Miners Avenge Halifax Defeat With 6-3 Victory Over Atlantics At Home

GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP)—Glace Bay Miners whipped Halifax Atlantics 6-3 Wednesday night in a Maritime Major Hockey League game, avenging Tuesday's 1-4 trouncing.

The victory put them three points ahead of the last-place Charlottetown Islanders and five behind second-place Sydney Millionaires.

Miners, paced by Gordie Miller, rammed in three goals in the first period, extended their lead to 4-1 in the second and split four goals in the final.

Miller scored twice, and the others went to Gordon Myles, Jim Farrell, Norm Connolly and Bob Brown. Bill Ford, Pete Wywrot and Doug McPhee tallied for Halifax.

Atlantics dressed only 11 players, but their two lines kept the play fairly even. Halifax's goalie Roy McMeekin made 37 stops, four more than Miners' Cliff Hicks.

MELBOURNE — (AP)—Melbourne, site of the 1956 Olympic Games, is a city of quiet, conservative people and wild, capricious weather.

It is against the law to serve beer or liquor in bars after 6 p. m. and in most restaurants after 8 p. m. A few establishments have a special licence to serve until 10.

The weather may be a sweltering 107 degrees at noon and two hours later a slashing rainstorm or a cold wave may blow in from the south. During November, when the games begin, it is necessary to wear an overcoat most nights.

Melbourne is a city of spacious parks and gardens and wide, tree-lined thoroughfares, the most sports-minded of Australian cities.
