**\$Billion Hydro Plan Advanced For Columbia River In B.C.**

A \$1,000,000,000 plan for developing the hydro-electric potential of the Columbia River in British Columbia has been advanced by the International Joint Commission.

The plan would provide for 60 per cent of the power needs of British Columbia and the Pacific Northwest of the United States by 1965. It calls for building of at least eight great dams across the Columbia River which rises in B.C. crosses the border near Trail and flows through the northwest states to the Pacific.

Canadian and American sections of the IJC met in Washington April 8 to discuss an agreement on sharing costs and benefits from the giant development.

This map shows location of dams proposed under three schemes submitted by the international Columbia River engineering board. Arrows show the normal direction of river flow.

**DIVERT RIVER**

The scheme which the engineering board appears to favor calls for diversion of the Kootenay into the Columbia with a dam at Copper Creek. Other dams under this scheme would be built at Luxor, Calamity Curve, Mica, Downie Creek, Revelstoke Canyon, Arrow Lakes and Murphy Creek.

Biggest dam would be one costing \$327,000,000 at Mica, where the Columbia turns southward.

Another scheme calls for diversion of the Kootenay into the Columbia at Dorr, about 10 miles north of the U.S. border, and at Bull River.

Under the third scheme, there would be no diversion. This

**Civil Defence Letter Tabled**

OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister Diefenbaker tabled in the Commons Thursday a copy of the letters dispatched to provincial premiers regarding revised civil defence policy and a possible federal-provincial meeting on the subject here later this month.

The letter signed by Mr. Diefenbaker mentions April 17 as a possible date for the meeting between Health Minister Monteith and provincial ministers but it was indicated outside the Commons that this may have to be shifted ahead to meet various requests.

The letter elaborates on the prime minister's March 23 Commons statement regarding policy which would eliminate proposed dams at Door, Copper Creek, Luxor and Calamity Curve.

**Fire Erupts On Ark Royal**

DEVONPORT, England (AP)—Fire broke out Thursday in the boiler room of Britain's biggest aircraft carrier, the Ark Royal.

The 43,000-ton carrier was undergoing refit here when smoke began pouring from below decks and great blisters erupted in the vessel's paintwork.

Eight dockyard workers and four sailors were taken to hospital after collapsing in the fumes. They were discharged later.

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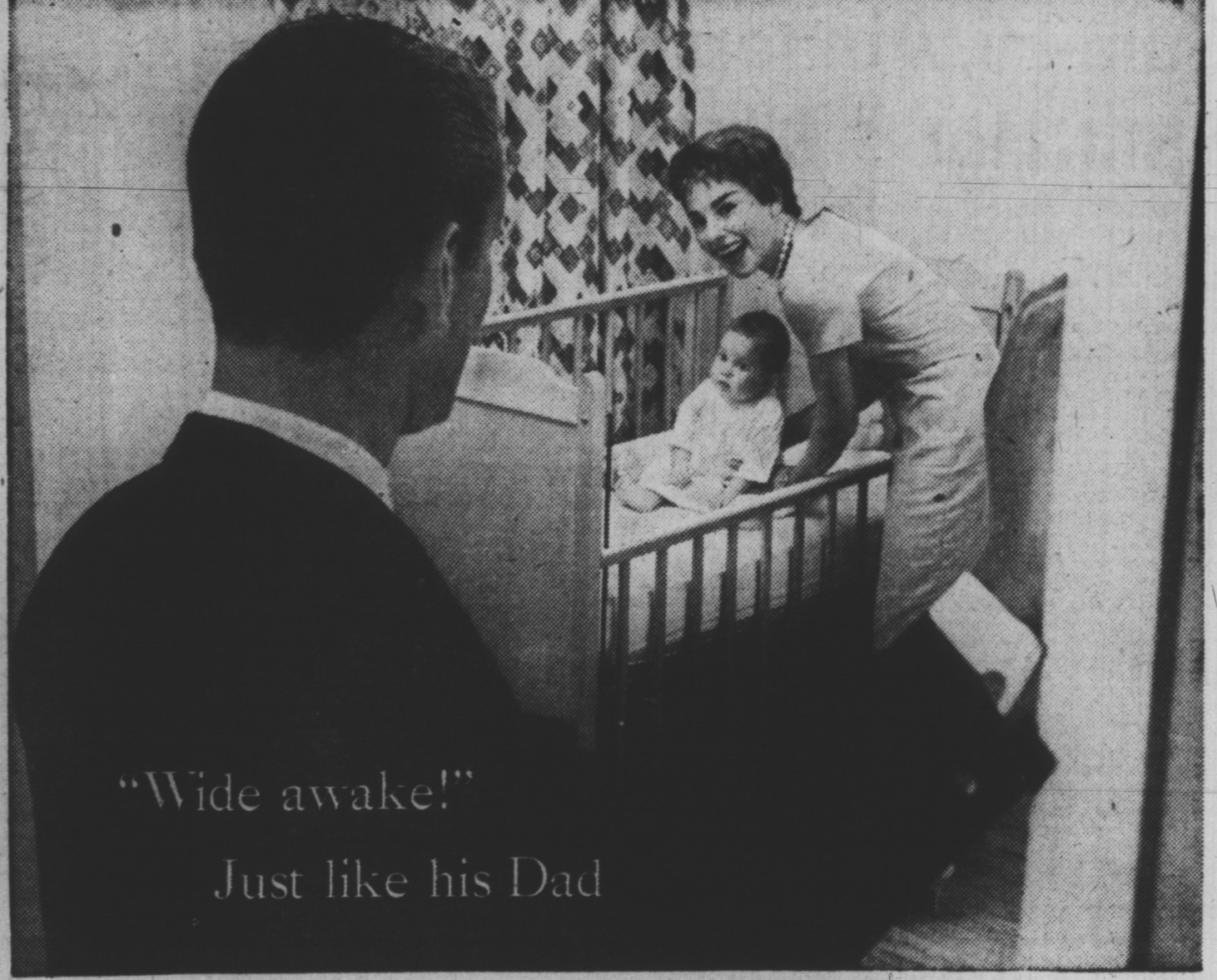
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
