Former S'side Resident Dies At Charlottetown... The death occurred at the Prince Edward Island Hospital on Sunday of Louis A. Moore, of Summerside.

S'side Town Council Hears School, Rink Questions; Routine Business

A motion to adjourn at the Summerside Town Council meeting last night ended a discussion raised by Councilor James MacDougall before any decision was made on a letter from the School Board which said they were ready to meet with the council at any suitable date regarding present and future alterations and proposed construction at the high school.

Councilor MacDougall, in bringing up the matter at the conclusion of the items on the agenda, expressed surprise that there had been no discussion or report on the school question, and also on a rumor that artificial ice would not be installed in the Raceway Stadium this winter.

On the subject of the rink Mayor Wedge said the town had laid aside \$15,000 towards the cost of the ice plant. He said he understood the rink would operate during the winter months on natural ice, but didn't see how it could operate on a paying basis without artificial ice, which he said he understood could be installed in six weeks.

Discusses Letter... Referring to the letter from the School Board, Mayor Wedge said he had discussed the matter with some of the councillors and felt that neither the councillors nor the School Board had apparently changed their minds on what they felt was necessary.

Mayor Wedge indicated that the work of altering the auditorium into classrooms had the approval of the council, and he personally thought that a new auditorium of which all would be proud, would be built next spring.

Other Business... Following the report of Dr. Hillard Clark, chairman of the Water and Sewerage Commission, on progress being made on extensions of water and sewerage, in which he pointed out that building permits were being granted for construction in areas in which water and sewerage extensions had not been approved.

To Discuss... deliberations will not be known for some time. Comments Tree Committee... Mayor J. D. Stewart felt that past work of the Tree Committee had saved the city a great deal of trouble in the recent storm.
