

### Hotel Not Liable Says Ontario Court Ruling

TORONTO (CP) — The Ontario Court of Appeal ruled Thursday that a hotel is not liable for its guests' belongings in cars parked next to the hotel. It was the first ruling on such a matter recorded in Canadian law.

Mr. Justice Roach ruled in a judgment allowing an appeal by J. Stantley Williams, proprietor of the Chateau Hotel in Cobourg, Ont., and dismissing an action by Thomas George of Oakville for \$275.

### Chemical May Bring Aid To Chronic Drinker

WASHINGTON (AP)—The possibility of taking sniffs of chemical fumes to avoid taking "sniffers" of booze was envisioned Tuesday by a Washington doctor.  
Dr. William Lewis said the possibility stems from some medical detective work which demonstrated that mysterious, unpleasant reactions to alcohol experienced by workers in a Washington printing plant were due to an inhalable chemical used in colored inks.  
The men were exposed to the chemical at their work and then, if they had a drink or so on the way home, they developed a skin rash, shortness of the breath, palpitation and other symptoms.  
The chemical is "n-butylalcohol", which is used in the ink to prevent formation of a scum-like skin that would affect the fluidity of the ink.  
Dr. Lewis, in response to a reporter's queries, said he and Schwartz hoped eventually to test the material on "known alcoholics" as a possible new deterrent chronic, pathological drinking.
