MONTREAL (CP)—U.S. dollar in terms of Canadian funds up 3/16 at \$1.07 17/32. Pound sterling up 5/16 at \$3.01 7/16.

NEW YORK

NEW YORK (AP)—Aluminum stocks were chilled by the U.S. government's decision to release 200,000 tons of the metal from the national stock pile and the stock market Monday took its worst loss in 3 1/2 months. Trading was fairly active.

The Dow Jones industrial average slipped 5.51 to 953.95. The Associated Press' average of 60 stocks fell 1.7 to 353.9 with industrials down 2.6, rails down 1.4 and utilities down .3.

It was the greatest loss in the AP average since July 20 when it fell 4.3. Among Canadian issues, Walker Gooderham, Hudson Bay Mining and McIntyre Porcupine gained 1/4. Dome Mines and International Nickel 3/4. Aluminum Ltd. lost 1/4. Canadian Pacific 3/4. Distillers Seagrains 1/4.

Prices were irregularly lower on the American exchange. Among Canadian issues, Brailian Traction gained 1/4. Fargo Oil and Jupiter Corp. 1/4. Scurry Rainbow Oil was down 1/4. Canadian Marconi and Canadian Javelin 3/4. molybdenum 1-1/4.

MONTREAL

MONTREAL (CP)—Utilities were up in a generally steady market Monday on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges. The composite index dropped 0.04 to 161.17.

Industrials dropped 0.12 to 167.58. Dupont was off 1/4 at 45 1/4 and Dominion Glass 1/4 at 15 1/4. Utilities added 0.36 to 157.56. Interprovincial Pipe Line added 1/4 to 90 1/4 and Bell Telephone 1/2 to 58 1/4.

Banks were off 0.20 at 120.91. Nova Scotia and Imperial Common each dropped 1/4 to 71 1/4 and 62 1/4 respectively. Papers fell 0.16 to 119.49. Abitibi and Domtar each fell 1/4 to 10 1/4 and 19 respectively.

Primary metals were up. Canada Iron added 1/4 to 65 1/4 and Dominion Foundries 1/4 to 28 1/4. Other sections were steady.

TORONTO

TORONTO (CP)—Moderately heavy volume carried primary metal issues higher in active trading Monday at the Toronto Stock Exchange.

Hudson Bay paced an on-exchange advance of .11 to 87.19, jumping a point to 80. Cominco was up 1/4 to 52 1/4. Noranda 1/4 to 53 1/4 and Inco 1/4 to 102 1/4.

In the main list, Consumers' Gas was a featured trader, adding 1/4 to 14 1/4 while Quebec Natural Gas firmed 1/4 to 12 1/4.

Prices were generally weaker among bank shares with 1/2 to 62 1/4, Royal and Nova Scotia 1/4 each to 7 1/4 and 7 1/4, though Montreal added 1/4 to 60 1/4.

On index, industrials were down .06 to 171.67 and the TSE index .02 to 161.65. Western oils were ahead .07 to 103.40.

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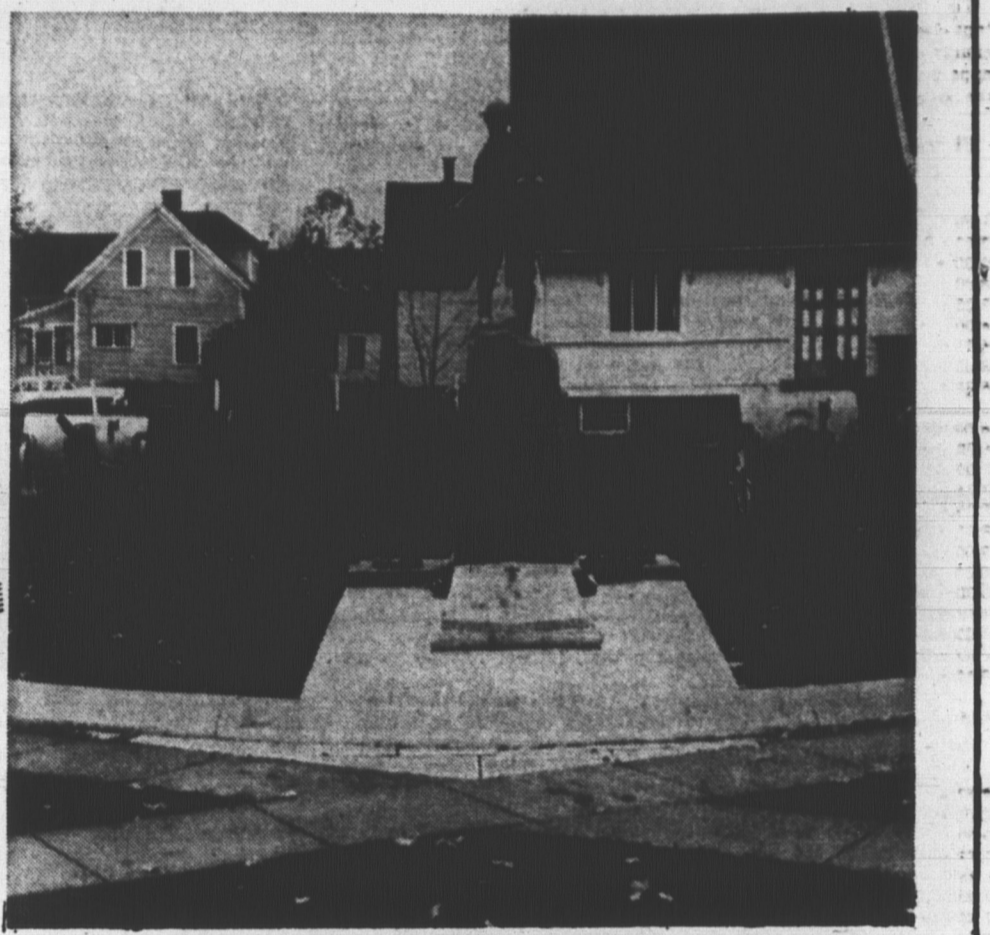

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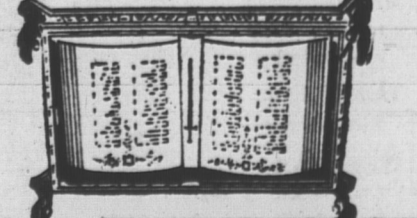
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
