The choir provided a selection, "Jesus will answer prayer," Mrs. Estabrook sang a solo, "What does it mean to you?"

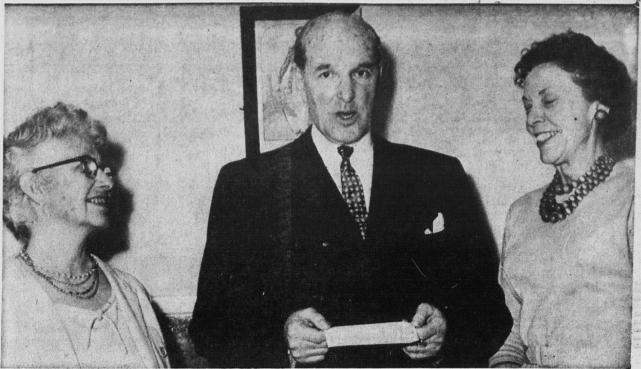

Federal Technical Training Agreement Extension Is Aim

Hon. George Dewar, M.D., minister of education, will attend a meeting of provincial education ministers in the office of Labor Minister Michael Starr next Monday.

Hon. Paul Green Lajoie, Quebec minister of youth, will present a brief to Mr. Starr asking that the federal-provincial agreement on technical training be extended to March 1967.

The present agreement which expires in March, allows the federal government to pay 75 per cent of the capital cost of construction of vocational institutes in the provinces.

Dr. Dewar said that extension of the agreement might benefit this province to some extent, particularly on construction of the Vocational Institute in Charlottetown.

"An extension would be of much more value to Quebec," he said, "as that province is behind most provinces in providing technical training facilities."

ment and the city of Montreal in the 1967 world fair—"one of the outstanding events of the centenary year of confederation."

The speech forecast several measures affecting agriculture.

An act "for the regional development of rural areas" would be brought down to speed the application of the federal Agricultural Rehabilitation and Development Act. Amendments would be proposed to the Quebec Agricultural Marketing Act, to laws on agricultural co-operatives and to legislation covering savings and credit unions.

It said the Superior Labor Council, an advisory body of economists and representatives of management and labor organizations will be asked to study a proposal for the establishment of a labor court. The act of Parliament to change the agreement.

Workers' Compensation Act would be changed "to make it more generous towards the victims of accidents."

Two reports by committees studying education can be expected during the session — the first report of the Parent royal commission and the report of a committee looking into technical education.

"In the light of these two reports the government will consider the steps to be taken to develop our educational system most effectively and to adapt it to the requirements of the cultural and economic development of our province."

The speech forecast creation of a royal commission on taxation at the provincial, municipal and school-board levels.

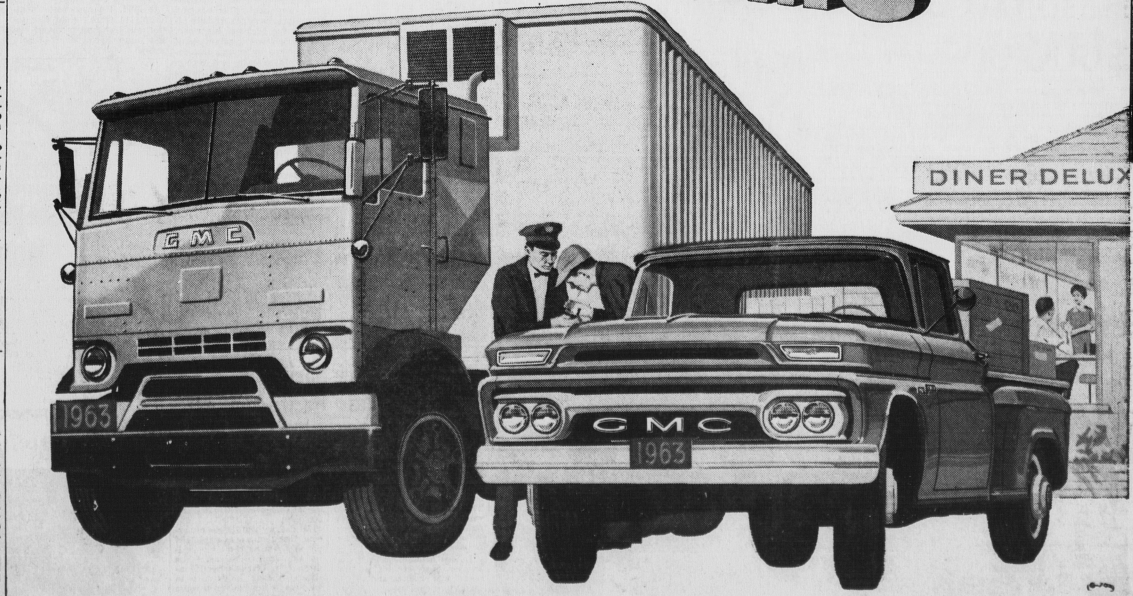
The revision of the Electoral Act, unfinished by the assembly before dissolution, will be taken up again.

There would also be a redistribution of electoral seats which is expected to give the Montreal region a larger representation in the assembly.
