

Bloomsbury Spirits.

Mrs. Susan Willis Fletcher, accused of defrauding Juliet Davies of valuables by means of pretended spiritual communications, was recently heard before the Bow Street Police Court, London. The case is the most modern instance of Robert Macaire's wise saw that "folly is eternal." Mrs. Fletcher is charged with unlawfully obtaining, by means of false pretences, three strings of Oriental pearls and other jewelry from Juliet Hart-Davis. Mrs. Davis is a tall, frail creature, with fair hair lying in plaits across her temples. She is an ardent believer in Spiritualism, and her London home is in Bloomsbury, where the spirits room meet at their ease. Here she met Mrs. Fletcher and her husband, and became warmly attached to them. Here Mrs. Fletcher and her husband began to receive messages from Mrs. Davies' dead mother. Here Mrs. Davies paid for the messages from her dead mother at the rate of five guineas apiece. At which point in the story Mr. Abrahams, the prosecuting solicitor, may be allowed to take up his parable. "At one particular scene of the Fletchers," says Mr. Abrahams, "Mrs. Davies was taken into the seance room. The prosecutrix was seated, when suddenly Mrs. Fletcher came into the room and sat down. As she did so the sound of knocking was heard in three distinct parts of the room. Having never heard anything of the kind before the prosecutrix asked the meaning of it. Mrs. Fletcher said that it signified that the spirits wished to write. It would scarcely be believed, but the table at the far end of the room, which was untouched by a living hand, advanced across the room, and stopped in front of Mrs. Fletcher. At that moment—another remarkable fact—Mr. Fletcher entered. The prisoner said the spirits wished to write, and her husband instantly placed before her a half sheet of note paper and a pencil, and—a still more remarkable fact—left the room. The prisoner then appeared to become under the influence of a spirit. Her hand trembled and she pretended to find a great difficulty in writing. She eventually succeeded in writing the message now produced. This was headed 'No. 22 Gordon street.' There first appeared a sort of zig-zag line, the spirit apparently not having quite made up its mind what to write. Eventually the spirit through the medium, Mrs. Fletcher, wrote:—'Dear Juliet—Do as you are instructed by me.' Mrs. Hart-Davis had previously been often instructed by the spirits to hand over her jewels to the Fletchers. On this occasion the prisoner said her hand was guided by the spirit of the deceased lady. The prosecutrix held the memory of her mother in great veneration, and after receiving this message she got up, went down to Norwood, collected her jewels and brought them up to London on the following morning. She first gave them to Mr. Fletcher and afterward to his wife. Mrs. Fletcher then went into a trance. Mrs. Hart-Davis poured the jewels into her lap. 'Let me feel them,' said the spirit of her mother, speaking through the medium as a matter of course. The prisoner, under the influence of the spirit, took up each article and thus spoke:—'This locket, how well I remember it; these earrings, this ring, &c. This was very remarkable, and having recovered from her trance, the prisoner went up stairs and locked up the jewelry in a cupboard. That was the conclusion of the seance.'
