Going Places

"Going Places," the Warner Bros. picture which opens today at the Prince Edward Theatre with Dick Powell and Anita Louise heading the cast, is a hilarious farce whose action is interspersed with some highly original and tuneful song numbers.

In this production, Powell is given another fine chance to demonstrate his talents as a comedian which he has long been well established, notably Allen Jenkins, Walter Catlett, Harold Huber and Thurston Bell.

Having slightly more sedate roles are Ronald Reagan, Minna Gombell and Larry Williams, while the musical burden is shared with Powell by the two great colored stars, Louis Armstrong, the world's premier hot trumpeter, and Maxine Sullivan—who is the reigning sensation among swingy singers.

Among the four new songs written for the production by Harry Warren and Johnny Mercer, one is a romantic ballad, while the other three are all highly diverting novelty numbers. In the presentation of the songs, Powell, Armstrong and Maxine Sullivan all collaborate and are backed up by a colored swing band.

The humor of the piece revolves about the masquerade by Powell, who is a famous steeplechase rider. He is forced to make good on his boasts by riding one of the meanest and wildest horses ever foaled in the Maryland Steeplechase. Naturally for this a farce—things get very complicated, but he does make good by calling sweet music to his aid. How this is done constitutes one of the most original as well as one of the funniest episodes ever filmed.
