

Local and Other Items.

REN IN.—Another convicted Scott Act offender was "run in" last night.

SHELBOURNE ELECTION.—The election in Shelbourne takes place on the 15th October.

FROST.—The frost of last evening was sufficiently hard to skin over the edges of the ponds.

EDUCATIONAL.—The Teachers' Association will meet in Upper Prince Street School, on Thursday and Friday next.

QUESTION.—Is the new sanitary officer doing his duty? There is a heap of foetid oil on the street at Connolly's warehouse.

OFFICIAL VISIT.—It is probable that the Minister of the Interior will make an official visit to the Northwest before the winter sets in.

THE HARVEST.—Large quantities of grain will remain to be harvested. This is particularly the case in the western part of the Province. So late a harvest as that of this year is very rare.

MACKEREL.—Some of the mackerel seiners have been catching a few lately. One vessel took 40 barrels in one dip off the Magdalen Islands on Friday. Others took more or less in that direction during the week.

ANNEXATION.

Negotiations Proposed in the United States Senate.

OTTAWA, Oct. 1.

The Empire published the following telegram which was sent for publication by Mr. Wiman's Telegraph Co. It was also sent to the Globe and Mail, and afterwards, by request, suppressed by them. An attempt was made to withdraw it from the Empire, but the offer was declined. It is as follows:

"NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—I deem it my duty to say that information from Washington reaches me of an important character to the effect that the Senate Committee of Foreign Affairs has, during the past few days, in furtherance of the views of its Chairman, Senator Sherman, been discussing the question of inviting the Dominion of Canada to join the United States. So far have matters progressed that it is not unlikely that a resolution will be reported for the concurrent action of both Houses declaring it to be the duty of the President to open negotiations with Great Britain looking to a political union between the English-speaking nations on this continent. The conditions attending the invitation of Canada is understood to be that the United States would assume the entire debt of the Dominion, estimated to be three hundred millions of dollars. Commercial Union was urged as the basis of the proposed negotiations on the ground that while a large majority might be secured for it, only a small minority favored political union; but the sentiment of the Committee was so strong in favor of proposing, at first, political union, that it was impossible to contend with it.

The Tournament at Halifax.

CHAMPION ROSS BEATEN.

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 1.

Sergeant Major Bailey, of Halifax, defeated Duncan C. Ross in the mounted tournament to-day, in the presence of one thousand people. He won three out of the five events, as follows:—Tent pegging, 22 to 18; lemon cutting, 18 to 14; and Turks' heads, 28 to 20. Ross won the tilting for rings, 10 to 24, and the sword contest, 7 to 2, breaking Bailey's sword in the last bout.

Chinese Exclusion.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.

The President to-day sent to Congress his approval of the Chinese Exclusion Bill, accompanied by reasons therefor, and suggested that a joint resolution be passed, allowing the admission of such Chinamen as are now on the way to this country. It is doubtful if this additional legislation will be granted. The remarks of Senators Stewart and Doolittle, after the message was read, indicated opposition to it on the ground that similar legislation has been tried before with the effect of giving admission to other Chinamen than those intended. The President recommends an appropriation of \$276,619 for the purpose of indemnifying Chinese subjects for losses and injuries received in the Rock Springs massacre, not because the United States is legally liable therefor, but simply as an act of humanity.

The public debt was decreased \$12,247,000 last month.

Premier Mercier, in the next issue of the Quebec Gazette will have a proclamation vetoing the district Magistrate's District Court, and thereafter close the tribunal.

QUEBEC Oct. 1.

It is very cold, and snow fell on Saturday between here and River du Loup, on the line of the C. P. R., and also in parishes north of the city.

Yellow Fever.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 1.

There were 99 new cases of yellow fever and 10 deaths the last 24 hours.
