WESTERN BANK FAILURE.—A telegram from Chicago states that the Central National Bank will go into liquidation, consequent upon the determination of the Directors and stockholders. Officers claim to be able to pay depositors in full, and make a good showing towards paying stockholders. Liabilities to depositors are \$260,000; assets, \$400,000 of bills receivable, and \$75,000 cash capital. Stock two hundred thousand.
