

Islanders Will Make Cash Deal With Mont Joli For Hockey Players

The Islanders are working on a cash settlement with the Mont Joli hockey club for players Gerry LaChance and Bill LeBlanc, it was learned here last night from Ivan Doherty, first vice-president of the Islanders Club following an executive meeting last night.

The Islanders purchased the players outright from the Mont Joli club a week and a half ago. They paid \$300 for LeBlanc and were to pay \$300 for LaChance. The local club are asking a higher figure on the re-sale of the players.

LaChance and LeBlanc are playing six games with the Islanders, left here Tuesday morning without the permission or knowledge of the Islanders. It was supposed that they were heading for Montreal.

Yesterday the Islanders received \$500 from Mont Joli for LeBlanc. However they are returning the money as they are seeking a higher price.

President Frank MacDonald has been in touch with George Dudley, Secretary-treasurer of the C.A.H.A. MacDonald was told that the players are the property of the Islanders. Dudley has wired the Mont Joli club that LaChance and

LeBlanc are under suspension. The C.A.H.A. secretary-treasurer also advised the Islanders not to send Mont Joli any money for LaChance and to make a deal with Mont Joli for the players at a "reasonable figure."

Dudley will also warn the Mont Joli club about tampering. According to reports Mont Joli were in touch with the two players every second day last week. They were warned over the week-end not to contact the players.

Both players were the outstanding men on the Mont Joli Club. They came here after Mont Joli was forced to suspend hockey operations due to a power failure. By the time they arrived in Charlottetown Mont Joli were ready to play again.

The morning after they arrived Mont Joli officials wired the players seeking their return. It is presumed that they were offered more money.

The language and housing situations also played a big part in the departure of the players. Neither LaChance nor his wife could speak a word of English and they were unable to find suitable living accommodations.

Bailey For Islanders; Holdaway Stays In West

The Islanders have obtained left winger John Bailey from the Saskatoon Quakers for the balance of this season, it was announced here last night by coach Wes "Bucko" Trainor.

The rugged Bailey has been released to the Islanders by the Cleveland Barons through the New York Rangers. He is owned by the Barons but playing with a New York farm club.

The Boosters Club are forwarding the money for the player's transportation to Charlottetown. The money was wired to Saskatoon last night by George Hooper, President of the Boosters Club.

At the same time it was announced that the Islanders would not be obtaining Chuck Holdaway. The young left winger has hit his stride in recent games and now is one of the best players on the Quakers lineup.

It was also announced by Trainor that he is dealing for a highly

rated defenseman in Ontario. The player is an outstanding puck carrier and a smart blocker.

Bailey will be returning to the Maritimes after a two year absence. In 1951 he played with the Glace Bay Miners on a line with Bud Poile and Len Haley.

He was very fast and scored quite a number of goals on a "quicker play" with Poile. Within two months he was called up by the Cleveland Barons and finished the season in the Pacific Coast League. He played in the same circuit last season.

In the first 15 games with Saskatoon this year he scored three goals and picked up four assists while serving 25 minutes in the penalty box.

Signs To Coach Alouettes Again

MONTREAL, (CP)—Coach Douglas (Peahead) Walker of Montreal Alouettes Wednesday signed a contract to coach the Big Four football team again next season.

General manager Lew Hayman said both the club and Walker are happy about the signing. The terms were not disclosed.

It is not outside the realm of possibility that the name P. E. Islanders Hockey Club may take on a very realistic meaning within a few months. The name P. E. Islanders was given to the hockey club at the time of its inception in 1950 for the purpose of making it a Provincial project in a way it was a Provincial project with the team and executive centered in Charlottetown. Within the last year or so, however, the executive has branched out to include members from outside the City and it is possible that the same thing may be done about hockey games.

The Club President now is a man from Harrington, Smith MacFarlane. He has been a member of the executive for some time and won the respect of colleagues for his very sound ideas and proposals about what should be done in various situations. The second non-Charlottetown man added to the executive was Keith Myers of Hampton, an enthusiastic hockey fan who has attended nearly all of the games here since the Islanders joined the League four years ago. He was elected to the executive at a special meeting this year.

A proposal which is gaining a lot of weight in hockey circles would have a number of the games taken outside Charlottetown. The games would be taken to Summerside when the new rink is completed in the Western Capital. It is expected that the Summerside rink will be in operation this winter and that a number of games would be played there this season. Next year, if Major Series hockey were to be preserved, it might be played in Summerside and one in Charlottetown. This would practically assure the team of full houses and would prevent fans from getting an over-diet of hockey.

The Islanders are willing to close the book on the LaChance-LeBlanc case provided they can reach a satisfactory financial agreement with the Mont Joli hockey club. They aren't disclosing how much money they want from Mont Joli for the players but it will be considerably above the price they paid out a week and a half ago. At that time they paid \$500 for LeBlanc and promised to pay \$300 for LaChance. The Islanders had two weeks from the time that LaChance played his first game in Charlottetown to pay for the player.

They haven't paid for LaChance and according to George Dudley, secretary-treasurer of the C.A.H.A., won't lose their rights to the player as he left here before the two weeks had passed. Dudley, along with the Islanders is irked about the fact that Mont Joli tampered with the players after they had signed with the Islanders. The two players had scarcely signed their names to an Islanders contract before Mont Joli were trying to talk business with the men involved. They could be severely punished for such violations of the hockey code.

While the M.M.H.L. battles continue, hockey clubs throughout the Province are quietly preparing operations for another season's activities. From all indications there will be a record number of teams and leagues in operation this season. The newest league will be the Victoria-Grand Rapids Board of Trade circuit with at least three and possibly five entries.

The business of lining up hockey players and holding practices has already commenced. One sought after player is Willie Dunn who played with the North Sydney Franklins last year. Willie is staying in Charlottetown this year and there were reports that he might be playing for Rolfe Roberts' Parkdale Bombers. However it appears that the Montafne Meteors have the inside track on his services.

New York Rangers In 5-3 Victory Over Boston

NEW YORK, (AP)—New York Rangers rallied for three goals in the final period to defeat Boston Bruins 5-3 in a National Hockey League game Wednesday night.

In coming from behind to win, the Rangers reversed their tendency in earlier games this season to blow second-period leads. In six of their losses this season they have been nipped by the opposition in the final frame.

Wally Hergeshimer broke a 3-3 tie at 9:48 of the final period as he scored his first goal in three games and seventh of the season.

Harry Howell tallied the insurance goal at 14:39 of the same period unassisted when the Bruins took their goalie, Jim Henry out of the nets.

Howell's shot travelled the length of the ice, bouncing off the side boards, and moved the Rangers within five points of the fourth place Bruins.

Boston tallied first in the opening period as Joe Klukay took passes from Doug Mohs and Dave Creighton at 11:33. New York took the score at 15:21 as Eddie Kullman scored on assists from Don Raleigh and Nick Mickoski.

The Rangers went out in front on Ike Hildebrand's goal 47 seconds after the second session opened. But the Bruins struck back

Hungarians Smash Long English Soccer Record

LONDON, (CP)—England's proudest soccer boast was tumbled Wednesday at huge Wembley Stadium as a record-smashing team from Hungary trounced the home team 6-3 before 100,000 fans in what had been billed as the match of the century.

The defeat was the first inflicted on England at home by a team from outside the British Isles in the 90-year life of Football Association. Hungary scored more goals against her than any other team had in 72 years and the total—nine goals—was the most ever produced in sold-out Wembley, housing a \$140,000 crowd today, believed a record for a mid-week game.

Hungary's victory was the second in three meetings with England since 1934 and stamped them as overwhelming favorites to win the World Soccer Cup at Switzerland next summer. It was the 27th straight in international play for the state-sponsored team, which was unveiled in world competition two years ago by the Communist government.

The game was an unhappy sports windup, both for a Coronation year, where English cricket and track showed new life, and the Football Association's 90th birthday celebrations. But there was no trace of bitterness among the vast crowd, which cheered the Hungarian team in the absence of English sparkle.

Chavez In 10-Round Decision Over King

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Eddie Chavez, little Mexican from San Jose, Calif., Wednesday night strengthened his bid for the world's lightweight boxing crown when he scored a 10-round decision over Canadian titleholder Arthur King of Toronto.

Chavez won the unanimous decision of the referee and two judges.

King, scoring repeatedly with a sharp left jab and crossing with an occasional right, had an edge in the first three rounds.

Chavez took command in the fourth, staggering King with a right to the jaw and gave the Canadian a body beating.

Chavez was also out in front in the fifth, sixth and seventh rounds.

In the fifth he shot over a right to the jaw that nearly floored King. The latter went down on his haunches, but was not off his feet.

Blue Bombers Coach Expects Tough Game

AURORA, Ont., (CP)—George Trafton ran a pencil down a football program Wednesday and said: "We're going to have trouble with that Hamilton line. They're a rough, tough ball club."

Trafton, 56-year-old tough-talking coach of Winnipeg Blue Bombers, scanned the Tiger-Cat line-up a few minutes before calling a secret practice session for the Western Canada champions in preparation for their Grey Cup game Saturday against Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

"Sure we have a big line," Trafton said at the team's training headquarters at a motel near Aurora, 24 miles north of Toronto. "But just take a look at the Hamilton boys."

With that he pointed to the program he has been carrying around since he scouted Sunday's Big Four playoff between the Tiger-Cats and Montreal Alouettes.

He ran the pencil across the Tiger-Cat defensive team. It started with 235-pound Vince Marza, picked as tackle on both the Canadian Press all-star offensive and defensive teams. The others were all over 200.

"That adds up to a lot of rugged beef," Trafton commented. "It's more than we've got."

He added: "We're not giving anything to anybody. This is the big game the boys have been waiting for. Sure, we're in shape. If we weren't by this time of year, we'd never be up to scratch."

That's why Trafton is calling only for light workouts once a day.

"The boys don't need a grueling practice," he said. "We just work up a little sweat and call it quits."

"What are we going to do against those Tiger-Cats? You call it, mister."

Brooklyn Coaches Can Make Deal

BROOKLYN, (AP)—The three Brooklyn coaches—Harry (Cookie) Lavagetto, Bill Herman and Jake Pitler—who served under former manager Chuck Dressen have been given permission to make a deal for themselves with other clubs, the Dodgers said Wednesday.

If they fall to make another connection, they will, if they wish, be given jobs in the Dodge organization, a Brooklyn spokesman said. This doesn't mean that any of the three won't be retained as a coach by newly-appointed manager Walter Alston, the spokesman added.
