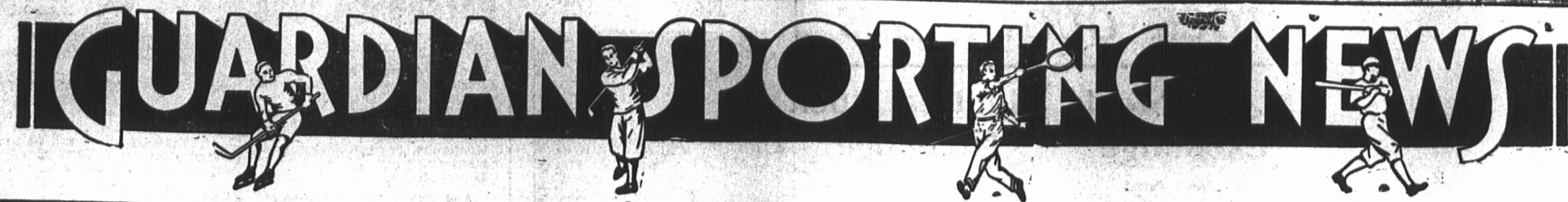


Gateways Win

FAST RACING ON OPENING DAY OF BIG MEET

Tracey Hanover Steps Mile In 2:06 In Winning 2:12 Trot And Pace

Hillside Scott Wins Three-year-old Futurity With Riot Hanover Capturing 2:22 Trot.

In a sensational opening day's racing that saw Tracy Hanover pace the second heat of the 2:12 Trot and Pace in 2:06 to come within 1-2 of a second of the track record 2:05 1-2 held by Bud Wenger, Hillside Scott, Tracy Hanover and Riot Hanover yesterday were returned winners as the four day harness racing meet of the Provincial Exhibition got under way.

On a lightning fast track and under brilliant sunshine a large colorful crowd saw some of the best and fastest racing ever to take place on the first day of a racing meet that has long been regarded as outstanding in Eastern Canada and giving the Province the deserving title "The Kentucky of Canada."

In only one race did the favorite come through and that happened in the three-year-old Futurity won by Hillside Scott, but the Scott horse only gained his victory after Little Audrey had provided the racing fans with their first thrill in the opening heat of the race after the favorite had made a jump 150 yards from the wire.

Straight Heat Victory

On good behaviour Tracy Hanover paced miles in 2:09 1-4, 2:06, and 2:07 1-4 to take a straight heat victory over a field of fast pacers. Barney Hanover was second in the first heat. Raney G. Henley provided the opposition to the flying Tracy Hanover in the last two heats after finishing sixth in the first heat of the race.

Riot Hanover had too much push for the field in the 2:22 Trot and Pace. The second straight heat victory of the day. The racing was of the highest class in the history of the meet. From the time Irvine O'Neil, driver of Mars Hill, Maine, sent his first field away the crowd saw a minimum of scoring take place with very few dead heats. In the last 100 yards as the fields remained in blanket formation in almost every heat right up to the top of the home stretch.

Starter Deserves Hand

Mr. Irvine was very impressive in his first appearance here as starter and many complimentary remarks were heard as the crowd filed through the exits after the final heat had been raced. Start in the 2:12 Trot and Pace was also deserving of commendation for the skillful manner in which he drove the horse, a horse that has always been troublesome to get under way.

After several years away from the game Fred Cameron well-known driver was seen up behind Star Dillon in the 2:22 Trot yesterday and received a good hand as he handled his horse capably. Another figure on a sulky yesterday that attracted lots of attention was the driver of Riot Hanover, Dannie Steele. A former Summerside boy Mr. Steele was one of the most prominent Maritime drivers up to 15 years ago and it is years prior to that that this same man who yesterday returned to the scenes of his first triumph in harness racing, the plaudits of a race crowd that lowered the Charlottetown race track record to 2:17 piloting the Summer-

side-owned horse Ada Mac. 3-Year-Old Futurity—Six starters came to the wire and they got away on the fourth score with Little Audrey grabbing the rail at the first turn from Hillside Scott and going up the back stretch dropped back to third position.
