

OLDEN DAYS AND things of old have long held the fascination of history for many people who have often wished for the 'good old days'. Some of the things illustrating the good old days of the province are shown here as they were in the long ago. Immediately above is the second

Market House which was occupied in 1867 and followed the first (pictured on top) which was known as the Round Market House. The second market was followed in turn by the third of the name, but though made of stone it, like its predecessors, was destroyed by fire. In the centre

top is shown a long forgotten structure which once served as combined post office, police station and police court on Market Square. Right is a 'steam carriage factory, sawing, planing and turning', operated in this city by McKinnon, Fraser and Co. at the foot of Great George Street.

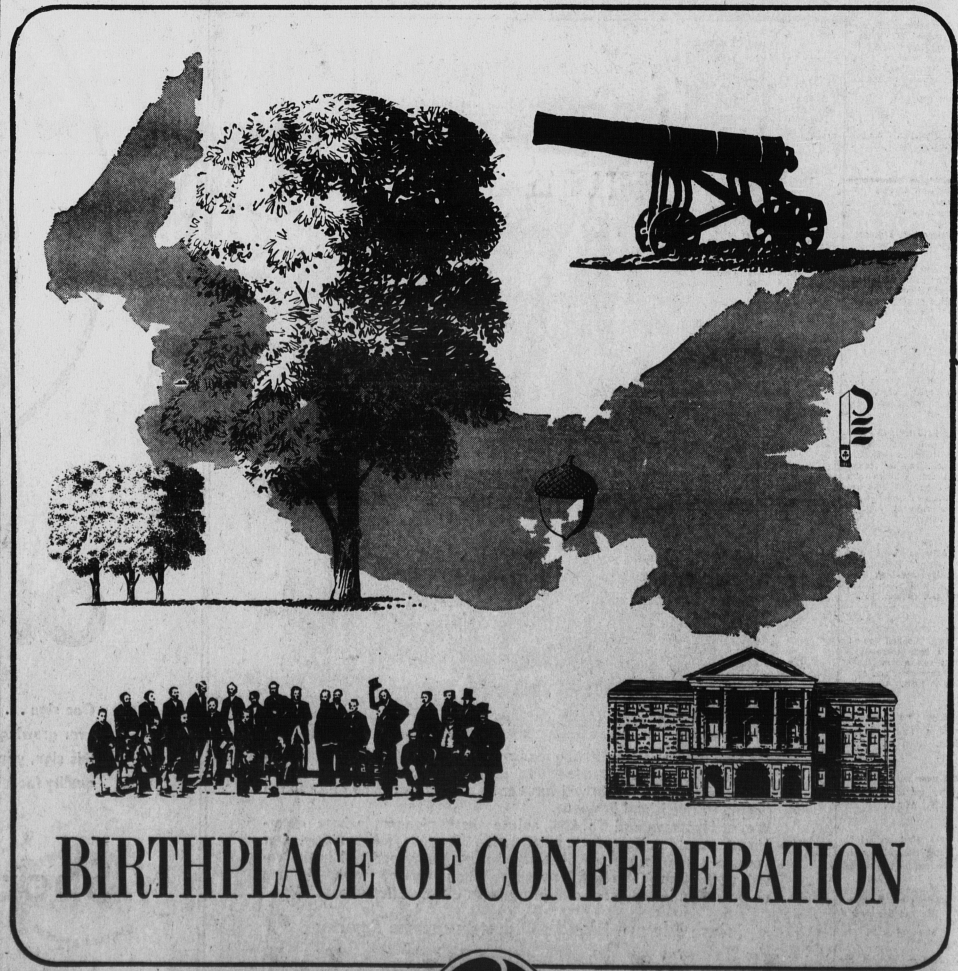
