MAGISTRATE'S COURT

A small docket was disposed of on Thursday, July 5th, in the weekly Magistrate's Court at Georgetown before Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald, K. C.

A resident of St. Mary's Road charged under Section 36 (2) of the Prince Edward Island Temperance Act, with being intoxicated in a public place, pleaded guilty and was fined \$20.00 and costs or in default to serve 30 days in King's County Jail. The same party was charged under Section 180A of the Criminal Code of Canada, with obstructing a police officer in the lawful execution of his duty. He pleaded "not guilty" and following the taking of the evidence, he was found guilty and sentenced to pay a fine of \$45.00 and costs or in default to serve 2 months in jail. Mr. S. S. Hessian, K.C., Crown Prosecutor, appeared for the Crown in both cases.

A case under the Lobster Fisheries Control Regulations, of a party having undersized lobsters in his possession, resulted in the accused party being fined, under the Regulations. Court adjourned to Thursday, July 12th at 10:00 A.M.

Souris Regatta

Souris wants to welcome you on Wednesday, July 11th. All classes are well-filled and competition will be keen and thrilling. Relax and enjoy yourself on the banks of Souris Harbour. Enjoy a delicious lobster supper served right at the water's edge, and end the day by attending the dance in the new St. Mary's Parish Hall. Excellent floor and excellent music.

Island Odds And Ends

Souris becomes the centre of Island interest this week with its big regatta on Wednesday. The word regatta does not convey the full scope of the programme planned, because there will be just as much entertainment on land as on the broad sweep of Souris' fine harbour. But top billing is being given to the boat-races for fishermen, and for the very good reason that the town is the business centre for most of the fishermen in Eastern King's County.

Ashore, the management of the show will serve the best lobster supper to be had in the Province at a reasonable price, and there will be games and music to hold the interest after the racing events are over. The Souris Regatta had its birth last summer, and its renewal this week—according to the committee in charge—will be better arranged and handled than in 1950. The whole town and many fishermen in the county are lending a hand to make Wednesday, the 11th of July, one of the year's best outdoor shows of such appeal as to become recognized as a major summer attraction. The location is superb, the enthusiasm of King's County people commendable, and if the weather holds good, Souris deserves to have more visitors than it has had in years.

It is alleged with some indignation by many Island sportsmen that two of our best trout streams are being ruined by refuse from starch factories. There seems little doubt that trout are dying in the streams at North Lake and at New Glasgow and that it is only a matter of time before both will be as free of trout as Government Pond in Charlottetown. It is argued by some people that any interference with the manufacture of starch would be a blow to our potato growers, but the grower is not party to the destruction of the trout streams now under discussion.

The farmer sells his potatoes and that is the end of the story as far as he is concerned. He cannot stipulate as a condition of sale that his potatoes must not be the indirect agent in the pollution of fishing streams. The remedial action urged by many people is that factories install disposal facilities to prevent injurious substances entering the trout streams involved, or that the factories operate from sites from which refuse can be expelled to the open sea. Our game laws provide penalties for netting, jigging, set-line fishing, and other unsportsmanlike practices, and for dynamiting one deep hole in a trout stream, mainland parties paid more than a hundred dollars in fines a year or two ago.

There are many miles of fishing at North Lake and New Glasgow, and dozens of holes and hideouts in which the trout are being killed with the thoroughness and sureness that no dynamiter could equal. The question arises: would it be legal to fine a man who strung a net across the salmon hole at North Lake since the trout he might catch are probably doomed anyway? Or, how much are you going to fine the individual who fishes his dinner through the ice of some mill pond out of season, when trout are being destroyed wholesale in and out of season, while the law looks the other way. Our trout streams are a great tourist asset, and the prized play-grounds of thousands of Islanders. Something should be done to preserve them for the people.

Folks in the Georgetown district are watching with approval the progress being made in linking the town up by pavement with the Montague-Charlottetown highway. Several miles of the route has now received its finishing layer of asphalt and most of the remainder has had a sealing coat preparatory to final paving. The immediate approach to the town has not yet been prepared for surfacing but it is staked out and apparently will receive some attention very soon.

While the strawberry canning

season is in full swing Eastern Packers at Souris expect to employ ninety people, mostly women. This is of considerable help during a time of year otherwise dull in this fishing community.

Thousands of cords of wood-pulp are awaiting shipment at Souris and Georgetown. In both towns, the wood is piled high at collection points not far from the waterfronts. Other types of lumbering are also giving considerable work. At Souris a new mill operated by Dockendorf Bros. is in continuous operation, and the partners plan to manufacture sashes and doors, at a later date. A second new mill at Souris which is giving steady employment to a half dozen men is owned by Alden MacLeod. Both mills report the demand for lumber of all kinds as being heavy.

Murray River never loses its appeal for vacationists. The tourist cabins on the river-side are always booked to the limit and far in advance. Given accommodation such as Murray River can provide, with good fishing, safe swimming, excellent boats, what visitor could ask for more. There is one complaint to be registered—not enough cabins.
