

# Bruins, Chicago, Leafs Come Up With Big Wins

**BOSTON (AP)** — Pit Martin scored three goals and set up the tie-breaker as Boston Bruins rallied to snap a long Detroit hex by edging Red Wings 5-4 Wednesday night in a fast-moving National Hockey League game.

Martin, a 22-year-old centre acquired from Red Wings in a trade for Parker MacDonald Jan. 1, turned on his former teammates for his 13th, 14th and 15th goals of the season.

Red Wings took a two-goal lead, 4-2, on a goal by Bill Gadsby in the opening minute of the third period before Martin scored his third goal with a 24-foot shot at 2:34.

John McKenzie tied the count at 13:07 on his 12th goal before R. Stewart cashed in a rebound of a shot by Martin at 14:49 for the decisive tally.

... moving into undisputed possession of fifth place with New York's 5-2 loss to Chicago, dominated the third-period action in earning their first victory over Detroit since the final weeks of last season.

The shrill of the starting whistle, the spray of ice chips and the flailing of arms will all be common sights at the Charlottetown Forum tomorrow evening as the top skaters on the island will converge on the Charlottetown Forum to do battle in the P.E.I. Skating Championships.

Canada has earned the reputation of being the hockey capital of the world but strangely enough this land has never been able to compete on an international level with the other countries at speed skating. The sport is an art in itself but this is no excuse for Canadians to lag so far behind in worldwide competition. In a country with so many frozen lakes, rivers and arenas available one would think that at least a tiny majority of those who see the blades every winter would be capable of holding their own in competition but a good number of factors seem to conspire against Canada ever becoming a speed skating power.

The first and foremost factor involved in hockey is that it is a strong skater will more than likely join a hockey team and forget completely about speed skating. The stronger skaters will tend their merry way up to a pro team of one caliber or another, and thus be ineligible to skate in competition even if they were interested.

Interest or rather apathy is the big factor in keeping Canadians from becoming a world power. Prince Edward Island is one of the very few provinces that puts any emphasis at all on the sport of skating and it is common knowledge that almost every school on the island sponsors its own ice sports program. The winners there move on to the County Meets and the top talent then goes to the Provincials.

## LACK OF INTEREST

Even with these conditions there is still not a lot of interest involved. Boys and girls who have skated only a few times during the winter don't seem to compete and it shows. In the open events, hockey players who have been skating regularly take the majority of the prizes and they just go in the event for something to do. Not too many of them have any plans of going on to national competitions.

The same thing happens when the best skaters leave school. There are no speed skating competitions for out of school prospects on the island and they either continue playing hockey or just give up skating completely.

Now though things are starting to look up and the Provincial sports for 1966 has a just reward for interested speed skaters. Plans have been made by Dave Boswell's Provincial Department of Physical Education to send a team of skaters to the Quebec Winter Games next winter. The local talent with the best times will be selected at the Forum tomorrow so you can bet that there will be some really frantic scrambling for the top positions.

The Charlottetown Royals pulled a big upset last night at the Charlottetown Forum when they shaded the Moncton Hawks 5-4 before 1300 cheering fans.

The same Moncton team defeated the Royals 12-2 last week-end in Amherst, but last night's game was a different story.

The Royals got goals from youngsters Alfie Flannagan, and Sandy Murphy, and veterans Dick Carroll, Earl Wood, and Alfred "Appa" Arsenault.

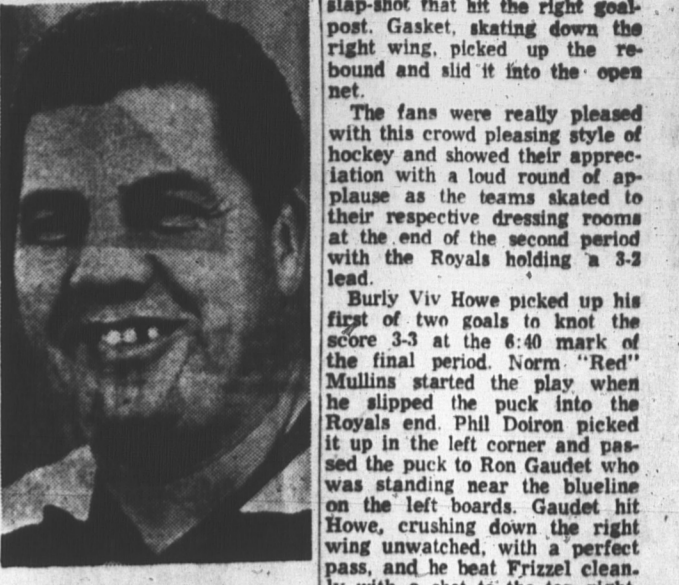
Vic Howe scored twice for the Hawks while Alf Gaskin, and Greg Crossman picked up singles.

It was a great team effort by the Royals, as the forwards backchecked and forechecked, while the defenses comprised of Alan "Junior" MacLeod, Stu McLure, Earl Wood, Paul McGonnell, and colorful Ralph Josey did a fine job of protecting diminutive Donnie Frizel.

The first period was scrabbling as both teams played cautiously, but the second and third periods were very well played.

Greg Crossman gave the Hawks a one goal lead at the 18:10 mark of the first period. Crossman broke up a Royals attack at his own blue line and broke quickly with Charlie Poirier. Crossman passed to Poirier going down the right boards, who skated into the Royals end and stopped suddenly at the top of the right face-off circle. Poirier then slid a pass back to Crossman, skating down the middle, who beat Frizel cleanly with a quick shot to the top left hand corner.

Alfie Flannagan was a standout for the Royals in the first

period with his smooth play-making. At the seven minute mark he neatly put Dick Carroll in the clear at the Hawk blue line. Dick moved in on the left wing, shifted the goalie but hit the left goalpost in his scoring bid.

Three quick goals gave the Royals an early 3-1 second period lead.

Alf Flannagan got the Royals started on their scoring parade at the 1:25 mark when he picked up a "Smell" Gillis rebound and beat Moncton goalie Roger Beliveau with a high shot to the top right-hand corner.

Earl Wood blasted a "35 footer" past Beliveau after taking a passout from Angie Carroll in the left corner to give the Royals a 2-1 lead at the 4:51 mark.

Good forechecking by Stan Pearson and Dave Lawlor paid off for the Royals as they took a 3-1 lead. Pearson stole the puck from a Hawk defenceman deep in his own zone and passed to Dick Carroll standing twenty feet directly in front of Beliveau. Dick grabbed the pass and fired a low hard drive to the lower right hand corner that beat the overworked Moncton goalie cleanly.

Alf Gaskin cut the Royals lead to 3-2 at the 6:51 mark of the second period. Charlie Poirier, stickinghand smoothly, carried the puck all the way to the top of the left face-off circle in the Royals end, and blasted a low

slap-shot that hit the right goalpost. Gasket, skating down the right wing, picked up the rebound and slid it into the open net.

The fans were really pleased with this crowd pleasing style of hockey and showed their appreciation with a loud round of applause as the teams skated to their respective dressing rooms at the end of the second period with the Royals holding a 3-3 lead.

Burly Viv Howe picked up his first of two goals to knot the score 3-3 at the 6:40 mark of the final period. Norm "Red" Mullins started the play when he slipped the puck into the Royals end. Phil Doiron picked it up in the left corner and passed the puck to Ron Gaudet who was standing near the blue line on the left boards. Gaudet hit Howe, crushing down the right wing unwatched, with a perfect pass, and he beat Frizel cleanly with a shot to the top right-hand corner.

Sandy Murphy gave the Royals another one goal lead on a pretty play with Stu McLure and Alf Flannagan. Flannagan lugged the puck to the Hawk blue line and slipped the puck to Stu McLure who had broken in alone on the left wing. McLure skated to Beliveau's doorstep, drew the goalie to one side, passed to Murphy, following up the play and now standing at the open corner, who simply pushed the puck behind the surprised goalie.

Vic Howe again knotted the score 4-4 with his second goal of the night at the 11:51 mark. Ron Gaudet, killing a penalty at the time, flipped the puck from the Hawk end to centre ice. Howe, slipped out of the penalty box, grabbed the loose puck, and skating in quickly, beat Frizel cleanly with a low drive to the right corner.

This set the stage for "Appa" Arsenault, the old opportunist, to score the winning goal at the 13:32 mark of the final session.

Buddy McIntyre fired a shot from the point that Beliveau stopped, but the rebound squirted in front where Arsenault picked it up and tucked it under the sprawling goalie.

Knobby Walsh, Royals trainer, who stepped onto the ice in the second period, proved himself a gifted prognosticator, as earlier in the week he predicted a Royals win.

Royals manager Sandy Frizel was delighted with such a fine crowd because it proved senior hockey can still draw big in Charlottetown.

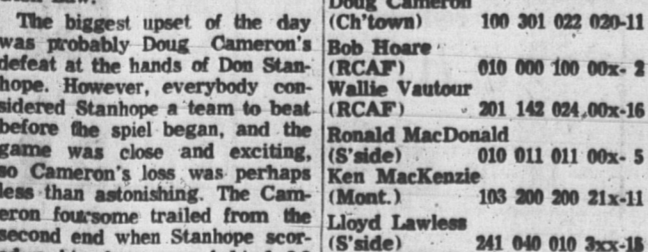
