NIGHT BELL NURSES REGISTER

SAVED THE CANADIANS

Col. Otter Kept Them From Being Slaughtered.

MONTREAL, Sept. 27.—A most interesting story regarding the Royal Canadian regiment of infantry, which has not before been mentioned, was told your correspondent last evening by one of the invalid Canadian soldiers just returned. The story is to the effect that Col. Otter prevented the Canadians from participating in the fight at Magersfontein, in which Gen. Wauchope was killed, and the Highland troops almost annihilated. By doing so he undoubtedly saved the Canadian Regiment from a fate the very possibility of which sends a thrill through every Briton on this continent.

During the day preceding the fight it appears Lord Methuen ordered Colonel Otter to take his regiment into action, for the purpose of assisting General Wauchope and the Highland Brigade in attempting to scale the Boer position. Colonel Otter begged Methuen to cancel the order, for the reason that his men had but just reached the field, and had never been worked together. He said he would prefer to ascertain what they were capable of doing before ordering them into such an important action. Then again, they were entirely unaccustomed to field tactics, and would have to be coached in these before they could safely take part in any of the engagements. On the strength of these representations Methuen cancelled the order and the Royal Canadian regiment was probably saved from a fate horrible to contemplate.

My informant said, Colonel Otter, although subject to criticism for many things he did, could not but be praised for the stand he took, thus saving the Canadians for proper training and finally for Paardeburg. Undoubtedly had the order been obeyed, the Canadians would have been mowed down with General Wauchope and the gallant Highland Brigade.
