(Continued from page 8) The North Isles Clark's Creek Marsh and continuing west where are the ducking grounds of Gledhillman, Sherry's Creek and MacLeod's Island. In between are numerous prolific opening morning duck holes.

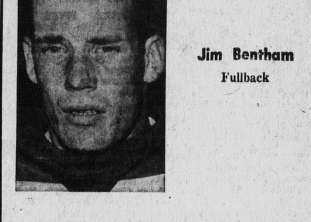
In about 30 minutes, there were a few short bursts at the lake to the south but there wasn't on the bottom drops out of our local black duck it will come out of a seemingly clear sky. Once any species of game bird is shot down below a certain safety level the end can come like a bolt from the blue. What a lot of hunters don't realize is that game birds are not free from casualty once the season closes. There are losses from predation, disease, drought, excessive floods, old age, lead poisoning and out of season poaching. Take our own local black ducks for instance. Two winters ago they had a grim session and many didn't survive although a lot of grain was fed to them. On top of this we had a tough breeding season. Not many of the early nestings got anywhere. My own personal opinion is that winter shooting on a black duck. I issued a warning years ago that when

The Guardian, Charlottetown, Fri. Oct. 5, 1962. local black ducks predicament. During one winter check in January by plane I estimated we had over five thousand black ducks wintering in the province. PLENTY SCARCE They were as scarce as hen's teeth in the West. Prince area and the concentration increased till we reached South Lake in eastern Kings. I have it the best information available three wintering strings were shot down to the last duck in the bleak winter two years ago. An approximate 150 black ducks, our ace in the hole for our opening morning shooting, were slaughtered at Apple-tree Creek and Clark's Creek on the Hillsboro River and at Starjurg during the winter two years ago. Some of them were so verminous and thin they were tossed into near-

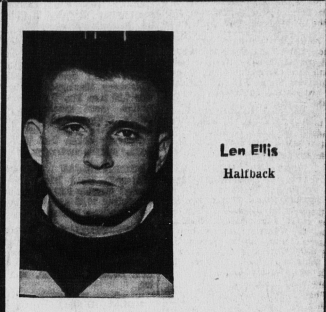

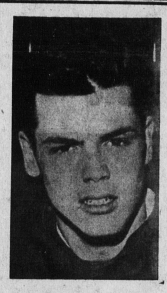
