EASTER MARKET TO-DAY.

This was Easter market, and the attendance was large, despite the bad roads. Upstairs the various departments were well stocked, and the goods sold well. Downstairs the meat stalls were the great attraction. And well they might be, for a better display it would be hard to see anywhere. Blake Bros' stall was especially attractive. The six carcasses of prime beef they had on sale aggregated about 5,000 lbs., and their showing of lamb, hams, etc., was excellent. Saunders & Newson had four carcasses of choice beef, the aggregate weight of which was 3,451 lbs., two carcasses of mutton aggregating 221 lbs., besides their usual supply of bacon and hams. Two prime carcasses of choice beef, four carcasses of choice veal, J. Drake & Son, between their market stall and meat shop had six carcasses of good beef, dressing 4,339 lbs. The Stock Farm heifer dressed 909 lbs.; Geo. Thorne & Son had three carcasses of beef, which dressed 1,725 lbs.; Henry Wood two carcasses, dressing 900 lbs., fed by Nathaniel Gay, Pownal; R. Moulton, one carcass, 690 lbs.; B. Jenkins, one carcass, 522 lbs., and a carcass of lamb, 26 lbs., which was purchased by Mr. J. J. Davies; P. Curly, one carcass, 718 lbs.; William Sells, three carcasses, 1,865 lbs.; B. Henderson, three carcasses, 2,150 lbs.; Henry Balls, four carcasses, 2,624 lbs.; S. Brown, three carcasses, 2,118 lbs.; and one lamb, 18 lbs.; P. Trainor, two carcasses, 1,040 lbs.; John McNeill, two carcasses beef, 1,485 lbs. Eggs sold at from 12 to 14c; hay, 45c; oats, 30c; potatoes, 15 to 16c.
