Opposition Critical Of Foreign Policy Procedure

Limited Travel Provisions For Red Diplomats

By The Canadian Press: Most of the North Atlantic Allies clamped strict curbs Monday on travel by Soviet officials.

In Ottawa it was reported Canada would act shortly to restrict Soviet travel in a limited area around the capital.

Britain limited travel by Russian, Romanian and Bulgarian diplomats to an area 25 miles in radius from Hyde Park corner in London unless special permits are obtained on 48 hours' advance notice.

The order is effective at once. The State and Defence Departments can say "no" to any proposed trip. If a Russian without a special permit strays beyond the 25-mile limit that will be grounds for deporting him.

Has Broad Application: The tight order, imposed because of similar restrictions on westerners in Moscow, applies to Panyskhin, 225 other Embassy officials and their families, and to some representatives of Tass and Amtorg, Soviet news and purchasing agencies, along with their families.

Other North Atlantic Treaty Organization countries took similar steps. France banned travel by Soviet diplomats and newspapermen to General Dwight D. Eisenhower's N.A.T.O. Headquarters or anywhere beyond 15 miles from the centre of Paris.

The Dutch Foreign Office limited travel by Russian, Romanian and Hungarian diplomats of two of the 16 North Atlantic alliance countries with four exceptions, are expected to take parallel action.

The Italian government notified the Soviet ambassador in Rome that after April Soviet diplomats and Soviet employees of Russian agencies or firms and their families will be restricted to the province of Rome.

Claims Australia Faced Bankruptcy

CANBERRA, March 10—(CP)—Australia would risk international insolvency if her overseas balances should run below the safety point, Prime Minister Menzies told the Australian people today in a national broadcast explaining his import-lending policy.

He said, "Otherwise we would be unable to pay for our imports if a great drought occurred or wool and wheat prices slumped."

He promised that "these controls produced by the emergency will be modified, then repealed, as the emergency fades."

Answering criticism that the restrictions are a negative approach, Menzies said the problem must be solved in a year and that Australia at that time cannot suddenly increase export production of wool, meat and butter.

The new controls cut Australia's imports by half, affecting both dollar and sterling products and ranging from every-day items, such as cigarettes and beer, to major consumer goods.

Menzies said that without the cuts Australian credits overseas would have fallen in the year ending next June from \$843,000,000 to \$334,000,000.
