## Power Interruptions Caused By Lightning

The violent electrical storm which swept over Prince Edward Island last evening did very little damage other than to power transmission lines. No reports of other damage had been received up to this morning. Maritime Electric Company reported that two extra crews were at work last night restoring transformers and main line disconnecting points which were knocked out by the storm. It is expected that service will be restored by morning, in all areas. The company has crews working all the way from Borden to Souris along the St. Peters Road. No reports of trouble had been received from the Montague area, the company said. Reports from Summerside said power was interrupted in the Middleton, Newton and Searle town vicinity. The frequent bolts of lightning were accompanied by very heavy rain at times throughout the storm and many areas were as bright as day for several seconds at a time. Large quantities of leaves also drifted down to plug catch basins in the city and town areas.

## Engineering Institute Head Deplores Iron, Coal Exports

"Production costs are fundamentally an engineering problem," J.J. Hanna, president of the Engineering Institute of Canada, told 30 members of the P. E. Island branch in an after dinner address at the Charlottetown Hotel last night. "As engineers succeed in developing processing machinery, labour must be prepared to cooperate with management to meet the ever pressing competition of Britain, France, Germany, Belgium and Japan, in world markets." Mr. Hanna dealt in detail with many phases of national economy, particularly that of the gas situation in Alberta and the iron ore deals in Newfoundland and Labrador. "Not too many years hence, the engineering fraternity may be asked why they did not warn the Canadian people of the effects to be anticipated in the export of so much raw material. Fish may be replenished, trees may be grown in waste places, tourists may continue to be a profitable addition to our economy, but iron ore, coal and gas cannot be replaced," he said. Stressing the caliber and attitude of young engineers as compared with older members of the organization, Mr. Hanna spoke of the two years and later the depression, leaving the engineers of today to face the fact of an atomic age, booming economy and high standards of living. He urged the latter group particularly to keep



J.J. HANNA in touch with the latest developments through frequent meetings with panel discussions on technical papers and employer-employee relations. "Engineering education continues throughout an entire life and may be considered from on the job and off the job training standpoints," he said. "Off the job training is an excellent opportunity for real service when courses of instruction are held where members may hear the opinion of others and be able to express their own," the speaker stressed. Mr. Hanna was introduced by R.D. Donnelly and thanked for his highly interesting address by N.F. Stewart. The meeting was presided over by Laurie Coles, Summerside, president of the P. E. Island branch of the organization.

## Special Sunday Is Designated

The Prince Edward Island Temperance Federation will ask churches throughout the province to designate November 1st "alcohol education Sunday". In making this announcement at a meeting of his executive committee, president Arnold Henderson hoped that this would help to make citizens more aware of the need for an expanded alcohol education program. The meeting was held in the conference rooms of the Charlottetown YMCA yesterday morning. The field secretary of the Federation, B. Jones, stated that he had visited most of the high schools and that he had conducted classes in each grade in alcohol education. F.A. Large, Q.C., chairman of the education committee, reported that a provincial oratorical-essay contest was planned for early in the new year and the program co-ordinator, G. Kerr, announced that booklets on alcohol education were nearing completion. Robert Carruthers, treasurer, outlined plans for obtaining financial support from churches and congregations to assist the federation in its educational program. It was decided that the annual meeting would be held in Bedeque on Oct. 20th when Dr. J. Linton will be visiting the province. It is planned to have Dr. Linton as guest speaker at that time.

## Award Made To Air Cadet

Roger Clark, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred W. Clark of Mt. Stewart, has been awarded a flying training scholarship following completion of three years training with No. 60 Charlottetown Squadron, Royal Canadian Air Cadets. Cadet Clark has also been accepted by the RCAF for further air crew training and leaves Saturday morning for Centralia, Ont. He attended summer camp at RCAF Station Greenwood in 1958 and was also the recipient of the RCAF scholarship at Prince of Wales College on two occasions. The flying training course was carried out at the Moncton Flying Club during July and August of this year and was attended by approximately 17 cadets from various Maritime centres. On the completion of 30 hours flying and 60 hours ground training, Cadet Clark had the distinction of attaining the highest mark.

## Witness Fined By Coroner

One witness, scheduled to give evidence at the inquest of Sylvan Chester Pippy of Southport, which was held at City Hall last evening, failed to make an appearance and was fined \$20 by Coroner Dr. L.E. Prowse. The witness, Roy Pippy of Southport, sent word by a friend that he would be unable to appear at the inquest due to illness. Dr. Prowse noted that this excuse was "not good enough for this court" and imposed the \$20 fine. However, Dr. Prowse stated, that Mr. Pippy would have his money returned to him upon the presentation of a doctor's certificate proving the illness.

## Truck Driver Exonerated In Southport Man's Death

A coroner's jury last evening exonerated Harold Francis Doyle, Mt. Stewart of all blame in the September 10th death of Sylvan Chester Pippy of Southport, which resulted from a collision at Hazelbrook on Sept. 9th. The accident occurred at approximately 1 p.m. when Mr. Pippy's half-ton truck was in collision with a three-ton gravel truck driven by Mr. Doyle. The inquest, held at City Hall, was presided over by Coroner Dr. L.E. Prowse, assisted by Gerald R. Foster, who was acting in his new capacity as Crown prosecutor. Following deliberation of 20 minutes the jury members returned their verdict. A total of seven witnesses were heard including Dr. Malcolm Putnam, Charlottetown surgeon, who treated the injured man on his arrival at the hospital; Dr. John Craig, provincial pathologist, who conducted the post mortem examination; Const. James D. Brooks, RCMP Charlottetown who investigated the accident; William Gordon Emery, Beatons Mills truck driver, who witnessed the accident. Also testifying were Louis MacLean Blue, Belle River laborer, Mr. Doyle, driver of the gravel truck and Walter Burhoe, Charlottetown mechanic, who examined the vehicles following the accident. Dr. Putnam testified that when he first saw the injured man, he appeared to be in a semi-conscious condition and did not respond to any questions. He also stated that Mr. Pippy died at approximately noon the next day.

(Continued from page 1) insurance protection. There now are about 4,000,000 insured workers in the labor force of 6,400,000. On the basis of experience over the last five years, the additional contributions should increase revenue going into the fund by about \$96,000,000 for an estimated average annual intake of \$337,000,000. On the same basis, the benefit total should increase an average \$24,000,000. Apart from this, the fund should grow naturally by some \$15-\$16,000,000 a year in interest on its investments in bonds of the cash put into it. This interest should go up, assuming the economy continues to rise.

## MAKES RECOVERY

Meanwhile, since the legislation went through the mill the fund has been making a recovery on its own from the negative it suffered during the recession. From well over \$900,000,000, it had plummeted in about two years to \$432,800,000 by May 31. With the drain eased as employment picked up, it had come back to \$448,600,000 by the end of September. Those now paying into the fund will find the weekly payments, graduated according to wages, rising from eight to 10 cents as a minimum and from 60 to 78 cents as a maximum. Two new classes will pay 86 and 94 cents. The new benefit rates will be the same most of the way, but with some increases at the top of the scale. The maximums now are \$25 a week for a single person and \$30 for one with a dependent. The new maximums will be \$27 and \$36.

## Florida Rancher Visits P.E.I. With Collection Of Reptiles

Handling a squirming, scaly five-foot alligator is an old story to Connecticut-born Florida rancher, Frank Weed, this fall making his eighth consecutive annual visit to P.E.I. Weed is an ex-marine, a TV star, and a pistol expert, the lanky Southerner, a confirmed devotee of upland game hunting, first came to the province several years ago to take part in the field trials that year. He liked what he saw so well he has come back every fall since. On two occasions his attractive blonde wife, Ellen accompanied him. The Weeds, who live on a mile-square ranch located in the heart of the Florida Everglades, are real outdoors types and Mr. and Mrs. Weed and their two children, Frank Jr. and Gary, have been featured at sportsmen's shows in many parts of North America. Since arriving in the Maritimes a few days ago, Frank and his unusual collection of birds, snakes and other animals have appeared on CBC's Gazette and CKCW-Moncton. He expects to telecast a show for CFXY Saturday night. Over the years, Mr. Weed and his tame animals have appeared on the front cover of 57 national magazines. "Not because of my pretty face, but because I seem to have the ability to make the animals stand still," he drew.

**PISTOL EXPERT**  
A deputy-sheriff for Dade County, Florida, Mr. Weed is licensed to teach pistol shooting in many of the American States. On his trip to Canada this fall Mr. Weed brought along the big 40 and several smaller ones, 40 harmless snakes, 20 poisonous snakes, a coati-mundi (a racoon-like animal found in South America), one possum, two South American quail, two Japanese quail, two chuker partridge, several turtles, and 100 dried snake skins up to 16 feet long. While travelling through Nova Scotia earlier this week he purchased a deer and a red fox to add to his collection. Most of Mr. Weed's unusual collection of snakes and other animals were caught in the teeming Everglades, which he says, is not a wild jungle but an area of everlasting grass that is very wet most of each year.

**VETERAN HUNTER**  
Using an air boat, Mr. Weed can travel through this area for perhaps 40 miles in a straight line while hunting deer or wild pigs. He stated that the grass in Florida was of very poor quality though plentiful. He declared that one ton of Canadian hay provided as much animal food as
