Maritime Potato Marketing Boards To Meet Shortly

The potato marketing boards of the three Maritime Provinces will probably meet some time this week. It was announced following a meeting of the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board on Saturday.

Purpose of such a meeting would be to discuss the possibilities of the three boards working together. Place of the meeting and whether the three boards would meet together or two-Province meetings will be held has not been decided.

The Nova Scotia Potato Board has not yet been formed but officials here hope that Nova Scotia will be able to send representatives to any such meeting. The New Brunswick Board has come into existence.

Another meeting of the Prince Edward Island Board will be held next Saturday at which it is expected that a chairman will be appointed. A secretary-manager must also be appointed before the board can function.

All board members attended Saturday's meeting. The members are Messrs. A. MacNeill, O'Leary; David Wright, Lower Montague; Donald A. MacDonald, Glenfinnan; Jerome O'Brien representing the Co-operatives and Fred Bell, of Summerside, representing the dealers.

Use Unique Scheme In Clearing Land

By Merrill England HUNGRY HORSE Mont. Sept. 10 (AP) - Two California contractors are rivaling the exploits of that legendary woodsman, Paul Bunyan, with their "highball" method of clearing timber land.

Two diesel tractors grid through the dense forest, each paying out 1-1/2-inch steel cable attached to the centre of the cable loop is a 4 1-2-ton steel ball.

When up to 1,800 feet of cable has been reeled out, the machines are anchored against trees. Winches reel in the line.

The cable, held clear of stumps and other obstacles by the high ball, crashes through the timber as fast as a man can walk.

Trees caught in the cable loop are felled as if they had been hit by a hurricane.

S. L. Wixson and John Trisdale of Redding, Calif., started federal officials by offering to clear a major part of the Hungry Horse reservoir area for nearly \$2,000,000 less than other bids.

Wixson and Trisdale say that, under ideal conditions, two tractors pulling one ball snagged down all the trees on a 200-acre heavily-timbered area in four hours. Average daily production for two tractors and one ball has been 100 acres in eight hours.

Last year, using the cable alone, the two completed about 95 per cent of a contract to clear 7,210 acres, to be covered by water backed up by Hungry Horse dam in the Flathead River's south fork, here in Northwestern Montana.

Work on that \$1,733,880 clearing contract will be completed before Dec. 20, 1950, the contractors promise.

This spring the two got contracts to clear 14,726 more acres. The contractors figured the cable would hang up on stumps and rocks. Hence the steel balls, eight feet in diameter, which keep the cable from being hung up.

The cable, riding four or five feet above the ground, has more leverage when it hits a big tree. A tree four feet in diameter is uprooted easily.

Letter "G" To Clarify Government Postage

By KAY REK Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA, Sept. 9 (CP) - A small, black "G" at the nape of the King's neck soon will appear on some postage-stamps - proof that they have been bought and paid for by the government.

The "G" stands for Government and a Post-Office Department official said today it will replace the letter O.H.M.S., meaning "On His Majesty's Service", which for the last year have been overprinted on Government - purchased stamps, below the King's portrait.

Just as some big firms have post-office permission to perforate business stamps, overprinting is the Government's way to saying "hands-off" to employees who might be tempted to use the stamps on personal mail.

The "G" stamp has been created because O.H.M.S. was found "misleading." The letters, which appear on mail going under the Government franking system, have come to be regarded as meaning "free" mail.

The "G" will be printed at the nape of the King's neck "because we don't want to deface his portrait," an official said.

The Department won't be so particular about stamps on which the King's portrait does not appear. On these stamps the "G" will be dead in the centre.

The Department believes that the new stamps are going to be popular with Canadian philatelists. It isn't going to be easy for collectors to locate the first cancelled numbers. There's no specific day of issue.

"G" stamps will be sold to departments just as soon as the regular supply of "O.H.M.S." types is exhausted. A quantity of the latter has been set aside by the Post-Office Department's philatelic section for purchase at face value.

Philatelic orders for "G" stamps also will be accepted. Both types will be sold only in Ottawa.
