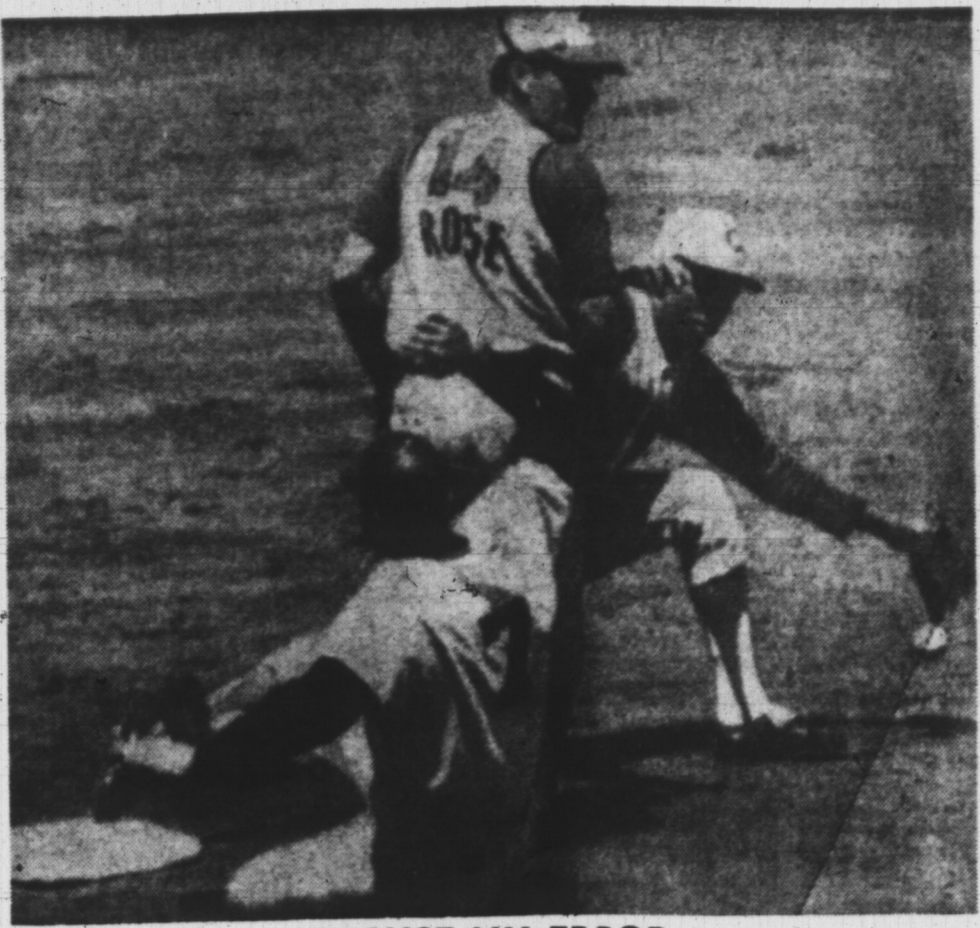

American Golfer Nicklaus Captures British Honors

Muirfield, Scotland (AP) — Jack Nicklaus, the golden power man of professional golf, stormed his final-claret Saturday and won the British Open championship by one stroke with a two-under par 282 over the challenging 6,887 yard Muirfield links.

The 26-year-old Columbus, Ohio, bomber had won every major title in his brief career and twice before knocked on the door of this one.

For a time it looked as though he would only be knocking again. But he withstood a momentary lapse to knock in a birdie four at the 17th which virtually sealed the issue. He played a safe four at the home hole while 10,000 fans roared approval.

Chicago Cubs Cuff Phils; Pittsburg Tops New York

CHICAGO (AP) — Ernie Banks rapped out three hits and drove in five runs to lead Chicago Cubs to a 10-2 victory over Jim Bunning and Philadelphia Phillies Sunday.

Southpaw Dick Ellsworth turned in his fourth victory against 12 defeats, while Bunning suffered his fifth setback against nine triumphs.

Rookie Byron Browne started the assault against Bunning in the first inning when he tripled home two runs and scored on a single by Banks.

The same combination helped the Cubs push across two more runs in the third when Billy Williams walked, Browne singled, and Banks doubled them home.

Bunning departed in the fourth after Ellsworth tripled and scored on a single by Adolfo Phillips. The Cubs put the game beyond reach with four runs in the sixth, capped by Banks' two-run single.

Arnold Palmer of Latrobe, Pa., challenged for a while but couldn't stand the pace.

Sanders and Thomas also challenged and in fact they did well enough to tie Alf Perry's 283, which was the open record for the Muirfield course set in 1935.

CAME BACK STRONG

But Nicklaus slammed a 33 on the front nine and came back in 37 for a seven, one under par, and that settled the issue.

The championship record of 276 was set by Palmer at Troon in 1962 when he won the British Open for the second straight year.

Rodgers finished with a 76 for 286 in a tie for fourth with Kel Naale and Bruce Devlin of Australia, and Garv Player of South Africa, the 1959 Open kink at Muirfield.

Dave Marr of Litchfield Park, Ariz., Palmer, Peter Thomson of Australia and Sebastian Miguel of Spain tied at 288. The field strung out after that. Ronnie Shade of Scotland was low amateur with 293.

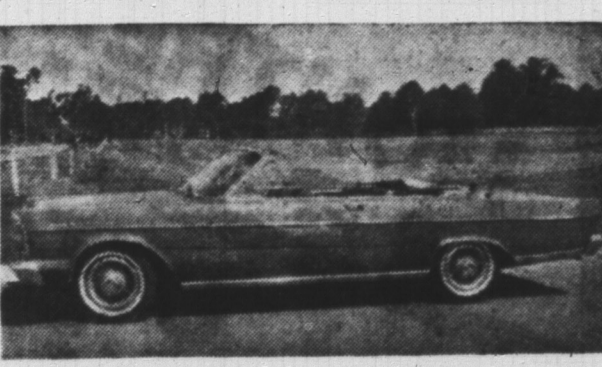
