THE DISASTER TO THE JOHN T. FORD.

FATE OF THE CREW, DREADFUL SUFFERING AT SEA.

(From the Baltimore American.)

Full particulars of the loss of the American yacht John T. Ford, which sailed from Baltimore to Havre, are given by the English papers.

In all kinds of weather two out of the crew of four had to be on deck, as there was only room for two below, and then they were cramped up.

The boat kept revolving round as all four of the crew were trying to get on her, until the lad got entangled between the rigging and the mast, and by that means she was kept steady until they all got on her.

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This survivor, Andrew Armstrong, is an English sailor, who had for some years been sailing out of the port of Baltimore, and who, when here, made his home with Mr. C. P. Cuff, No. 88, Block street.

"Dear Sir,—The schooner John T. Ford, the vessel that I started from Halifax in, was capsized by a heavy sea, and all hands but myself lost.

GREAT BRITAIN. RITUALISM.—The commission upon the Ritual of the Church of England have agreed upon the following Report:

"To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty: Your Majesty having been graciously pleased to issue a Commission reciting that 'differences of practice have arisen from various interpretations put upon the Rubrics, Orders and directions for regulating the course and conduct of public worship, the administration of the Sacrament, and other services contained in the Book of Common Prayer according to the use of the United Church of England and Ireland, and more especially with reference to the ornaments used in the churches and chapels of the United Church and the vestments worn by the ministers thereof at the time of their ministrations, and that it is expedient that a full and impartial inquiry should be made into the matters aforesaid with the view of explaining or amending the said Rubrics, Orders and Directions, so as to secure general uniformity of practice in such matters as may be deemed essential, and enjoining your commissioners to make diligent enquiry into all and every one of the matters aforesaid, and to report thereupon (time to time as to them, or any ten of them, may appear to be most expedient, having regard not only to the said Rubrics, Orders, and directions contained in the said Book of Common Prayer, but also to any other laws or customs relating to the matters aforesaid, with power to suggest any alterations, improvements, or amendments with respect to such matters, or any of them, as they or any ten or more of them may think fit to recommend.'"

"We, your Majesty's Commissioners have, in accordance with the terms of your Majesty's Commission, directed our attention to the question of the vestments worn by the ministers of the said United Church at the time of their ministrations, and especially to those the use of which has been lately introduced into certain churches.

"We find that while these vestments are regarded by some witnesses as symbolical of doctrine, and by others as a distinct vesture whereby they desire to do honor to the Holy Communion as the highest act of Christian worship, they are by none regarded as essential, and they give grave offence to many.

"We are of opinion that it is expedient to restrain in the public services of the United Church of England and Ireland all variations in respect of vesture, from that which has so long been the established usage of the said United Church, and we think that this may be best secured by providing aggrieved parishioners with an easy and effectual process for complaint and redress.

"We have placed in the Appendix the evidence of the witnesses examined before us, the documents referred to in the evidence or produced before the Commissioners, the cases laid before us, which were submitted to eminent counsel on either side of the question, together with the opinions thereon; also the report on the subject made by the committee of the Lower House of the Convocation of the Province of Canterbury, and the resolutions passed by the Upper as well as the Lower House of the Convocation, and the resolutions passed by the Convocation of the Province of York.
