## Eight Are Hospitalized After Two-Car Crash

**SUMMERSIDE** — A mother, her six children and a seventh child age in Prince County Hospital following a two-car collision yesterday afternoon near Malpeque.

Mrs. Wallace Mountain, Malpeque, and the children were occupants of a small European model car which was in collision with a second vehicle driven by Mrs. Wendell Crozier, Hamilton, at the intersection of the Base Line Road and Keir's What? Road, two secondary roads running between Malpeque and Hamilton, at approximately 2:30 p.m.

The condition of all the patients was reported as serious "but not critical" by one of the attending physicians, Dr. L.K. Zielinski of Kensington. Mrs. Mountain, 33, the driver of the European vehicle, was still unconscious late last night and reported suffering from head injuries.

The Mountain children — Sharon 10, Laura 13, Vera 8, Kenneth 6, Michael 4, and Elizabeth 15 months, and Shirley Bryant, daughter of Mrs. "Muriel" Bryant, Malpeque, were reported suffering injuries ranging from a fractured shoulder, lacerations, broken collar bone, head injuries, to a fractured leg. Dr. Zielinski mentioned that the children would be kept under close observation overnight and possibly over the next few days.

A ninth passenger in the small vehicle, Garth MacKenzie, 12, was treated in the outpatient section of the hospital and released.

Neither Mrs. Crozier, the driver of the second vehicle, nor her three children, Sally, David and Robert, suffered any injuries in the accident.

(Continued from page 1) tion in any way of provincial rights, nor the alienation of provincial authority. It does mean a government at the centre strong enough to serve Canada as a whole."

### HAS RACIAL TENSIONS

The prime minister told the premiers in facing up to present problems, it must be recognized Canada has racial and regional tensions.

"At times they seem to endanger our very survival as a nation, for strains of the present always create doubts about the future. This doubt is seized by the cynics, and the faint-hearted to belittle the Canadian experiment and diminish its achievements. To counter such defections we should spend more time rejoicing our achievements; less in moaning about our difficulties."

### GALE, MINISTER OF FINANCE

Galt, minister of finance of Canada in 1864 who expounded the financial settlement that would be made if the Maritime provinces joined Upper and Lower Canada in Confederation, was played by Austin Williams, Halifax — born veteran of CBC radio and television shows.

Two other Fathers from Lower and Upper Canada of popular note were Hector Langevin and Thomas D'Arcy McGee, who did not make their real mark in history until some years after Confederation was achieved in 1867.

### TAKEN BY SURPRISE

He took some premiers by surprise when he suggested the four Atlantic provinces get together and discuss a possible amalgamation. But he and the other premiers said any such thinking would require a lot of thought and discussion.

### PREMIER JOSEPH SMALLWOOD

Newfoundland did not have a representative at the Confederation here in 1864, but after 15 years as a province "I say on behalf of all Newfoundlanders that the more we see of Canada the better we like her."
