### Have Hope For Improved City Basketball League

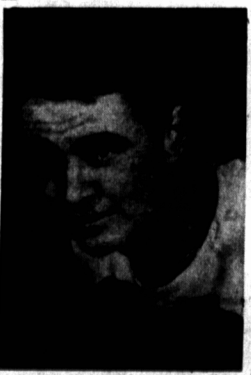

But now with St. Dunstan's entered and the R.C.A.F. will take a great deal of the load off P.W.C. and at the moment there doesn't seem to be any reason why the league shouldn't be a roaring success, provided of course the teams can dish up a good brand of competition, a quality sadly lacking in the league last year. As you may remember the Trojers had no competition whatever and just about anytime they felt like winning they could do so without raising much of a sweat about it. The other teams were pressed with the odd occasion that the Aces had enough manpower available to make the game interesting. Even then the Trojers had too much on the ball for any team in the league.

### Saints Will Be Tough To Beat In Island League



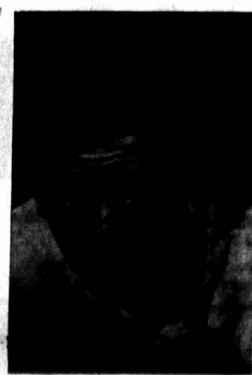

A large number of players have been turning out for practices and it is expected that newcomer George MacGilligan will be filling one of the defense posts while the other is still up for grabs.

## STASIUK POTS TWO

### Boston Upsets Red Wings 3-1

BOSTON (AP)—Boston Bruins replaced Detroit as National Hockey League leaders with a 3-1 victory over the Red Wings Thursday night on a pair of 40-foot second-period goals by Vic Stasiuk and Ernie Flaman.

The two unassisted scores broke open a 1-1 tie and gave the Bruins 15 NHL points to Detroit's 14. It was only the second loss of the year for the Wings.

A Boston Garden crowd of 12,544 watched Stasiuk notch his second goal of the night at 8:41 of the middle period for the tie-breaker with a marvelous manoeuvre.

Vic grabbed a loose puck behind the Wings' nets, retreated toward the blue line and spun suddenly to backhand a low shot. The puck rifled between the legs of teammate Cal Gardner and Detroit goalie Glen Hall.

Less than a minute later, Flaman intercepted a Merto Prystaj pass and let go a 40-footer from the right side.

Stasiuk had tied the game 1-1 at 11:05 of the first period with a 30-foot screened shot which sailed low past Hall.

Detroit seemed headed for a runaway when Ted Lindsay registered 16 seconds after the opening faceoff. Goalie Terry Sawchuk batted away his first shot but lost his stick in the process and was helpless when Lindsay fired again.

## SHOOTS TWO GOALS

### "Rocket" Paces Montreal Win

MONTREAL (CP) — Maurice (Rocket) Richard scored two goals Thursday night to lead Montreal Canadiens to a 4-2 win over New York Rangers in a game that progressively became more bitter and argumentative as well as rough.

Alternate captain Bill Gadsby of the Rangers was given a game misconduct penalty in the wild third period for his prolonged haranguing of referee Louis Maschio over a disallowed New York goal. In addition, 16 minor penalties were called through the tussle.

Claude Provost and Henri (Pocket Rocket) Richard scored the other Montreal goals and Gerry Foley and Andy Bathgate counted for the Rangers.

In a vain effort to break the hoodoo that besets the Rangers on Montreal ice, coach Phil Watson had Johnny Bower — called up from Providence of the American Hockey League — in the New York nets. Lorne Worsley, becoming perennial victim of the jinx, was benched for the one game. The manoeuvre didn't work. Canadiens scoring first and maintaining a lead all the way.

The victory was Montreal's fifth in a row and sent Canadiens to the

top of the National Hockey League standing in a tie with Boston Bruins.

The Rangers squawked long and demonstratively over the disallowed goal that would have made the score 3-3. Andy Heberton jammed the puck into the net but referee Maschio ruled a Ranger player was in the crease. All the Rangers swarmed about Maschio and followed him about the ice, led by Gadsby. The alternate captain finally was chased from the game, getting an automatic \$50 fine.

 WINNIPEG, (CP) — The general return to the old-fashioned rock 'em, sock 'em type of football is reflected in the 1956 Canadian Press Western Interprovincial Football Union all-star team as picked by the football writers and coaches in the league cities.

The de-emphasis on passing is indicated in the choice of Edmonton Eskimos' running quarterback Jackie Parker over Frank Tripucka of Saskatchewan Roughriders, who broke several passing marks this season.

The selectors also named four hard-rock runners to complete the backfield in Bob McNamara of Winnipeg Blue Bombers, Ken Carpenter of Roughriders, Ed Vereb of British Columbia Lions and Normie Kwong of Eskimos.

Parker, a cunning field general, brilliant runner, fine punter and more-than-adequate passer, and

Kwong were the only Eskimos to make the offensive team, which numbers 13 due to a tie for the centre position. Five Bombers landed positions, while Riders had three B.C. two and Calgary Stampede one.

Saskatchewan, with six positions, and Eskimos, with four, dominated the defensive squad. B.C. and Calgary split the other two spots.
