Boodlers Prosecuted

A Justifiable Acquittal.

OTTAWA, April 11. Civil suits were yesterday commenced in the Exchequer Court against Patrick Markin, N. K. Connolly, Michael Connolly, O. E. Murphy and Robert McGreevy on eight separate counts arising out of last year's parliamentary enquiry. The total amount claimed is \$670,000.

Despatches from Yokohama, Japan, announce the acquittal by the Consular Court of Lieut. Hetherington, U. S. N. who killed Governor Robinson some time ago on account of the latter's attention to Hetherington's wife.

The Traitorous Policy

Condemned by the French Journals.

MONTREAL, April 11.

An indignant protest has gone up from every French paper of note in the province of Quebec against the campaign of La Patrie and Le Sud in favor of annexation.

Le Monde is particularly severe and scolds the idea that Farrer, of the Globe, Beaugrand, of La Patrie, R. Villard, of Le Sud, or any other trinity of traitors, should presume to speak for the people of the Dominion. Le Monde declares, however, that these papers speak for Mr. Laurier and Sir Richard Cartwright and that the sooner the people of Canada understand what the policy of the Grit party is the better for all concerned.

In an interview on Saturday Mr. Blaine said that he would not accept the nomination to the presidency because he does not believe that, if elected, he would live through the term, the position is so exhausting.
