Yesterday's Election.

The election for Water Commissioners, which took place yesterday, resulted in the return of Messrs. Kelly, Laird and McKinnon. This is another step towards the securing of such a supply of water as may be sufficient for the wants of the city.

The Queen's Jubilee.

It is pleasing to note that the British residents of Boston are arranging for a suitable celebration of Her Majesty's Jubilee. This is as it should be. On Saturday last they opened the celebration by forwarding to the American Minister at London—Mr. Phelps—an address to the Queen, the closing paragraph of which we publish below.

Editorial Notes.

It is reported that Mr. Blake is soon to take a trip to England for the benefit of his health. The Toronto Mail and Globe both express regret at his retirement from politics by reason of ill health.

It is said that a combination is being formed in Europe by which the capital required to finish the Panama Canal is assured. All the wealthiest firms are hurrying the work along.

The Liverpool papers contain elaborate descriptive accounts of the Jubilee Exhibition in that city, recently opened by the Princess Louise. Canada is well represented at the Exhibition, and the display has attracted much attention.

The Toronto World, referring to the Premier's activity, says: "All hands are agreed that Sir John A. Macdonald never showed so better advantage than during the present session. He certainly never stood higher in the estimation of both his supporters and his opponents, for let them say what they will, there are many Liberals who have a warm admiration for the Old Man."

The Customs Collectors at Montreal and other ports have, it is alleged, been reticent in allowing the new regulations imposed a duty on all packages, even when the package has to be destroyed to get at its contents. This state of affairs having been brought to the attention of the Dominion Government, they have decided that the old rendering of the law is the correct one.

A Desperado's Daring.

Steele, the bank burglar, made a desperate attempt to escape from prison at Antigonish on the afternoon of Saturday last. He first broke his shackles with a spike, which he drew out of the wall by twisting a blanket around it. He then stripped himself of his clothes, greased the grating of his cell with some of his food, and got out into the hallway, opening at right angles from the main hallway of the jail.

The last mentioned repair was attended with considerable danger. The shore end hangs perpendicularly over a cliff 150 feet high, and is of a very heavy type of cable weighing 14 tons to the mile.
