly. Mr. Leaman, who is at present in Guelph, is personally superintending the first shipment, made to-day, consisting of beef and poultry, including a large number of turkeys.

A CORRECTION.—The Hants, N. S. Journal says: A statement utterly without foundation, has for the past fortnight been going the rounds of the provincial press to the effect that Bishop Courtney had received equivalent to an invitation to become assistant-bishop of New York, and that he had the subject under consideration. The Journal has excellent authority for saying that, as a point of fact, no such offer has been made, nor has the worthy bishop any idea of severing his present connection with our province. It is to be hoped that the papers which have circulated the statement broadcast, will take an early opportunity of correcting it.

SOBS OF TEMPERANCE.—From Grand Secretary Burns' report, submitted at the recent session of the Grand Division, we glean the following statistics: Number admitted during the quarter ended 30th Sept. 1890, 184; reinstated, 9; withdrawn, 129; suspended, 46; violated pledge, 19; expelled for violating pledge, 6; for other causes, 42; deaths, 3; number of members reported, 1,853; per capita tax to Grand Division, \$69.28; receipts from subordinate divisions, \$157.18; cash on hand and invested, \$641.32; divisions on the roll, 52. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Nov. 3. The Minister of Finance leaves to-morrow for the West Indies via New York.

During his absence he will visit Bermuda, the principal Leeward and Windward Islands, British Guiana, Jamaica, Cuba, Hayti; and the Bahamas, and make himself thoroughly acquainted with the trade connections of the Islands with a view to encouraging increased commerce with Canada.

Mr. Foster expects to return before Christmas. A telegram from Montreal to-day states that cablegrams received have so disarranged the plans of the visiting iron masters that the trip to the Maritime Provinces is abandoned.

Petitions from England with 1100 signatures were received to-day asking the commutation of Birchall's sentence.

In reference to the item in the Canadian Gazette, intimating that the Canadian Government intend introducing a measure to reduce the letter postage from three to two cents, a Cabinet Minister is authority for the statement that the rumor is entirely premature, the Council not having yet even considered the matter.

A Basis of Settlement Suggested.

PARIS, Nov. 3. In an interview to-day in regard to the dispute between France and Great Britain, concerning the Newfoundland fisheries, DeLonde, a member of the Chamber of Deputies, suggested as a basis of settlement of the dispute that England should pay an indemnity to the French for cod and lobster fishermen, and to recognize the right of the French fishermen on the Grand Banks to buy and sell bait in all parts of Newfoundland. It is suggested that England should give France territorial compensation in Africa in return for the surrender by France of the rights on the French shore of Newfoundland, France retaining only her privileges on the Grand Banks, which privileges are held in common by everybody.

The Collector's Action Sustained.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3. The Treasury Department have sustained the action of the Collector of Customs at Portland, Me. in refusing the application of the Berlin Mills Company for permission to import from New Brunswick into Maine without payment of duty, certain teams, wagons, etc., for temporary use in lumbering, and then return them to Canada. Similar applications from persons on different sections of the Canadian and Mexican frontiers have also been refused on the ground of lack of legal authority.

The Dock Laborers Arrangement Expires.

LONDON, Nov. 3. The arrangement which was made a year ago between the dock companies and dock laborers expires to-day. The employers fear the men will refuse to accept the new terms offered them, and go on a strike.

The executive of the Dock Laborers' Union have influenced most of the men to remain at work pending a discussion upon the co-operative scheme submitted to the union by the directors of the companies.
