

# Maglie Gets Yank Win; Pirates Defeat Braves

Sal Maglie helped the New York Yankees protect their six-game American League lead with a three-hit 5-0 shutout of his former Cleveland mates in the first part of Wednesday's day-night doubleheader.

Second-place Chicago came up with three runs in the 11th inning at Boston for a 4-1 victory to keep pace with the Yanks.

Milwaukee missed a step in its march toward the National League pennant as the Braves bowed to Pittsburgh 2-1. St. Louis, playing a night game against Philadelphia, went into the night's play five games behind Milwaukee.

Brooklyn slugged Chicago 9-1 as Johnny Podres scattered six hits in the final meeting of the two clubs this season. The Dodgers held a 17-5 season edge.

## FINE JOB

Maglie, the 40-year-old curveball artist who was purchased from Brooklyn Sept. 1 did a fine job in his first Yankee Stadium start with the Yanks. Two unearned runs off loser Early Wynn in the fourth and three runs off relief pitcher Bob Alexander in the eighth gave the Yanks their 5-0 edge.

It was a satisfying victory for Maglie as he had found himself "just another guy" on the Cleveland club after the New York Giants sent him to the Indians in mid-1955. He had been sold to Brooklyn in May 1956.

Until Russ Nixon singled with two out in the ninth, the Indians had only two hits off Maglie. Both had come in the second, a single by Joe Caffie and a ground rule double by Nixon.

Jim Rivera's single drove in the tie-breaking run at Boston and Fred Hatfield's pinch single knocked in two more to nail down

the White Sox victory. Bill Fischer went all the way to win and Willard Nixon was the loser.

Chicago scored in the fourth when Rivera singled, stole second and came home on Sherm Lollar's single. Boston tied it in the seventh on Nixon's line single scoring Dick Gernert from third.

Hank Foiles was the big nose for Pittsburgh in their victory over Milwaukee with a homer and single that drove in all the runs in their 2-1 margin. Foiles also had another hit off Warren Spahn who failed in his attempt to win his 20th for the eighth time.

With the help of Foiles' hitting, Ronnie Kline won his sixth straight. The only Milwaukee run was Andy Pafko's homer in the second.

## BOB RUSH ROUTED

Podres' victory was his 12th of the year, high in his four-year

major league career. Brooklyn sent 11 men to the plate in the fourth and six scored as Bob Rush was routed. Carl Furillo had four hits for the Dodgers and Ernie Banks hit his 37th homer for the Cubs.

In addition to the St. Louis-Philadelphia game in the National other night action included the Cleveland-New York game at Yankee Stadium and two - night doubleheaders between Detroit and Washington and Kansas City and Baltimore.

NEW YORK (AP)—Sal Maglie spun a three-hitter that beat his former Cleveland mates 5-0 in the afternoon, but the Indians hustled back Wednesday night and beat New York Yankees 4-1 behind the four-hit pitching of Ray Narleski for a day-night doubleheader split that left the Yankees with a 5½-game American League lead.

Narleski, a 28-year-old right-hander who had lost four without a victory since Aug. 8, was touched for only one healthy hit, an RBI triple by Hank Bauer, who also singled, in the fifth that cut Cleveland's lead to 2-1.

The other Yankee safeties were infield singles as Narleski gained a 10-5 record.

Bobby Shantz was the loser. He gave up eight hits and three of the Tribe's runs in his seven frames. Chico Carrasquel had two singles for the Indians and drove in the clinching run with a sacrifice fly in the fourth. Shantz now has a 10-5 record.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals surged to within 4½ games of first-place Milwaukee Wednesday night by erupting early for two six-run innings and dropping Philadelphia, 14-6 in the National League.

Pitcher Herma A. Wehmeier

notched his fourth victory in a row as did the Cardinals who matched their highest run production this season.

Del Ennis banded two home runs and Wally Moon one in a 15-hit attack against six Philadelphia pitchers.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Detroit swept a doubleheader from Washington Wednesday night, 3-0 and 12-2. Jim Bunning pitched his first major league shutout and hit his first major league homer and Al Kaline crashed his 22nd homer in the first game. Frank House hit a two-run homer during a nine-run uprising in the seventh inning of the second game.

The Tigers chased loser Pedro Ramos when they scored two runs in the sixth inning of the second game to take a 2-1 lead. Then they blasted Truman Cleveland and Joe Black for nine runs in the seventh as the Senators helped out with two errors.

Bunning held the Senators to eight hits.

## Mexico Takes 1st Day Lead In Tuna Cup Competitions

WEDGEPORT, N.S. (CP)—Mexico grabbed a first-day lead in the 14th annual international tuna cup competitions by boating the largest of two fish landed Wednesday.

Juan de Dios de la Torre, a Guadalajara cattleman back for his second crack at the fishing series, tugged a 655-pounder to the side of his boat after an hour and 45-minute fight.

As a result, Mexico picked up a total of 955 points. The scoring system allows a point per pound of fish, 200 points for the biggest fish of the day and 200 more for most fish of the day.

The latter bonus was split between de la Torre and Gonzalo Nunez de Haveria, Cuba who took only 48 minutes to subdue and boat a 485-pound bluefin. Cuba now has 585 points.

De la Torre's boat was one of five venturing the mouth of the Tusket River for morning fishing while Nunez made his capture further off the choppy waters of Soldier's Rip.

Two nations ran into tough luck. Peru's Manuel Boza hooked and lost a tuna as did Spain's Ruiz Valesco.

Members of all seven teams competing reported the tuna run promising. Several had passes made at their trailing bait.

The defending champion British Commonwealth team which won 1956 laurels on the strength of one fish drew a blank Wednesday despite a complement of six men.
