RELIGIOUS.—Divers have been at work for several days past in Bedford Basin, Halifax, sending up cannon balls evidently from the ships burnt previous to the hasty departure of Duke D'Avilla's fleet in 1746. The divers are very reticent as to what else is in sight further than to say that there are at least 20 tons more awaiting removal from the bottom.
GONE HALIBUTING.—Private advices from Seattle state that Capt. Solomon Jacobs has abandoned sealing and is fitting for halibuting. Wm. Hurd, one of his crew, has gone to Port Discovery to secure employment in the mills at that place. The sealing season is reported to have been a failure financially.—Cape Ann Advertiser.
FIRE.—On Friday evening, says the Summerside Agriculturist, while Mr. Frank Renouf was working at a pressing table in Mr. Dan Stewart's tailoring establishment, he accidentally upset a lamp, which started a fire, the flames quickly spreading all over the table, and blazing up fiercely. Mr. Stewart caught up a damping cloth, and with the assistance of two or three of his workmen, got the flames under control.
PERJURY.—A Sydney, C. B., despatch of the 8th inst., says: John McRury, of Cow Bay, was to-day committed for trial to the Supreme Court on a charge of perjury. The prosecution resulted from McRury being an informer in a Scott Act case. Considerable interest is taken in the affair owing to McRury being a church member and one of the delegates from the Christian Association to P. E. Island last year.

SCHOLASTIC.—At the meeting of the Summerside School Board, held on Tuesday evening last, Mr. D. A. Fraser, Mill View, Mr. John E. McDonald, Kinkora and Miss Mary A. McLeod, Dunstaffnage, were appointed to the vacancies in the Davies School, caused by the resignations of Messrs. D. E. McKay and Burpee Steeves and Miss Mary McLeod. FOREST FIRES.—Advices from St. John's report that destructive forest fires are prevailing along the shores of Conception Bay. At Collier's nine houses have been destroyed. At Placentia the burning of the railway facilities was dunned. At Harbor Grace Junction seven houses were consumed. At Little Bay North twenty-six families have been burned out. Nothing was saved by them. A woman and two children were burned to death at Kings Cove. Twenty-two families have been rendered homeless in Northern New Brunswick by the same cause.

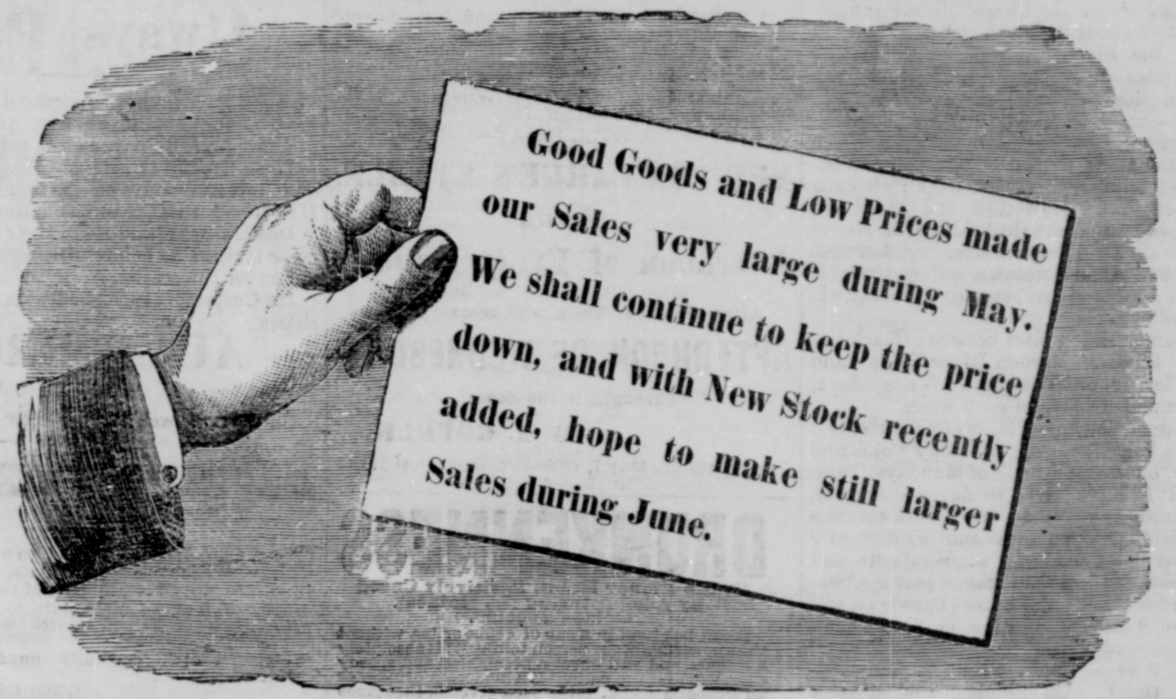
TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.
Fishermen Excited.
HALIFAX, June 10.
Fishermen along the Eastern shore are intensely excited over the outrageous vandalism of Yankee ocean highwaymen. For the past week a fleet of pirates has been seining in and off Chebucto and St. Peter's Bay. Fish have been taken in plenty inshore, and to get at them the Yankees have deliberately destroyed the nets, gear, etc., of the Canadian fishermen, and stolen the fish in the nets. The damage to property is placed at \$1,200. It is estimated that the Yankee fleet captured 1,000 barrels of mackerel. The nets, etc., of Robert Wilson were destroyed by the Gloucester schooner Alice C. Gordon. The steam cruiser Acadia sailed from Halifax this morning in charge of Captain Lorway.
The New Governor-General.
OTTAWA, June 9.
Lord Stanley and suite, who disembarked at Quebec last night, reached here shortly before 8 o'clock a. m., having come through from Rimouski over the Grand Trunk and Canada Atlantic Railways by special train. As it was not expected that he would arrive before this evening, there was no reception or demonstration of any kind at the depot, and His Excellency drove at once to Rideau Hall, where they spent to-day in looking over the buildings and grounds. The ceremony of swearing in the Governor-General will take place at 3 o'clock on Monday afternoon, in the Senate Chamber.
Killed His Son.
LINDSAY, Ont., June 10.
Yesterday while Mr. Robert English, one of the wealthiest and most prominent farmers of Burnt River, and his son Alfred, aged 15, were placing traps for woodchucks, the son moved along the river bank, unknown to his father. The father seeing his brown hat beside the bushes, and mistaking it for a woodchuck, fired, instantly killing the young fellow. The father is prostrated with grief.
A Clergyman Deposed.
NORWICH, Ont., June 9.
At to-day's session of the Niagara Methodist Conference, Rev. Mr. Johnston-House, of Adelaide Scott, Act infamer, whose name figured so prominently as being accused of blackmailing hotel keepers, was deposed from the ministry and expelled from the church.
Committed for Trial.
TORONTO, June 9.
George Shepherdson, a farm laborer, and Mrs. Parege, a widow, were committed for trial at Erin, on Friday, on a charge of murdering the latter's illegitimate infant on May 26th, the male prisoner, in his evidence, stating that he deliberately drowned the child at its mother's request.
To Dissolve Partnership.
HALIFAX, June 9.
It is understood that Doull & Miller, a leading wholesale dry goods firm of Halifax, will dissolve. Mr. Miller will continue the dry goods department and establish a large branch in St. John, while John Doull & Sons will carry on the wholesale clothing department in Halifax.
An Injunction.
MONTREAL, June 10.
Judge Taschereau has dismissed the second application by cattle shippers for an injunction against the Beaver Line. The cattle shippers declare their intention to appeal immediately and carry the matter to the Privy Council if necessary.
