Illegal Sale Of Liquor Brings Fine Of \$300

A fine of \$300 and costs for three months was imposed on William Alfred MacLeod, 263 King Street, yesterday, when he was convicted in city police court of illegal sale of liquor. MacLeod, represented by Lester P. O'Donnell, appeared before Magistrate A. J. Haslam, QC. The charge arose as a result of an RCMP raid at the residence of the accused March 6. The case of Kenneth Ewen MacDonald, Brookfield, charged with leaving the scene of an accident, was adjourned to April 13 with bail set at \$50. Edwin Byron Brown, Charlottetown, pleaded guilty to three separate charges under the Explosives Act and was fined \$15 and costs for each conviction. The case, prosecuted by Ian M. MacLeod, who was acting as representative for the Department of Justice in Ottawa, stated that the explosives which were being transported in a station wagon driven by the accused was not insured for that purpose. There were no markings on the vehicle to indicate the station wagon was carrying explosives and there was no fire extinguisher as a safety precaution. The explosives totalled about 150 pounds. Brooks Alexander Diamond, Charlottetown and Gordon Lee Marney of Toronto, both college students, were charged with disorderly conduct. Diamond pleaded guilty and was fined \$20 and costs. Marney pleaded not guilty but was convicted and also fined \$20 and costs or 10 days. Marney was represented by Lester P. O'Donnell. Four residents of Charlottetown were arraigned on charges of being drunk and incapable. One pleaded guilty and was remanded without bail until Saturday morning, another, unfit for trial was also remanded to Saturday morning without bail, while a third was remanded to April 15. A fourth accused was given a 20-day suspended sentence.

Fire Guts Winsloe Home

Fire which broke out about 9:30 a.m. yesterday gutted the two-storey home of David Arnst, Winsloe. The building also contained an apartment. Units from the Parkdale, Sherwood, North River and Charlottetown Fire Departments answered the alarm.

John Henry Reid Files Law Suit Against City, Police Officers

The City of Charlottetown, Stems Webster and Charles Reidy have been named as defendants in a suit for damages of \$146,850 filed yesterday by John Henry Reid. Allison Gillis, counsel for the plaintiff, filed the writ with the prothonotary. Mr. Reid's action followed a recent Supreme Court victory when his appeal against a conviction of operating a restaurant without a license was upheld. It was stated the plaintiff's claim was for damages for trespass upon lands and restaurant; damages for false imprisonment; and damages for malicious prosecution. Joined in the action with Mr. Reid as co-plaintiff is his sister, Elizabeth L. Reid, as lessee and operator of the restaurant known as Johnny's Fish and Chips. Filed with the writ was a statement of claim in 13 sections outlining the basis of the action and reasons for the claim. The statement maintains the original information laid in City Police Court was based on an act which was not an offence according to law; the arrest of plaintiff and imprisonment in the police station cell block was invalid; denial of bail by the magistrate resulted in further false imprisonment in Queens County Jail. It also maintains 20 more separate charges were "maliciously laid; the City 'maliciously took the unprecedented action of hiring or retaining an attorney to prosecute the charges; the stipendiary magistrate 'insisted' on trying the charge laid by Charles Reidy in spite of a claim the magistrate was biased. Mr. Reid first appeared in City Police Court Nov. 30 last and, following his conviction, Magistrate Haslam ruled further hearings on more charges would be held up pending result of an appeal to the Supreme Court. Decision of Justice George J. Tweedy handed down earlier this month quashed the conviction.

TCH Paving Tenders Are Extended

The department of highways has extended until noon, April 20, the deadline for paving tenders for a 13-mile section of the Trans Canada Highway from Charlottetown to Vernon. Previous deadline was noon, yesterday. The project calls for the grading, stabilizing and paving of the highway and is split into two parts. Separate tenders are being called for the seven miles between Charlottetown and Mt. Albion and the six miles from Mt. Albion to Vernon.

FIRE EXTINGUISHED

Murray River Fire brigade quickly extinguished a fire which broke out in the vacant home of Dan Herring about 2:00 p.m. yesterday. Cause of the fire is unknown but it is thought to have started in the kitchen where it burned a hole in the ceiling and roof. The vacant building was partially insured.

Music Festival Names 2 Of 4 Adjudicators

With dates for the annual P.E.I. Music Festival looming ever nearer, plans for staging the big event are rapidly nearing completion. It is to be held Monday to Saturday, April 26-May 1. Names of two of the four adjudicators who will handle the festival in its various locations at Charlottetown, Summerside and Montague have been released and it is now known they are to be Edgar (Billy) Boucher, BBC Music Organizer for Northern Ireland, and Francis Cameron, organist and pianist of London, England. Mr. Boucher was a piano scholar at Read School, Dublin, and was senior exhibitioner, scholar and gold medalist in philosophy at Trinity College. He obtained his degrees of MA, D.Mus. (Dublin) in 1953. In his professional career he has been a chorister in St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin; taught singing and piano in Dublin schools; assistant organist and choirmaster at Christ Church Cathedral; been conductor of the Dublin Oratorio Society; guest conductor of the Dublin Grand Opera Society; and during the past few years has been examiner for the Royal Irish Academy of Music and the Northern Ireland Ministry of Education. Francis Cameron was born in London, in 1927, and first appeared publicly playing the piano by royal command at the age of five. At 16 he toured army camps in the United Kingdom for the Canadian Legion and for it was awarded a scholarship at the Royal Academy of Music. He won the Henry Richards prize for organ playing while there. Later he attended Oxford and after studying there taught for five years. From 1959 to 1961 he was in charge of music at Westminster Cathedral and was appointed a professor of Organ and Composition at the Royal Academy of Music. He has conducted the Westminster Cathedral choir for the BBC and independent television and has made appearances with his professional choir at the Spanish Institute and Hampton Court Palace. Heading the Music Festival this year are president Preston V. Beck, honorary president Malcolm MacKee, deputy minister of education, and secretary Mary Donohoe. The festival will be staged at Confederation Centre.
