# First Ballot Nominees For Schenley Awards Announced

The names of the 27 players nominated on the first ballot of the Canadian Schenley Football Awards were announced today in Montreal. The following players were selected by nominators — football writers and sportscasters in each of Canada's nine football areas — from their own home teams.

The players are listed according to Most Outstanding Football Player; Canadian Player of the Year; Lineman of the Year; Lions; Eilmes, Cacic, Cacic; Eskimos-Thomas, Brewer, Sims; Stampeders — Luzzi, Evensten, Harris; Saskatchewan Roughriders — Lancaster, Urness; Benecick, Blue Bombers — Raimy, Nielsen, Minnick; Tiger Cats — Henley, Kuntz, Locklin; Argonauts — Luster, Taylor, Frank; Ottawa Roughriders — Jackson, Jackson, Lehman; Alouettes — Lisbon, Learn, Lalonde.

Only one of last year's finalists appears in the list of nominees. He is Wayne Harris of the Calgary Stampeders who was selected as Lineman of the Year in 1965.

Last year's two other final winners were George Reed of the Saskatchewan Roughriders — Most Outstanding Player — and Zeno Karcz of the Hamilton Tiger Cats — Canadian Player of the Year.

Veteran Don Luzzi of the Calgary Stampeders, voted Lineman of the Year in 1958, is the choice of Calgary voters for the Most Outstanding Football Player.

Russ Jackson, Ottawa Rough-

rier quarterback, again was nominated in both the Most Outstanding and Canadian Player categories. He won both these awards in 1963. He was also Canadian of the Year in 1959.

The next Canadian Schenley ballot early in November will reduce the number of players in the running from 27 to six. Voters will select three players from the Western Conference and three from the Eastern Conference.

The third and final ballot results will be announced Tuesday, November 15 and will name the 1966 Schenley winner in the Most Outstanding Player, Canadian Player of the Year, and Lineman of the Year, categories.

## Koufax, Peters Capture Titles

**NEW YORK (AP) —** Southpaw Sandy Koufax of Los Angeles Dodgers and Gary Peters of Chicago White Sox captured the 1966 major-league earned-run titles, the final averages disclosed.

The Dodgers' star set a big league record by leading for the fifth consecutive season.

Koufax gave up only 68 earned runs in 323 innings in posting a 1.73 E.R.A. which topped the National League.

The brilliant left-hander, who won 27 games, had shared the standard for most consecutive E.R.A. championships with Lefty Grove, another southpaw who led the American League while with Philadelphia Athletics from 1929 through 1932.

Peters headed the American League last season with a 2.03 average. He yielded 62 earned runs in 204 innings, winning 13 games and losing 10. Peters also was the circuit's leader in 1963 with a 2.33 mark.

Mike Cuellar of Houston was the runner-up to Koufax with a 2.22 average.

Joel Horlen of the White Sox was second to Peters with a 2.43 average.

# NHL Begins Anniversary Year With Eye To Future

The National Hockey League's 50th season, possibly one of the most critical in its history, opens today in two United States cities.

Chicago Black Hawks battle New York Rangers off Broadway while Detroit Red Wings are guests of Boston Bruins.

Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Canadiens join the fray Saturday in the first night of full league action.

Between now and April 2, 1967, when the regular season closes in Detroit, Boston and New York, club executives will have to decide which rookies to let go and which rookies to protect for the following year's expansion draft.

The present six-team circuit will be expanded to 12 teams next year and each of the incumbents will have to deal off 20 players to the six newcomers.

Opening night will see two hungry hockey clubs trying to claw their way into the playoffs, opposing teams attempting key repairs after losing top personnel.

Chicago, without goalie Glenn

Hall, centre Billy (Red) Hay and defenceman Elmer (Moose) Vasko — all retired — will be opposed by the heaviest Rangers team in the history of the club and last year the meekest in the league.

Detroit, missing Bill Gadsby and Doug Barkley on defence, come up against the rebuilding Bruins.

On the credit side of the books, the Black Hawks still have such as Bobby Hull, Stan Mikita, Pierre Pilote and Pat Stapleton going strong. The Rangers have Bernie Goeffron making a comeback after two years as a minor-league coach and they're strengthened by forwards Red Berenson, Orland Kurtenbach and Bill Collins and defenceman Al MacNeil.

HOWE READY  
The good news for the Wings concerns the signing by Gordie Howe of his 21st contract just two days before the season opened. Howe said he is fit and ready and "looking forward to my 22nd season."

Wings have also come up with a couple of good-looking rookies — Pete Mahovich, brother of Toronto's Frank, and Bart Crasley. Both are graduates of the Hamilton Red Wings Juniors.

Detroit's rookies will have some newcomers to contend with on the Boston squad, starting with the 34-year-old coach, Harry Sinden.

On defence, Boston will have Bobby Orr, the junior labelled as a future superstar.

The Rangers want to climb out of the NHL cellar they finished in last season; Bruins want an early start on making up the 26 points that stood between them and the playoffs in the Wings' top score firing 31 1965-66.

Chicago and Detroit, both of

whom showed well in exhibition action, are coming out with teams shaken from the tough squads of last year.

## Barber Attempts To Bribe Three LSU Backfielders

**BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) —** The Federal Bureau of Investigation charged a Baton Rouge barber with attempting to bribe three first-string backs on Louisiana State University's football team.

A complaint filed in federal district court by FBI agents Tuesday identified the barber as Samuel Joseph Graziano, 26, who waived preliminary hearing before a U.S. commissioner. He was released on \$5,000 bond.

Charles McClendon, LSU head football coach, said the university and the three players cooperated with the FBI.

The three players are halfbacks Jim Douney of Baton Rouge and Billy Masters of Olla, La., and fullback Gawnin Bibette of New Orleans.

They have been instrumental in the 3-1-1 won- tied- lost record compiled by LSU's football team this fall.

The amount of money involved in the bribery attempt was reported to have been a total of \$1,200 for the three players.

The FBI said Douney, Masters and Bibette made no attempt to control the outcome of the five LSU games the FBI said Graziano is accused of attempting to influence.

The FBI said the players advised the bureau when bribe attempts first were made.

James J. Corbett, LSU athletic director, has been greatly concerned with gambling for several years.

LSU recently hired Mike Toppas, a former FBI agent, as team security officer. Corbett said the move was designed to protect players from gamblers and undesirable characters.

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# France's Entry UN Trot Winner

**YONKERS, N.Y. (AP) —** Roquepine, a five-year-old mare from France, beaten by Canada's Armbr Flight in the \$100,000 Roosevelt International last July, didn't make any mistakes Tuesday night at Yonkers Raceway and won the \$100,000 United Nations Trot.

The French mare, which started as 7-to-5 favorite from the No. 1 post position, dogged the pace — setting Noble Victory for the first mile, then rushed into the lead and outgamed Speedy Rodney of the United States the last time around in the 1 1/2-mile harness racing classic.

At the finish, Roquepine, owned by Henry Levesque of Beauzeville la Bastille, France, and driven by Jean-Rene Gou-

geon, held a three-quarter-length margin over Speedy Rodney, trying to win the event for the second straight year.

Third, another three-quarters of a length away, came Earl Laird, also of the United States. Short Stop, another French entry, was fourth, a length back of Earl Laird.

Speedy Rodney, the morning-line favorite, broke stride at the finish, was disqualified from second and placed fourth with Earl Laird moving up to second and Short Stop up to third.

Roquepine trotted the 1 1/2 miles in 3:06.1-5. She paid \$4.90, \$3.20 and \$3.00.

Earl Laird, driven by Jimmy Cruise, paid \$4.60 and \$4.20 while Short Stop, driven by Billy Haughton, returned \$3.80 to show.

# Walton Walks Out On Rochester Club

**TORONTO (CP) —** Mrs. R. C. Walton, mother of promising centre Mike Walton, said Tuesday that if her son cannot play in the National Hockey League, "he won't play hockey at all."

Walton, tabbed as a future star for Toronto Maple Leafs, walked out on Rochester Americans of the American League over a salary dispute and was suspended Monday night.

Also suspended were Eddie Joyal, Bill Flett and Gary Smith, who joined Walton in the walkout.

Walton, 21, staying at his parents' home here, was not available for comment, but his mother said:

"Mike loves to play hockey and he knew before he could make the NHL he would have to serve his apprenticeship in the minor leagues."

Walton played with Tulsa Oilers of the Central Professional League in 1964-65 and with the Americans last year. In two seasons of minor pro hockey, he scored 75 goals.

He was AHL Rookie of the

Year last season and was Rochester's fourth top scorer. With Tulsa, he was named Rookie of the Year and all-star centre.

"The Leaf management must have thought something of him to protect him for two years," said Mrs. Walton.

"But for some reason Punch Imlach (Toronto general manager and coach) wants to keep him in Rochester. Matter of fact, they advertised in Rochester that he's play for the Americans while contract negotiations were going on. So, obviously, they wanted him to sell tickets in Rochester."

"Mr. Imlach says he sent him to Rochester to play himself into shape because he missed a few days on account of flu. But he didn't do it with the other players who missed workouts. They all stayed up with Leafs. If Mr. Imlach doesn't think Mike is good enough for Leafs, why doesn't he trade him to some other NHL club?"

After playing one exhibition game with Leafs, Walton was sent back to Rochester, where he was reported to be receiving a salary in the vicinity of \$8,500-\$9,000.

It's reported that Walton is seeking a \$13,000 salary plus bonuses with Leafs. Leafs are reported to have offered him \$11,000 with a bonus arrangement.

"I think he'll stay out of hockey if it comes to that," said a friend.

## Torres To Fight Tiger In Dec.

**NEW YORK (AP) —** Jose Torres will defend his world light-heavyweight boxing title against Dick Tiger, former middleweight champion from Nigeria, here Dec. 16.

Torres will be making the fourth defence of the title he won from Willie Pastrano March 30, 1965. He has a 39-1-1 record with 27 knockouts.

Tiger, 37, will be making his first appearance since he lost his middleweight championship to Emile Griffith last April 25. His record is 53-15-3.
