

Mrs. Graydon Bids For Husband's Commons Seat

BRAMPTON, Ont. (CP) — A middle-aged mother who has never held public office will make a bid Nov. 30 for the parliamentary seat left vacant when her husband died two months ago.

Daisy Graydon, widow of Gordon Graydon, foreign affairs expert for the Progressive Conservative party said today that "Gordon would have liked me to run."

Mrs. Graydon will seek the party's nomination for the by-election in Peel riding, a seat her husband represented in the Commons for 18 years.

A former school teacher born on a farm near Sunnidale, Ont., Mrs. Graydon said she was "startled" when told that many persons in the riding would like to see her run for the nomination.

Her acceptance is a reversal of the role she had always chosen to play as a home-maker for Mr. Graydon and three daughters.

Good Speaker Mrs. Graydon is a good speaker and a good mixer. She is a member of the Business and Professional Women's Club.

If elected, she would be the fifth woman and fourth Progressive Conservative woman member of the present House.

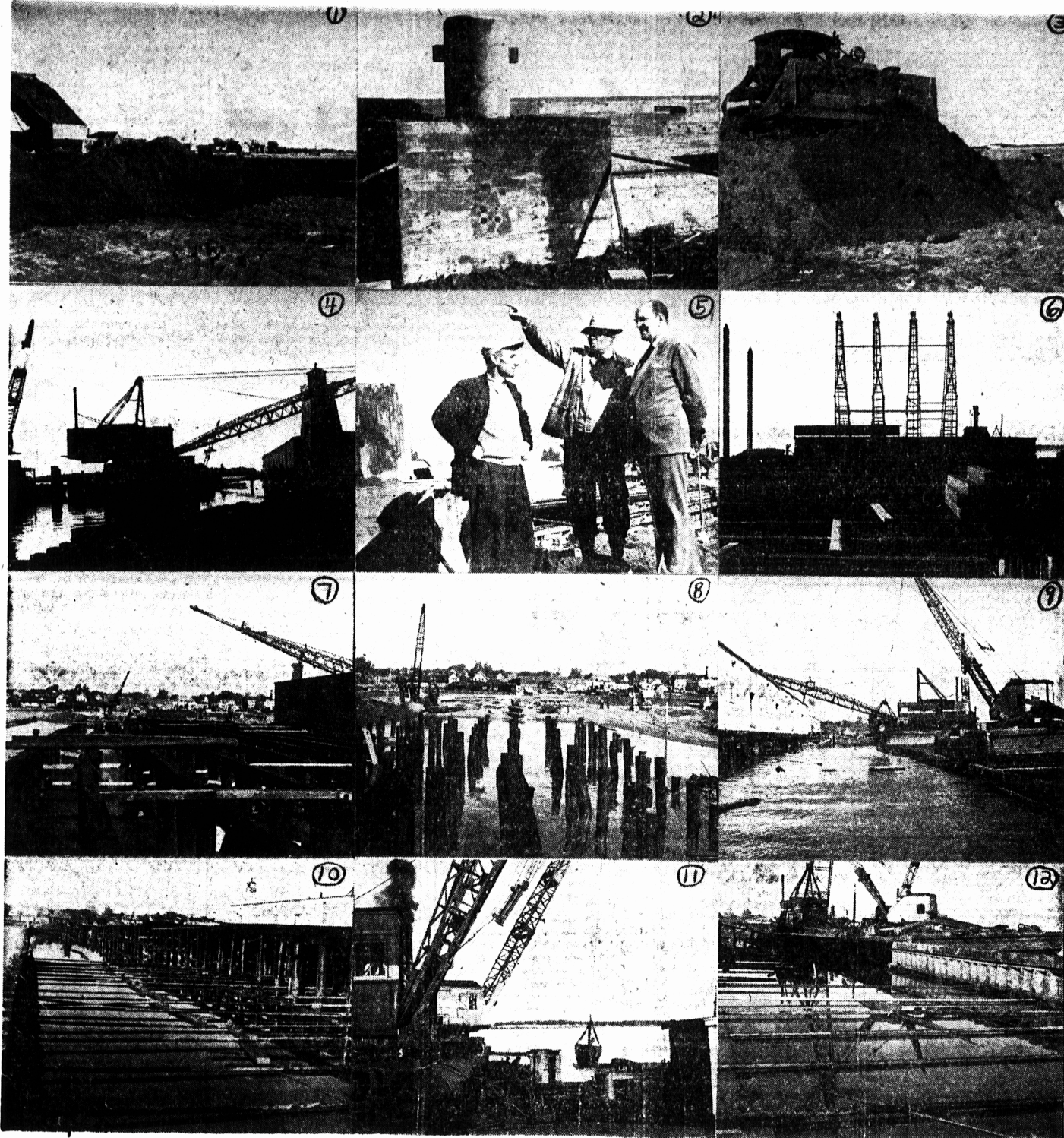
Roll call was responded to by 15 members and five visitors. The devotional part of the program was led by Mrs. Gordon Ripley. Plans were made for a chicken supper.

Latest Engineering Technique Employed In Building Commodious Federal Wharf For Prince County Capital



Enclosed by a half-mile of interlocking steel piling weighing more than 5 million pounds, the new Federal wharf at Summerside, which, when completed, will cost at least \$1 1/2 million, will be one of the finest wharves in eastern Canada, and will provide the facilities necessary to handle all the import-export shipping that might normally be expected by this port.

The wharf, which extends 900 feet from the shore line, is 108 feet wide for 400 feet of this distance, then widening to 196 feet for the remaining 500 feet.

The interlocking steel piling which extends around the whole of the wharf, is driven 5 feet into the rock bed.

On top of this is a thick concrete coping wall, four feet at the base, and tapering to one foot at the top.

The steel piling is secured in position by steel rods, 4 inches in diameter, placed every 7 1/2 feet apart, which extend the full width of the wharf.

The steel piling at the end of the wharf is fastened by similar but shorter rods, to a solid wall of reinforced concrete.

Will Have Asphalt Surface About 30,000 cubic yards of sand and clay fill will provide the wharf bed which will be covered by 6 inches of gravel, and it is expected that all of this will be paved with an asphalt surface.

The sand used for fill is being obtained from local beaches within a radius of seven miles of Summerside, and also by dredging operations near the east end of Holman's Island.

The existing warehouse, about 290 x 40 feet, which is located on the east side of the wharf, will be supplementary to a large new warehouse 450 x 60 feet, which will be built on the west side of the wharf.

is being done by the J. P. Porter Co., of Montreal, began on November 26, 1952, and is expected to be completed by next August.

Throughout the summer about 75 to 80 men (about 50 of this number are residents of Prince Edward Island) have been employed on this project.

Regardless of tide the work of placing fill continues, and one of the cranes is seen busily placing rock fill on the east side of the wharf, building up the area between the steel sea wall and the warehouse that is located on the east side of the wharf.

Looking shoreward from the western corner of the wharf at mid-tide, is seen a section of the 4 inch steel rods which span the 196 foot width of the outer part of the wharf. Each of these steel rods costs \$1500.00 and they are placed 7 1/2 feet apart, adding great strength and support to the interlocking steel wall that encloses the entire wharf area.

Side by side two cranes located on supporting floats continuously lift sand or rock fill from scows and steadily provide the firm base on which the trucks will later deposit their loads of sand, clay and gravel.

A view of the east side of the wharf at mid-tide shows how the steel rods are connected to the east wall. After level fill has been placed to the top of this wall, a reinforced concrete capping wall will be constructed on top of this interlocking steel piling.

Britain because of the aging population there." For instance, in the region where these physicians serve on the geriatric subcommittee of the regional board, 29 per cent (nearly a third) of the people are old.

What did these British physicians find about the needs of the aging in Canada and much that would apply to other countries?

"They stressed particularly the need of proper records of the medical care of the old; they emphasized the need of a personal interest in the personalities of old people to be cared for; they emphasized that expensive hospital and other buildings were not needed, and that small units should be used as much as possible. The best plan to care home which simulates a family home; the next best is an environment which simulates a family home, housing perhaps a dozen old people who do their share of the work of the house and are under the care of a competent matronly person, who may or may not have special training."

They pointed out that by getting old people to be up and about, not bed patients, there was less incontinence of urine, interest grew, and more useful work was performed.
