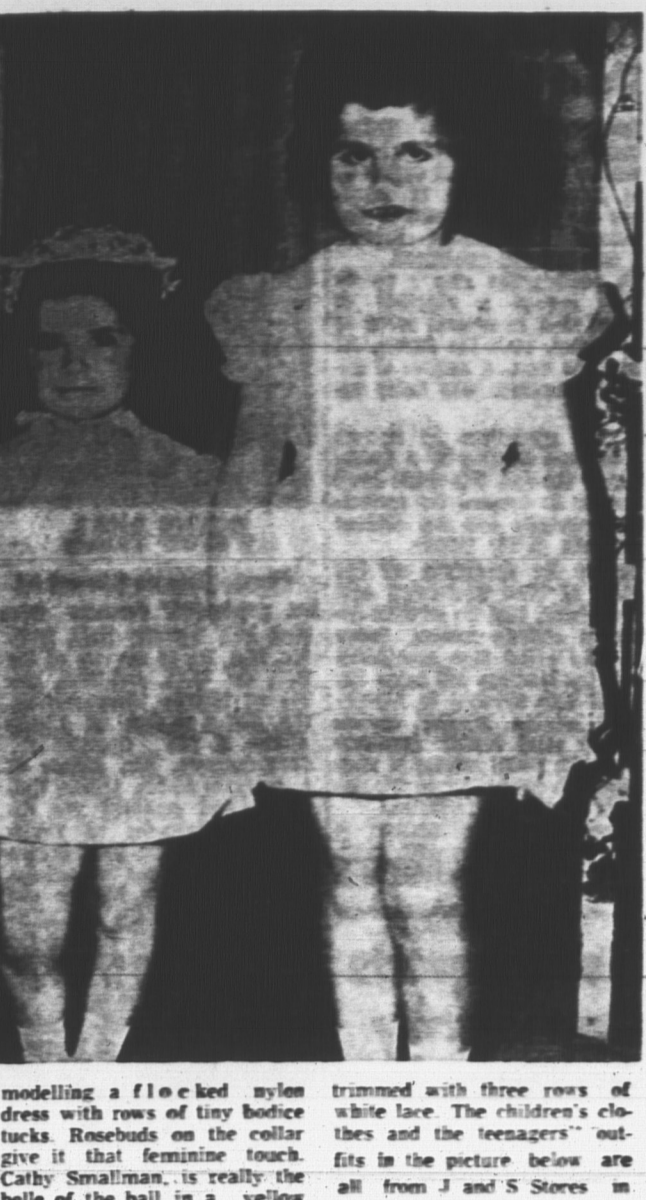

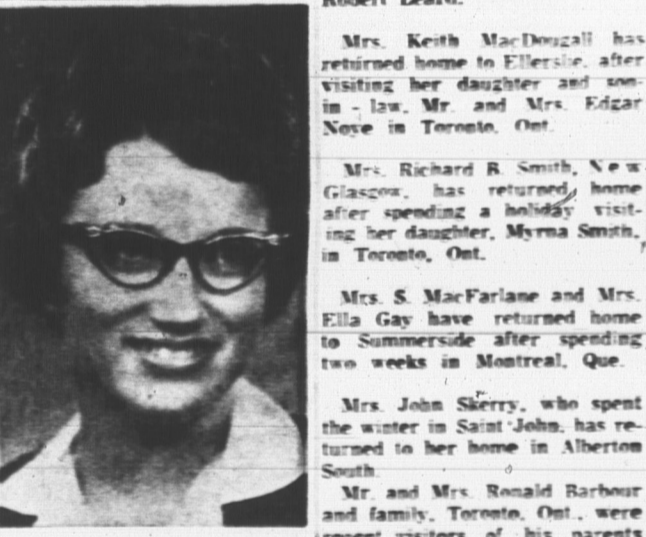

**ROCK LOBSTER TAILS ROYALE**  
6 (4 oz.) South African rock lobster tails  
2 1/2 tsp. olive oil  
1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce  
1 tsp. chopped parsley  
2 tsp. lemon juice  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. pepper  
1/2 tsp. powdered farragon  
Drop frozen rock lobster tails into boiling salted water to cover and boil 2 min. Drain and rinse with cold water. Remove lobster meat from shells; cut into bite - size pieces; reserve shells.  
Heat olive oil in heavy 10" skillet; add onion; fry until onion turns. Add rock lobster pieces and brown slightly; turn to cook evenly. Stir in tomato sauce, parsley, lemon juice, and seasonings; simmer gently 10 min. Fill empty shells with hot rock lobster. Arrange on platter. Serve immediately with buttered biscuits, and tossed green salad. Serves 6 to 8.

### Quebec Hydro Gets New Price From Brinco

QUEBEC (CP) - Hydro-Quebec has received new charges from Brinco. The power price figures which will be the base for further negotiations with the British Newfoundland Corp. Rene Levesque, Quebec natural resources minister, said here. Mr. Levesque, the cabinet minister responsible for Hydro-Quebec, said in an interview only that the government-owned utility is studying the new Brinco figures. Negotiations over power from the planned 7,000,000-horsepower hydro development in Labrador transfer of electricity it would transfer to Brinco clients. Premier Jean Lesage said Wednesday the actual power negotiations would not be affected by the Quebec-Newfoundland border dispute over Labrador. However, he said a border agreement must first be reached before any Churchill Falls power agreement could be put into effect.
