Henry Ward Beecher - Dead.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., March 7. Rev. Henry Ward Beecher's condition at midnight remains unchanged, except that he grows weaker. His physician does not think he will survive another 24 hours.

LATER. BROOKLYN, March 8. The Rev. Henry Ward Beecher died at home in Brooklyn, at 9 a. m., this morning.

BANK FAILURE

Maritime Bank Suspended.

St. JOHN, N. B., March 7. Financial and commercial circles are to-day agitated over the suspension of the Maritime Bank which took place this morning to the surprise of everybody. It is impossible yet to obtain details.

Another Ranching Company.

MONTREAL, March 7. Mr. Chapleau, sheriff of Regina, L. A. Senecal and others have applied for a charter as the French Canadian Ranching Company, with a capital of \$100,000, the headquarters to be in Montreal.

J. B. Pelletier, beadle of Bonsecours Catholic Church, was fined to-day for forcibly ejecting Alice Lamoureux and Mary Foley from a pew.

COMMUNISTIC CELEBRATION. CINCINNATI, March 7. The institution of the Paris Commune in 1848 and 1871 was celebrated on Sunday night by Cincinnati anarchists. It was the most revolutionary gathering ever seen in the city. The speech of Mrs. Lucy E. Parsons, wife of the condemned Anarchist, was of a very inflammatory character.

OBITUARY. LONDON, March 7. The death is announced of Thomas Watson, member of Parliament for Ilkoston Division, Derbyshire. He was 64 years of age, and a Liberal and Home Ruler.

FATAL ACCIDENT. READING, Pa., March 7. One man was killed and a number wounded here to-day, by the staging of the new Market House giving way.

MURDER! LONDON, March 8. Colonel Rod, English manager of the lead mines in Corsica, has been murdered by miners.

WEATHER BULLETIN. TORONTO, March 8—10 a. m. Fresh winds shifting to southwest and west partly clearing weather, with light snow or sleet in the northern portion; not much change in temperature.

SIX HUNDRED LIVES LOST. A San Francisco special gives the following additional details regarding the wreck of the Chinese junk and terrible loss of life which was reported by the steamer Gaelic on her arrival from China. The officers of the Gaelic say the junk was a big passenger boat running from the island of Hainan to Siam. On January 11th it had reached the Soertrung coast, where it encountered a succession of heavy gales. While the wind was at its height the junk ran on a bank stretching out more than a mile from a point called Mythane. There were six hundred passengers and a crew on board. When it was found that the craft was breaking up a scene occurred whose horrors cannot be described. The excitable Mongols raised a storm of shrieks that could be heard above the gale in their fury. They trampled down even their own children. The administrator at Barkley put off in a junk to render some assistance, but the weather prevented the ship reaching the wreck. In a very short time—not many minutes it seemed—after the junk struck she went to pieces, and of the six hundred souls, six only succeeded in reaching the shore. Two customs junks are missing, one not having been heard from for nearly two months, and the other for over a month. They were manned respectively by a European and an Annamite crew.

ESCAPE OF THE HALF-BREDS. Michael Dumas, who escaped from the Northwest after the rebellion, in company with Gabriel Dumont, and is residing with his family at St. Charles, near Winnipeg, before the amnesty was granted, was living near the boundary, and afterwards rejoined his family. He gives an interesting description of the trip of Dumont and himself from Ba-touche to Fort Belknap, which occupied eleven days. They lived most of the time on the tundra they shot during the trip. They never saw a white face as they kept off the district where civilization was likely to exist. After their release by the American authorities Dumont worked for a time on a ranch at Lewiston, Montana, while Dumont maintained himself by hunting. Then came the offer to join Buffalo Bill's Wild West combination, which Dumas declined and Dumont accepted. During his separation from his family Dumas says four of his children died, while Dumont lost his wife. He did not feel inclined to say much about Riel, but thinks the cause of the half-breeds just. He thinks the government should make him some compensation for what he lost.

AN investigation into the cause of the recent disastrous floods at Morrisburg, Ont., by which \$70,000 worth of damage was done, reveals the fact that the ice which caused the water to back up was cut and floated into the narrow channels of the river by smugglers to form an ice bridge.

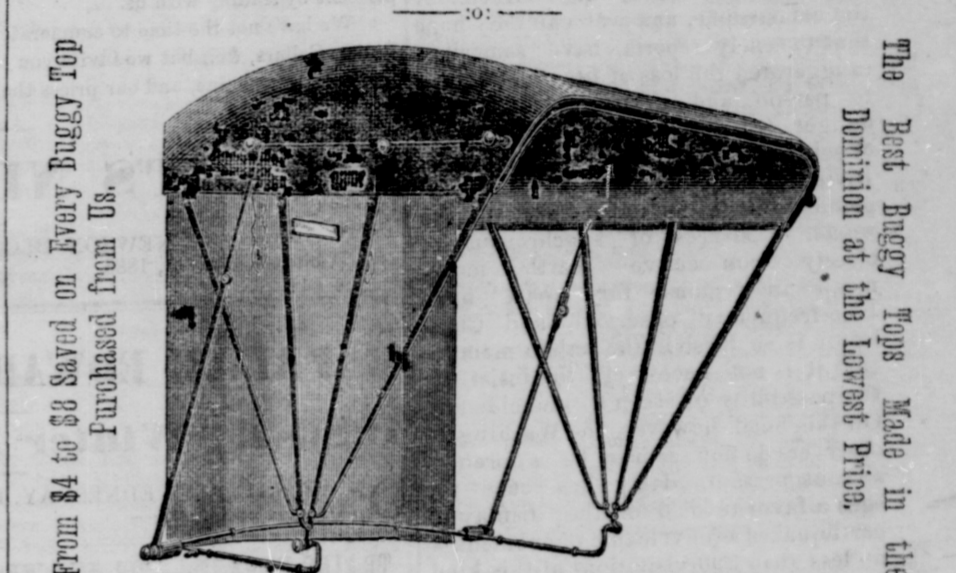
