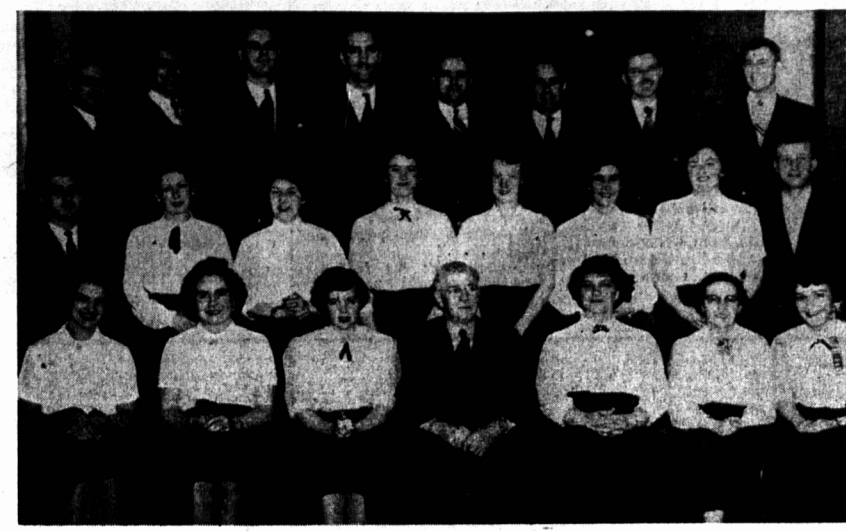


R.C.A.F. Choir Receives High Mark

TOURIST DIRECTOR GUEST SPEAKER AT S'SIDE BOARD OF TRADE MEETING

—Mr. George Fraser, director of tourist and publicity was the guest speaker last evening at the May meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade. Mr. Fraser, introduced by Mr. John Mungall, the vice president of the board, said that in his opinion, there is no community in Prince Edward Island more cognizant of the value of the tourist industry than the town of Summerside. In expressing his views on the tourist industry in this Province he pointed out that the tourist industry is one of the intangible industries. It is not easy "to get back what we spend in dollars and cents to bring tourists to this Province." Figures show, however, that there are about 80,000 vacation visitors each summer, providing an income to the province of the order of \$100 million, or about four million dollars. He believed that the industry could well be classed as the second industry. Each and every one benefits from it for it sets up a chain reaction that puts money into the pockets of all the hotels, motels, the doctors, lawyers, contractors, theatres, restaurants, gas stations, all share directly or indirectly in the benefits of the tourist trade.

Mr. Fraser said he believed that here in Prince Edward Island "we have one of the best beaches in Eastern Canada. We have the finest beaches north of Florida and these beaches are one of our finest pieces of merchandise." It was up to this province to go ahead and develop these and other facilities. He believed that the province should be cleaned up more than they are. Nature has given these blessings, and "so let us not over-commercialize them; let us not use the tourist industry as a shortcut to prosperity." In his talk, Mr. Fraser touched on the inadequate transportation service to this province, in particular at Wood Islands which he said was a "bottle neck" and while the service at Borden is not quite so bad there have been instances when tourists have had to wait long periods there as well. He felt that if this province had adequate facilities in transportation the tourist industry could be vastly increased. While there did not appear to be much criticism of the food served in the province to tourists, he believed that there should be more sea foods available to meet the wishes of the tourists. He advocated more restaurants at the western and eastern ends of the Island, more stocking of streams to provide better fishing as things that might be done to make this province a better tourist center. At the conclusion of his talk, the new national film "Abegevit" was shown. This film depicts scenes at various points in the Province and was much enjoyed by the meeting.

Dr. Valdmanis Granted Bail

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Dr. Alfred Valdmanis, held on fraud charges totalling \$420,000, was granted bail by Magistrate Hugh O'Neill Thursday. Magistrate O'Neill said he would be released on \$50,000 personal bail and two sureties of \$25,000 each. Bail was granted after Dr. William Black, a psychiatrist who examined the former director of economic development for Newfoundland, said he seemed to be in full control of himself—with his normal powers of concentrations upset by the gravity and threat of the present situation. Valdmanis will appear in court Friday, and if the bail is posted, will be released. Dr. Black said Valdmanis required "three or four weeks rest."

Summer Dress Donned By 25th Brigade In Korea

IN KOREA, (CP)—Summer dress and mosquito netting are back in fashion in the 25th Canadian infantry brigade in Korea. Bush jackets have been discarded in favor of light shirts as the 6000 troops settle down for five months of Korean heat and dust. All excess clothing and footwear is going back into storage. Any left exposed to the Korean summer soon turns to a mouldy mass and even leather boots and shoes fall apart. In June and July, the rains will come raising the level of the Imjin river as much as 38 feet within 24 hours. Roads and training areas then become quagmires and deep drainage ditches have to be dug and tents and light equipment tied down so they won't float away. Besides mosquitoes and dust, another discomfort is the stench of the rice paddies. Forward elements of the brigade, however, are somewhat more fortunate because the land has not been under cultivation in that area since the war began in the summer of 1950. With summer, the medical corps introduces more precautionary measures. Orders require every soldier to take one paludrine tablet a day to prevent malaria. Medicos also advocate as many showers as possible. During the rainy season, keeping clean is simple. A soldier merely steps outside his tent into the downpour with a cake of soap. Administrators find that it is too hot to work under canvas from 8 a.m. until dusk. And after nightfall, it's nearly impossible to work with a light burning because of the swarms of insects.

Murder Case Cut To Manslaughter

TORONTO, (CP)—A charge of murder against William Lunness, 54, was reduced to manslaughter when he was committed for trial Thursday. The charge concerns the fatal stabbing of Harold Shaw. Patricia Ryan, a roomer in Lunness' house said Shaw called at Lunness' house after being told to keep away. A scuffle began, she said and Lunness had only one leg he could not defend himself. "He grabbed a knife and stabbed Shaw," she told the court.
